

Flattened tires bring fleeing vehicle to stop

Police fired shots at a fleeing vehicle Friday night, February 4, after trying to bring it to a halt with "stop sticks" and by blocking the road.

The driver of the stolen vehicle, a 15 year old boy from Lubbock, was finally brought to a halt in a field west of Aiken.

Floyd County dispatchers received an alert Monday of a juvenile who had stolen his mother's car in Lubbock and was heading toward Floydada.

The car was spotted traveling into Floydada on South 62 and Floydada City Officers attempted to pull the car over.

"The driver refused to stop," said Police Chief Darrell Gooch. "He continued through Floydada on 2nd Street at speeds in excess of 80 mph.'

Lockney police heard the pursuit call at 10:25 p.m. and took the "stop sticks" to Highway 70. The stop sticks are designed to flatten tires and bring a fleeing vehicle to a stop.

"Lockney Police Sgt. Casey Wallace set up the "stop sticks" 2 miles north of Muncy on Hwy. charges.

70 at 10:30 p.m.," said Lockney Police Chief Jerry Edwards.

"The car was traveling down Hwy 70 at speeds in excess of 120 mph," said Gooch.

According to police the front right tire of the vehicle hit the stop stick at 10:32 p.m. and kept on going.

Hale County law enforcement also joined in the pursuit.

"The suspect began to use his vehicle as a weapon," said Gooch, "by attempting to knock the cars out of the way.

According to Gooch a Floydada Police Officer fired a shot and hit the left rear tire and a Floyd County Deputy shot out the right rear tire.

"The suspect made an abrupt right hand turn near Aiken, went through a bar ditch and up into a plowed field, 2 or 3 miles west of Aiken off Hwy. 70," .said Gooch.

Taken into custody was a 15 year old white male. He is being held in Garza County Juvenile facility and faces multiple

Vaughn named to All-State Band

Floydada High School student, Jeffri Vaughn, was named to the 2005 Texas All-State ATSSB Band and will perform at the annual Clinic/Convention of the Texas Music Educators Association February 9, through February 12 in San Antonio.

Vaughn is in eleventh grade and plays Alto Clarinet. The Floydada High School Band director is John M. Odom.

TMEA Executive Director, Robert Floyd, said, "All-State is the highest honor a high school music student in Texas can achieve. This prestigious recognition represents years of disciplined practice."

Only 1,570 students were selected out of 56,810 who auditioned. Students are selected to an All-State ensemble through auditions at the region and area level. The TMEA Clinic/Convention is the largest event of its kind in the United States, attracting over 22,000 teachers, exhibitors, student participants and participants' and family members. Governor Rick Perry will

speak and a selected group of All-State students will perform at the First General Session of the TMEA membership Friday, February 11. Commissioner of Education Shirley Neeley will address the membership at the Second General Session on Saturday, February 12.

Since 1994, All-State students have scored on their SAT scores an average of 218 points above the state average and 195 points above the national average.



location, some home owners will be forced to try and relocate their families due to the amount of air and land pollution from such a close proximity. Every land and






In between times at Ruidosa and Del Rio Ann still finds time to have a garden and puts up lots of vegetables. She is also a wonderful pianist.

report that showed an impressive new marketing year high, analysts said commodity funds and locals were more interested in selling, causing cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade to settle sharply lower Thursday.

USDA reported net export sales of U.S. cotton in the week ended Jan. 27 totaled 373,100 bales, 51 percent more than the previous week and 55 percent better than the four-week and 55 percent better than the four-week average. The major buyer was China with 131,800 bales followed by Indonesia and Turkey with acquisitions of 45,900 and 33,200 bales, respectively. Sales of 14,000 bales for delivery in 2005-06 were mainly for South Korea.

bales were nine percent more than the previous week but two percent lower than the four-week average. Turkey, with 47,100 bales, was the primary destination. Mexico followed with shipments of 36,700 bales, and South Korea rounded out the list of the week's top three destinations with 31,300 bales.

Traders said the market was slowing down on Thursday both in anticipation of the Chinese New Year celebration and in response to three days of rising cotton futures prices.

"The cotton market is experiencing a difficult time with the rolling of positions from March to May and the start of the Chinese new Year next week," a cotton market observer said. "Fur-

Despite a weekly export sales thermore, the Chinese will be. mostly absent from the market Texas High and Rolling Plains during the New Year holiday that begins February 9 and lasts for two to three weeks, so we'll probably see very little business."

In spot cotton news, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 22,673 bales online in the week ended February 3 compared to the previous week when 30,576 bales were traded. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 33.70 to 35.03 cents per pound versus the previous week's range of 35.69 to 36.88 cents per pound.

In other news, the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC), released its latest monthly assessment of the global cotton balance sheet. The changes were widely anticipated and pre-Export shipments of 249,000 empted by USDA's figures in mid-January. The committee increased its word production estimate by 1.6 million bales due, in part, to a one million bales increase in Pakistan and a 200,000 bale boost in the United States. World cotton consumption gained 600,000 bales of which 500,000 originated from China. Carryout stocks grew by 900,000 bales

ICAC increased it 2005 estimate for world production 1.5 million bales from its previous report. Consumption also was bumped up 700,000 bales, and ending stocks grew to 46.5 million, up 1.7 million bales. The 46.5 million-bale carryout is down only one million from the current season despite a sharp drop in output.





She was also preceded in death by her parents, seven brothers and six sisters.


