The boys made up stories to explain why one kid only had one shoe (which was lost when the kids bailed out of the car), and a hurt leg.

"They asked him to take them to Levelland but when he said 'No', they asked him to take them

from these two kids. We have never had an assault on a staff member before," said Moore.

"One of the escapees had been here five months and was ready to go home in the next two weeks. He was about to complete the program. The other one had been here once before for three months. His department sent him back (about a week ago) when he kept getting in trouble at school. Both of them had done well in our program.

About any planning for the escape, Moore said, "I believe there was a little planning earlier in the day, or the day before, probably by the latest arrival back here. One of the kids escaped wearing a pair of pants

which was hidden in his room or under his clothes. The other kid had on PAC shorts and a PAC tshirt (which is what they sleep

were thinking to pull something like this.'

"These were veteran staff members that know all the ropes and they have dealt with every kind of kid. The kids were in bed for over an hour and most of the other kids slept through the whole thing and did not even know it had happened."

Moore also thanked all the law enforcement officers from Motley, Briscoe and Floyd Counties, and the Floydada City Police Officers who participated in the search.

### Racial Profile Report presented to Floydada City Council

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, February 22, and approved Saturday, May 7, 2005 as the date for the General Election and the Special Election for the City of Floydada (See election story for more information), and approved a racial profile report by Police Chief Darrell

The 2004 state mandated RPR report showed the City of Floydada population at 3,676, with 47.7 percent male and 52.3 percent female.

According to the Racial Profile Report, the ethnicity of Floydada is 51.6 percent Hispanic, 42.1 percent Caucasian, 4.4 percent African, 1.6 percent Native American and 0.2 percent Asian.

The report showed the Floydada Police Department Activity for 2004 with 215 total Reported Offenses. There were 153 Misdemeanor Offenses reported, with 103 (68 percent) of those cases "cleared". There were 62 Felony Offenses reported, with 44 (70 percent) of those cases "cleared". There were 33 traffic accidents during 2004

Other profile breakdowns of the report showed the FPD made 1,221 Contacts, with 622 (50.9 percent) Hispanics; 530 (43.4 percent) Caucasian; 67 (5.5 percent) African; and 2 (0.2 percent)

In 2004, there were 3,408 FPD Public Calls For Police Services. 1,683 (49.4 percent) of the calls were by Hispanic; 1,511 (44.3 percent) by Caucasian; 168 (4.9 percent) by African; 13 (0.4 percent) by Asian; 3 (0.1 percent) by Native American; and 30 (0.9 percent) not identified. 1,313 of the calls were from males and 2,057 were from females.

The FPD Arrest Report in 2004 showed 59 Contact Arrests, 52 Warrant Arrests and 17 Call Arrests. The Contact Arrests breakdown was 52.5 percent Hispanic, 30.5 percent African and 16.9 percent Caucasian. The Warrant Arrests breakdown was 73.1 percent Hispanic, 17.3 percent African and 9.6 percent Caucasian. The Call Arrests breakdown was 70.6 percent Hispanic, 23.5 percent African and 5.9 percent Caucasian.

Well, by the standards of most Texans, it ain't all that bad. In fact, we don't know a single state judge in Texas that makes less than \$100,000 per year. And that's even before all the stipends kick in from local governments. Appellate judges have a base of about \$107,000, while those on the high court, the one Mr. Jefferson serves on, make about \$113,000. And you might be surprised, gentle reader, to learn how



# Lockney business woman dies

Eleanor Schacht, a Lockney businesswoman, community supporter, and church leader, died Sunday, February 27, 2005 at her home in Lockney. She was 93.

She was born November 26, 1911 in Harvey County, Kansas to the late Richard and Lula Grace Morris. She graduated High School in Plains, Kansas in 1929 and was the Salutatorian. She married Fritz Otto Schacht on November 26, 1929 in Plains, Kansas and moved to Lockney to farm, dairy and run a milk route.

During the presentation of the award, it was noted that Margaret had move from central Kansas to Southwest Kansas by covered wagon at the age of five. The journey of 200 miles took the family three weeks.

Because there were so few trees, Eleanor picked up dried cow chips for fuel as she walked the distance.

Eleanor was also named Lockney's Citizen of the Year in

A big supporter of her community, her children and her grandchildren, Eleanor was a Cub Scout and Boy Scout leader, as well as a Brownie Scout and Girl Scout leader. As a Lockney Band Booster she had one or

more children in Band for 19 years and was on the committee that bought the first band uniforms. She was also known as the chief chili cook in the Band Concession Stand at football games from 1956 to 1972.

She was preceded in death by her husband, one son, Morris Don Schacht in 1969; one brother and five sisters.

Survivors include two sons, Clar Schacht and wife Judy of Floydada; Otto Schacht and wife Madonna of Plainview; two daughters, Margaret Schacht of Lockney, and Sarah Cameron and husband David of Midland; 17 grandchildren and five great grandchildren.
