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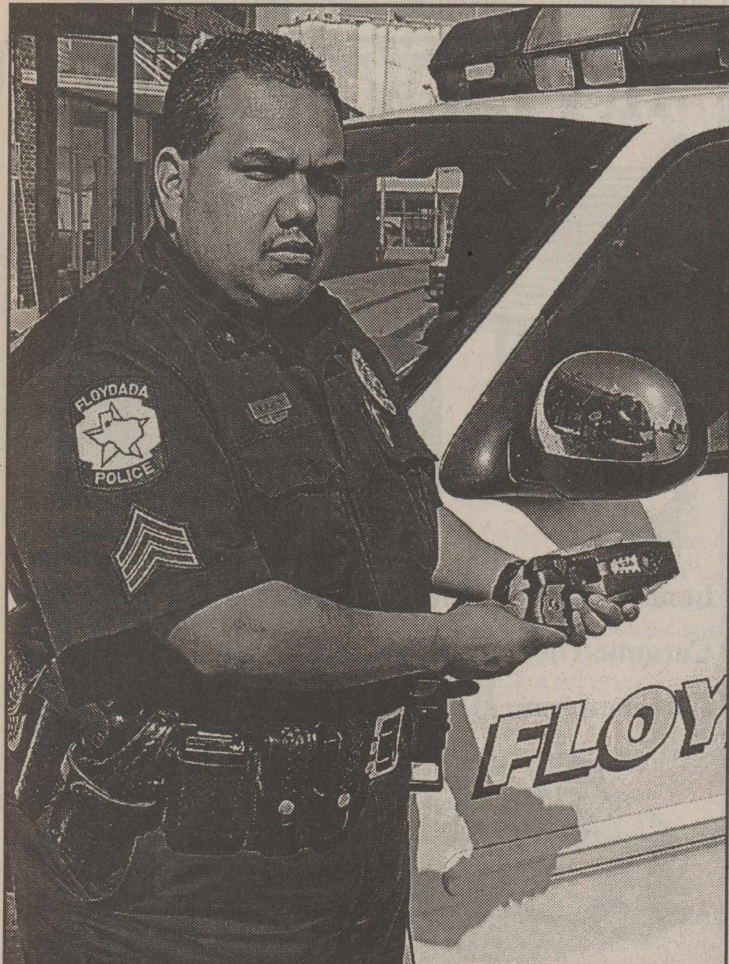

## Police now using Taser guns

All Floydada Police officers have now been certified in the use of Taser's and are now carrying them for protection of themselves and others.

Police Chief Darrell Gooch has become a Certified Instructor for Taser courses. Gooch is a strong believer in the Taser and its use in dealing with violent and combative suspects.

"I've been in law enforcement for 20 years," said Gooch, "and I've never seen anything like the Taser."

A non-lethal weapon, when the Taser is fired a cartridge on the weapon releases two small metal barbs (similar to a small but straight fish hook). The barbs are connected by two long wires to the Taser in the officer's hand. The barbs stick into the skin and deliver a small electrical shock when the officer pulls the trigger. The shock lasts 5 seconds. If

the suspect does not cooperate after the first shock, then the officer can pull the trigger again to deliver another shock--and another and another until the suspect is still and obeys officer's instructions.

"If you do what the nice officer says, you won't have to take a second ride," said Gooch with a smile.

"The Taser got some bad press at one time," said Gooch, "because of suspects who died after having been shot by a Taser. But all deaths have been cleared in autopsies as having been caused by drugs or another factor not associated with the Taser."

Gooch says there have been 100,000 volunteers who have been shot by the Taser and no one has died from the experience.

"It does not affect pacemakers or defibrillators," said Gooch. "It operates at a low electrical

cycle. The amperage is even lower than an electric fence. The immobilization of the muscles comes from the rate of the electrical cycle (15-18 times per second). This causes muscular disruptions."

"In Miami, Florida, after police started carrying Tasers, the police department went 14 months without having to use a lethal weapon. That is almost unheard of."

"In Scottsdale, Arizona suspect related injuries are down 69% and officer related injuries are down 59%."

According to Gooch the Taser operates at .00036 amps (less than a Christmas tree lightbulb), and 1.76 Joules.

"A medical defibrillator operates between 100 and 350 Joules," said Gooch. The defibrillator is what jump starts your heart."

Gooch says there are no ill

side effects from being shot with a Taser other than possibly some muscle soreness. Most injuries come from falling down.

To prove how safe the Taser is, Gooch and all his officers volunteered to be shot by the Taser. As an instructor Gooch had to be shot several times. "If I can take it--so can anybody else," said Gooch.

"It's called 'Riding the Lightning'," laughed Gooch.

"The worst part about it," said Sgt. Ruben Ramon, "was the anticipation and the sound. Once we got away from the walls in the room the sound wasn't so bad, and the effects of the Taser are over quickly."

"I can think of many instances over the years where I could have used the Taser," said Gooch. "Any other tool that can keep an officer from having to use a lethal weapon is great."

## Commissioners renew jail contract with Hale County

The County Commissioners Court met Monday, May 9, and voted unanimously to renew the county's agreement with Hale County regarding the housing of Floyd County prisoners.

"The agreement will be extended until January 1, 2006, then the agreement will be extended automatically each January 1st, unless otherwise notified," said Judge Hardin.

In other matters the Commissioners agreed to pursue a tower leasing contract with World Radio Link Inc. from Idaho.

The lease proposal, from WRL, is for \$250 per month to the county for use of their 280 foot communications tower just south of Floydada. The proposal is asking for the top two feet of the tower, or 30 feet of usage elsewhere on the tower, according to County Judge William D. Hardin.

Several technical questions were sent to the commissioners concerning the tower by WRL. Therefore Commissioner Craig Gilly made the motion to pursue the proposal and seek council from Max Weatherford of Plainview to answer the technical question. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden.

A request by the National Teacher Associates insurance company, to solicit business and speak directly with county employees, was denied unanimously by the commissioners.

Judge Hardin told the court, "NTA insurance sells policies covering the heart, cancer and strokes."

The court heard an annual audit report, ending September 30, 2004, by Becky Roberts with Davis, Kinard and Company of Abilene. The 2003-2004 audit showed Total Liabilities and Fund Balance at \$183,225; Special Revenue Fund at \$469,506; and Trust and Agency Fund at \$215,569; for a Total of All at \$868,300.

In a related matter, County Treasurer Elva Martinez presented the April Financial Report to the commissioners. The April report showed a Beginning Balance at \$816,735.06, Receipts at \$210,866.17, Transfers In and Out at \$184,043.17, with Disbursed at \$210,995.39, leaving an Ending Balance at \$816,549.51.

The commissioners transferred \$36,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund into the four precincts at \$9,000 each for general work spending.

Two farm contracts were approved by the court. Both were in Precinct 2. One was located 9 miles west of Lockney to clean out a waterway by Steve McPherson. The other one was located 11 miles north of Lockney to clean out a waterway by Chad Frizzell.

The court approved a request by Leslie Nixon to cross CR-241 with a 6 inch water line.

In the Precinct 5 race, Boyd Jackson earned 57 votes and incumbent Mike Ford garnered 52 votes.

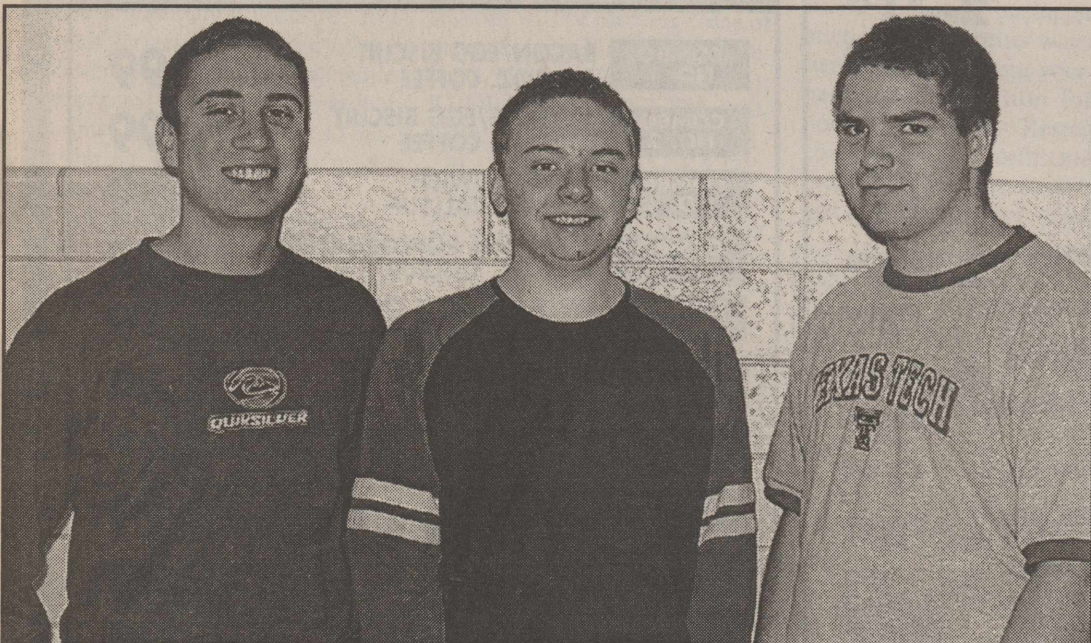
Volunteer help from other adults also made the project become a reality. Ed Marks built the

We lost another good friend recently. Joe Boerner of Lubbock passed away April 27, after a long, difficult bout with cancer.

An awful lot of people will miss Joe. He was not only a good family man, but he had as much to do with West Texans beginning to correlate their political actions with their political thoughts as anyone we know. Many, many people in politics today owe Joe a debt of gratitude, not that all of them would ever acknowledge it. He was not adverse in putting his mouth, or his pen, where his money was, and his money was usually on the side of conservative causes and conservative politicians. Not always the most conservative, by any means, but the most practical conservative who had a chance at winning election.

Joe was a lawyer, or an attorney, as he preferred to say. For many years he was with Crenshaw, Dupree and Milam, at that time a principal, if not the principal, Lubbock law firm. His very first case after graduating from the University of Texas law school, he once told me, was right here in Floydada, at the Floyd County Courthouse. Ultimately, after joining with another law partner, Don Dennis, they set up their own firm and have practiced in Lubbock ever since under the name of Boerner & Dennis.

For many years Joe was a member of the Associated Republicans of Texas, an organiza-

tion credited by many with helping mightily in the evolution of Texas into a two-party state. Joe was an avid reader of the Hesperian, particularly this column, and we did not always disagree on politics. But sometimes we did. He was much more-willing than I to give politicians the benefit of doubt, much more willing than I to help any West Texan who was willing to call himself a Republican. Sometimes his tendency to support almost anyone who was willing to identify with Republicans could, and did, cause him embarrassment. It caused him to support people who did not deserve his support, nor, for that matter, the support of most citizens. He even went so far as to support Rep. Delwin Jones, of Lybbock when Delwin changed his stripes and decided to run as a Republican. Delwin is now safely ensconced in the Texas Legislature.

The simple fact is that Joe was extremely loyal, one who felt political loyalty was a two-way street. Unfortunately, during his life he was to learn differently. He would find that in the world of politics, not everyone counts loyalty as a virtue. Or, if a virtue, one that can be put on "hold" during a politician's lifetime. Fortunately, Joe had loyal friends in High Places. Before his passing, he was eulogized on the floor of the Texas Senate in a resolution sponsored by Sen. Robert Duncan of Lubbock. Several Senators spoke of his contributions to good government.

One can hardly write of such things without thinking of all the good men, and women who have gone on before. One thinks of Carl Lemmon, of Cedar Hill, who

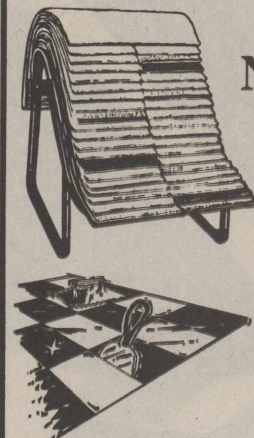
used to be our country correspondent, and whose wife was our correspondent until she died and Carl took over, of Kinder Farris, of here in Floydada, who for

years ran the First National Bank, of Walt Hale, also of here in Floydada, or of countless others who spent their lives making this a better community. West Texas is a better place for their having been here.

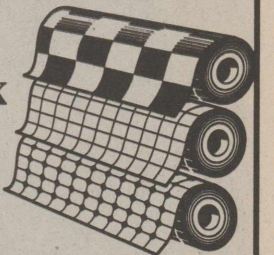
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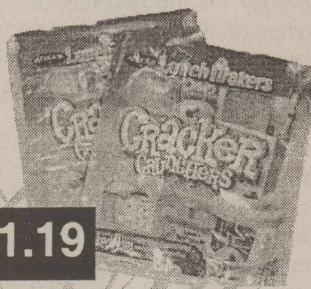
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## Letter to the Editor

## Commissioners Court briefed on County Extension's activities

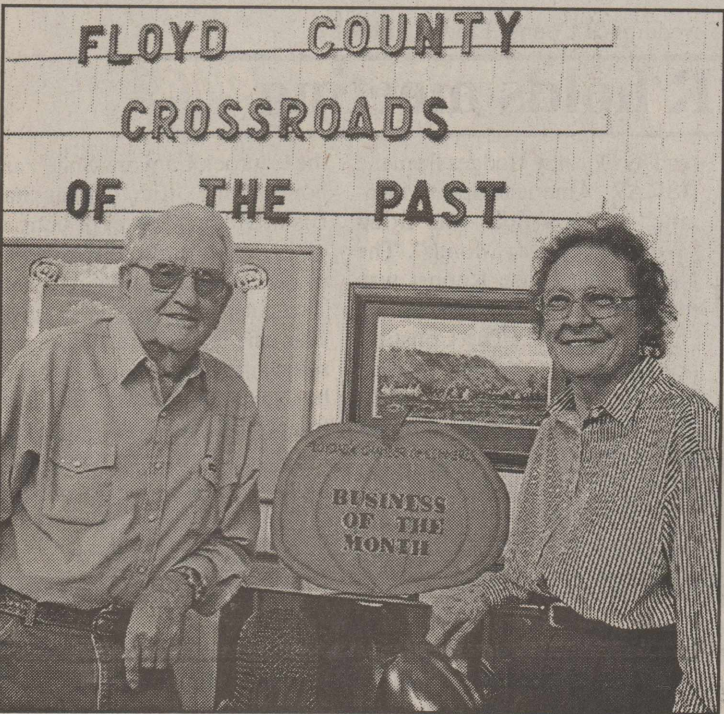
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Both Floyd County Agent J.D. Ragland and County Extension Agent Melissa Long gave brief reports to the commissioners. In Long's report she stated, "We had 200 students participate in the Heart Fair this year. 38 4-Her's went to the 4-H Roundup. Four teams won 1st Place and three teams won 2nd Place. 18 kids will be going to the State Roundup at College Station on June 5-10. Spencer Schacht will be trying to qualify for a scholarship worth between \$1,500 to \$2,000."

Ragland told the court, "We are planning a Water Quality and Safety program on Monday and

Tuesday, May 23-24. We will have over 500 kids participating and bringing water samples from their homes to be checked for quality on Tuesday."

"Ag-wise, our wheat in the county did not receive any freeze damage from the cold spell a couple of week's ago. We will have our Wheat Field Day on May 11 on the Louis Bearden farm. The top two questions always asked about wheat in Floyd County is (1) which (variety) is the best for forage, and (2) which (variety) produces the best yields. Our yields this year have been good, but the price is down," said Ragland.

## State Track on radio

For the 6th consecutive year KFLP, Floydada will provide live coverage from the Texas UIL State Track and Field Championships at Mike Myers Stadium in Austin on May 13th (Friday) and 14th (Saturday).

"The races will be live coverage and will focus on athlete throughout West Texas from the top of the Panhandle down to I-10," said Nick Long, who will handle the play-by-play. "It will be a similar coverage area of what we follow on the State Farm Friday Night Scoreboard during the football season in the fall."

Long will be teaming up with Tony St. James, who co-hosts the Scoreboard, as the color announcer. "Tony and I have covered several events together, but nothing compares to the State Track Meet. Tony was the one who came up with the idea of doing play-by-play of the races, and it has caught on especially with farmers who listen to the coverage from start to finish while they plant cotton. The stories that come out of the meet are so motivating and the action never slows down," said Long.

The crew will also include two reporters covering the field events. The reporters will be Scott Sherwood of Panhandle

and Jim Gibson of Austin. "This will be the first time we have had two reporters on the field and we are definitely excited about this since its not uncommon for 3 or 4 events to take place simultaneously. This will make a huge difference."

KFLP 900-AM will have all of the races starting with the 3200 races Friday morning at 9:00 a.m. and continuing until nearly 12:00 noon. There will be hourly updates throughout Friday afternoon on 900-AM and 106.1-FM. The Class 3A/4A races will be on both stations from 5:00 to 10:00 Friday night starting with the 400-meter relay at 6:00 p.m.

The coverage will resume Saturday morning with updates from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. followed by continuous coverage from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. of Class 1A/2A running events on both 900-AM and 106.1-FM. Several other area stations will be carrying some of the races including KPAN, Hereford (106.3-FM, 860-AM); KDDD, Dumas (95.3-FM; 800-AM); KEYE, Perryton (96.1-FM; 1400-AM); KXOX, Sweetwater (96.7-FM, 1240-AM), and KRUN, Ballinger (1400-AM). 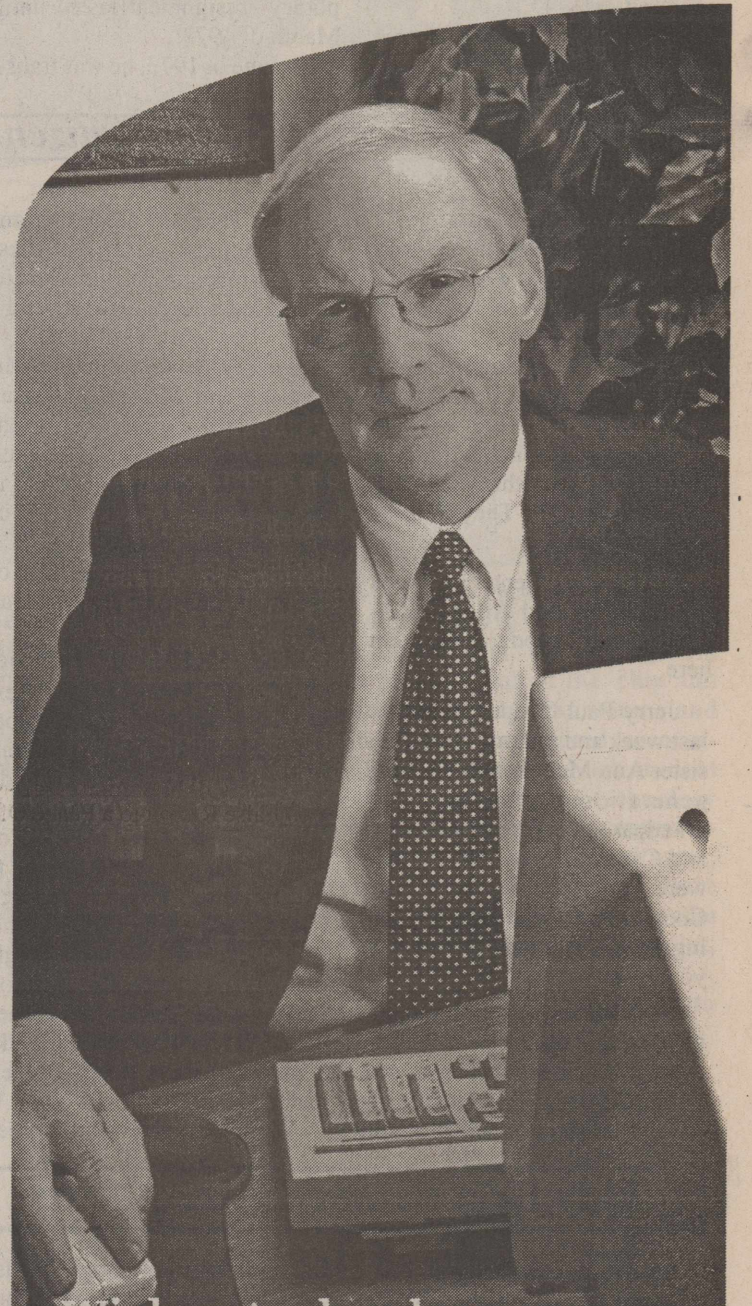
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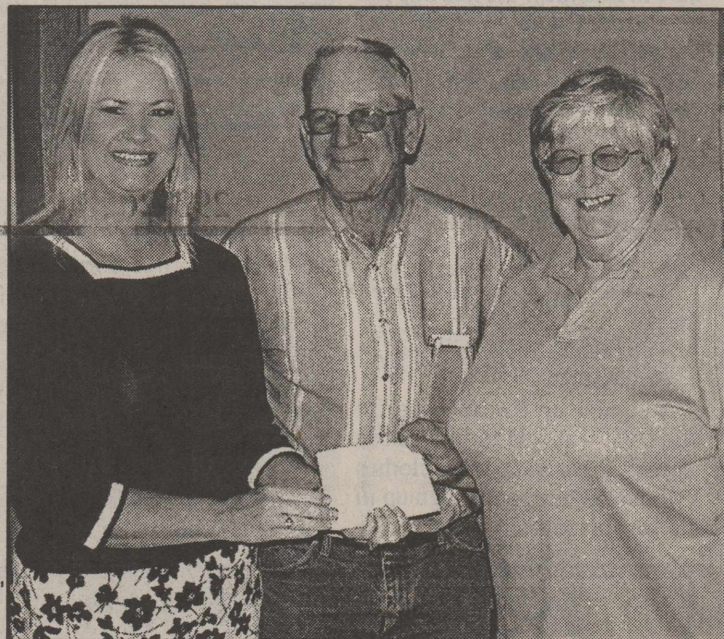

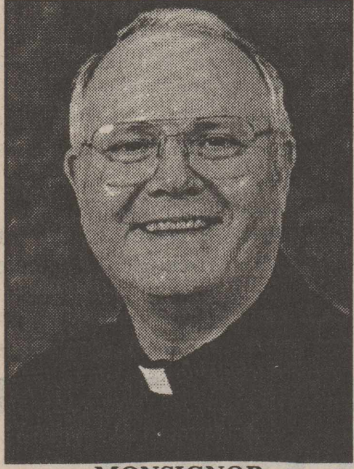
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## Monsignor Schwertner celebrates the 40th Jubilee of his Ordination

As Monsignor Tim Schwertner celebrates the 40th Jubilee of his Ordination, his family issues an open invitation for everyone to share in this festive event. Msgr. Tim will celebrate Mass at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, June 5, 2005 in St. Joseph's Church, Slaton, Texas. A reception will follow in St. Joseph's Hall until 5:00 p.m. It will be a time to renew friendships and thank him for his lifetime of dedicated service to others in all the parishes he's pastored.

Monsignor Tim Schwertner was born June 28, 1938 in west-

ern Lubbock County on a farm between Lubbock and Smyer. In January of 1946 his family moved to Slaton, joined St. Joseph's Parish, and he enrolled in St. Joseph's School along with his two older brothers.

After he graduated from the eighth grade, he enrolled in St. John's Minor Seminary in San Antonio. After graduation from high school in May of 1957, he applied to Assumption Seminary, also in San Antonio, the following September. After completing four years of college, and four years of Theology, he was ordained to the priesthood on May 30, 1965 in St. Joseph's Church, Slaton, Texas. He presided at his first Mass the following day - also at St. Joseph's.

Following a summer as a substitute, he was assigned to Sacred Heart Parish in Plainview as one of two associates, where he served for five years. In June of 1970, he was assigned to Holy Cross Parish in Post, with Blessed Sacrament mission in Wilson. St. Jude in Tahoka was added temporarily as a mission the following January. The "temporary" assignment lasted until March of 1973.

In June of 1973, he was trans-

ferred to Immaculate Conception parish in Muleshoe, with St. Mary Magdalen in Earth it's mission. He served there for six years.

In June of 1979, he was assigned to St. Michael's in Levelland, where he served for 13 years. During this time, he started a mission for the people in Sundown.

After the assignment in Levelland, he went to St. Alice in Plainview with mission San Jose in Lockney, where he served for the next six years.

In 1998, Msgr. Tim was assigned to St. Elizabeth's University Parish in Lubbock where he served for 3 years and 4 months.

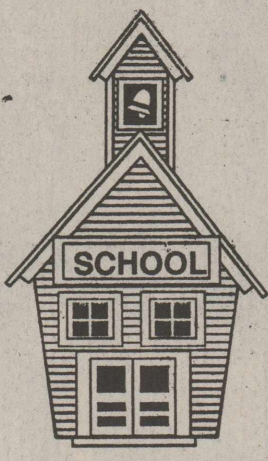
all three judges. They also will play three songs for the concert.

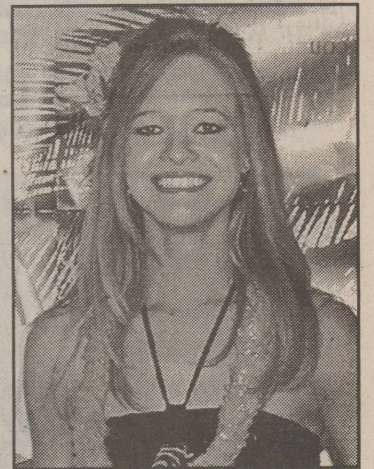

What has changed? That is the question officials at Plains Cotton Growers are asking themselves after learning, through third parties, that RMA was revisiting a deferred appraisal fix they had previously said could not be supported.

As if pulling their hands from behind their back with crossed fingers to say "King's X", RMA officials are now suggesting to solve the deferred appraisal problem by leaving the problematic deferred appraisal rule in place and taking away 8 days of the 15 day cotton late planting period for an unspecified number of counties located in Texas.

The deferred appraisal rule imposes a mandatory deferral period when planted acreage fails to establish a stand because seed has not emerged due to insufficient soil moisture.

PCG's concerns peaked following a May 4 House Agriculture Subcommittee hearing to review the Federal Crop Insurance Program.

During the hearing of the House Agriculture Committee's Subcommittee on General Farm Commodities and Risk Management, Lubbock-area Congressman Randy Neugebauer asked USDA Risk Management Agency Administrator Ross Davidson a question about the progress toward initiating changes to the deferred appraisal rule for the 2005 crop year.

Neugebauer noted that, after discussing the issue briefly with RMA Assistant Administrator David Hatch the previous week, he seemed to be getting mixed signals about how the Agency was proposing to deal with the problem.

He said, up until last week he understood that a compromise solution, developed jointly by PCG and RMA personnel, was moving forward but that now the Agency seemed intent on revisiting the concept of reducing the length of the late planting period that it has previously rejected.

In a good faith effort to develop a workable solution to the issue that protects the interests of both High Plains cotton producers and RMA, PCG officials traveled to Kansas City February 16 to work on the compromise solution.

A primary catalyst for the meeting was the Agency's previous decision not to support one of its own possible solutions—a shortened late planting period. This solution would have retained the current deferred appraisal rule without change, making it exactly what the Agency seems to now be considering.

So what has changed since the Agency last determined this op-

tion was unfeasible just this past December? With no communication from RMA to provide actual insight, PCG officials, and now members of the House Agriculture Committee, can only speculate that internally there are those within RMA thou would prefer to offer up an already rejected proposal, rather than seriously consider the compromise crafted by PCG and RMA representatives face-to-face.

In a nutshell, the PCG/RMA compromise solution amounts to a reworking of the current deferred appraisal rule to allow appraisal a the end of the 15-day late planting period for timely planted cotton, and also specify that acreage planted after the final planting date would not be appraised until after the end of an additional 8-day deferred appraisal period following the end of the late planting period.

Initially, RMA personnel worked to clean up the proposed language and develop a decision memorandum for consideration

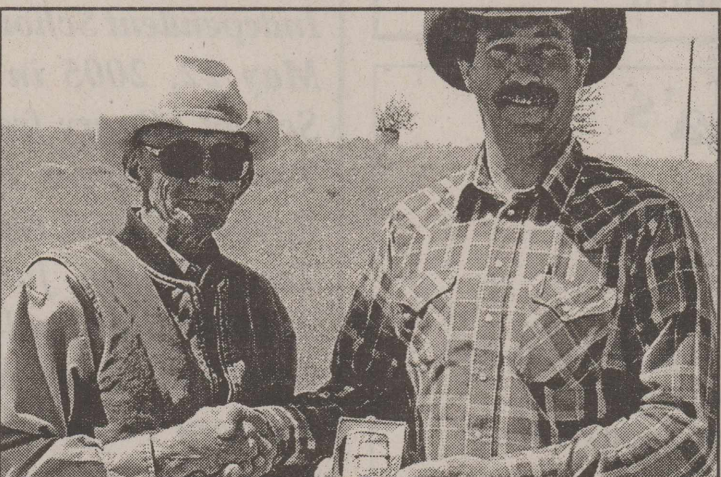
by RMA Administrator Ross Davidson. This process, however, seems to have been diverted at some level and the result is that a previously rejected option has been reincarnated like Mary Shelley's Frankenstein.

Of primary concern to PCG is that there now appears to be a significant weakening in RMA's resolve to find a solution that can be implemented for the 2005 growing season and provide an ongoing solution that allows producers to make timely farm management decisions and also maintains RMA's ability to provide actuarially sound risk management products for the U.S. cotton producer.

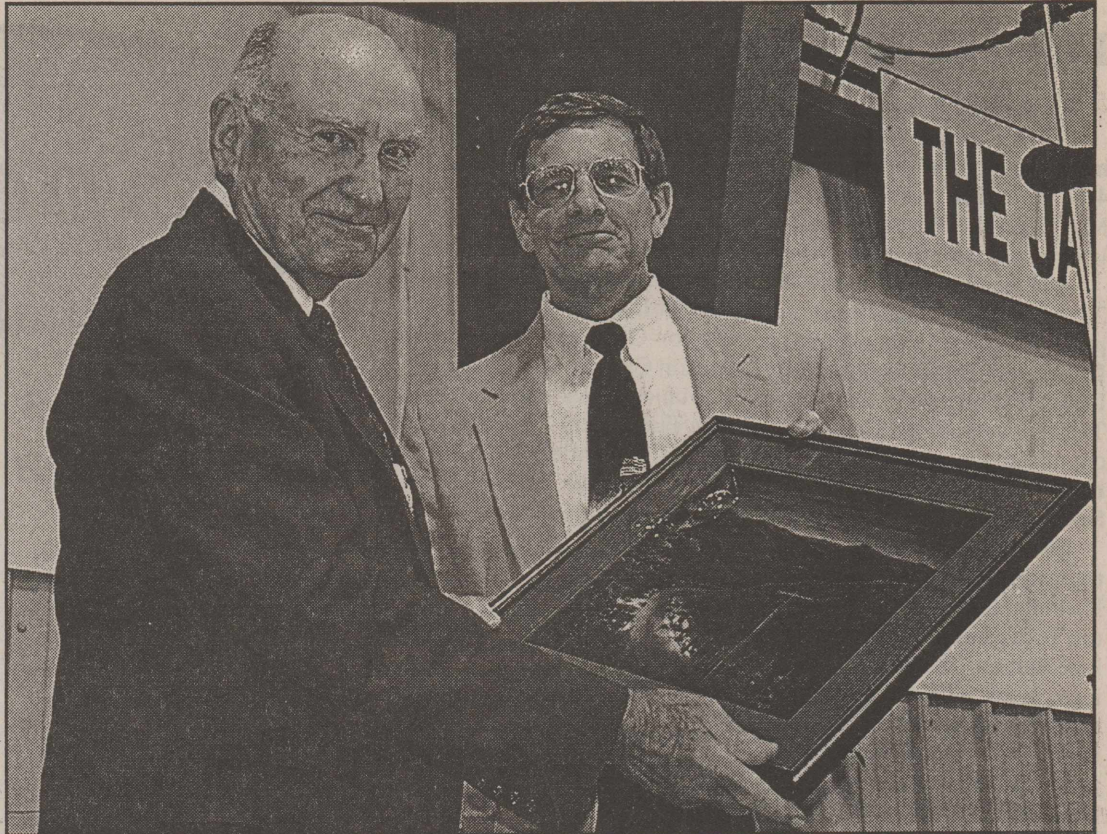

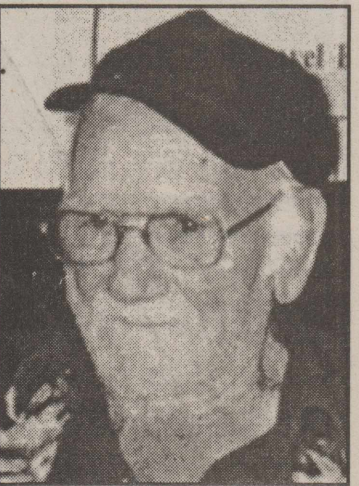
