## Tornados, hail, and flood hit County <br> By Alice Gilroy

Floyd County communities were hit by tornadoes, hail, and flooding Thursday night, May
12. Six tornadoes were reporte 12. Six tornadoes were reported
in the Hale and Floyd Counties area, but touched down in unpopulated areas and were mostly short lived.
The hardest hit area of Floyd County was the South Plains
community where high winds hail, and a confirmed tornado tore down power lines, broke out windows, uprooted trees, and destroyed Center Pivot Systems. The Providence community
received 10 inches of rain and up received 10 inches of rain and up
to 15 inches northeast of Providence.
Harlen Crume's home in the Providence community was un-
derwater. Water was wind derwater. Water was within 6
inches of pouring into windo inches of pouring into windows,
and neighbors gathered on Saturday to remove damaged furniture from the home. The house, built in 1956, has never been flooded.
Lighthouse Electric Member Services Director, Larry Ogden,
reported most of the damage to transmission poles occurred in the South Plains community. "We lost a line of transmission poles and distribution poles be-
tween Brett Marble and Danny Lambert's homes on Highway 207,"' said Ogden.
"We also lost a few poles one
mile north and 2 miles mile north and 2 miles east of the South Plains community between
Dwight Teeple and Glen Woods Dwight Teeple and Glen Woods homes.'

NASS releases final 2004 crop 2004 county production
This week's release of the 2004 Cotton Ginnings Annual Report and the last district level
2004-crop production estimate form the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) offers an insightful first glimpse into the composition of a record setting 2004 crop.
With state and national level NASS personnel tracking down
and pinpointing the county of origin of the last of the 2004 crop. Plains Cotton Growers officials are encouraging anyone con-
tacted by NASS to assist them in every possible way.
Without doubt the final tally for many Texas counties will be the highest ever recorded. Assisting the people who are respon-
sible for verifying the accuracy sible for verifying the accuracy
of those records is key to insuring every county gets full credit for the cotton produced within its borders in 2004 .
This week's Crop Production Report, which contained the last before final county numbers are released, gives an indication of just how big some of the totals will be.
Totaling the May 12 estimate for production in Texas Crop
Reporting Districts I-N and I-S indicates the High Plains region will be credited for producing at east 4.73 million bales of Upland cotton in 2004. That total could
climb slightly as NASS works to verify and assign cotton production at the county level.
At the state level, Texas is esfimated to have produced some 7.74 milinon bales of cotton in new all-time record production level and is an impressive 3.41 million bales more than the 4.33 million bales the state produce in 2003. The previous state tablished during the 1949 growing season. Another good indicator of how the county production fig-
ures will tun out is the final $2004-$ ures will tun out is the final 2004 aso released May 12. The primary contents of that report are county level ginning totals including to the greatest extent pos-
running bales of cotton w Highlights of the report in clude six High Plains counties ( Hale, 6-Lubbock, 7-Lamb, 8 Gaines, 9 -Lynn, and 10 -Terry)
ranked in the top ten, nationally based on current estimates of cotton running bales produced. The top four counties in this ranking include three in California (Fresno, Kings and Kern) and
Mississippi County Arkansas These figures reflect the All Cotton production total attributed to each county and do not differentiate between Pima and Upland cotton.
High Plains counties listed among the top ten in total number of running bales ginned are: $(469,700)$, Hale ( 457,150 ),
Gaines (411,600), and Lamb $(371,500)$.
Based on the figures published in the May 12 Cotton Ginnings report, the 4.73 million bale production estimate for th
PCG 41 county area appears to be right on target. Among the impressive run ning bale production figures reported for High Plains counties
