The CI Breeding and Genet ics Initiative was launched in
2002 by CI Vice President of ricultural Research Dr. Roy Cantrell to broaden the genetic base of available cotton germplasm lines and speed the industry's efforts to increas yield and fiber quality thr
genetic improvements. " Unique public germplasm has to be continually introduced to provide the genetic variation necessary to maintain genetic gain in yield potential and fiber quality," states Cantrell. "And germplasm lines is a very posiive first step."
Many growers would be surprised to know that the Cl Breed
ing and Genetics Initiative con ing and Genetics Initiative con-
stitutes the first direct involvement of the Cotton Research and Promotion Program in the development of new cotton germplasm outside of the producer directed State Support Program. In fact, prior to the and Genetics Initiative and the State Support Program, CI's in volvement in breeding and development of cotton varieties was
primarily focused on supporting basic breeding, cotton variety trials, crop management and some biotech research at Universities around the Cotton Belt. The focus of Cl is on the germplasm
side of the equation and not the technology side that is domi-
