A World War II torpedo was donated to the Texas Plains Veterans Association for the Veterans Memorial Park project in Lockney

Ed Marks, President of TPVA said, "We were able to find it thanks to the efforts of Senior Chief Gilmore at U.S. Navy Reserve Center in Lubbock. He put us in contact with retired Chief Petty Officer Guy Ross of Hobbs, New Mexico who was given the torpedo as a retirement gift. Ross has served as a torpedoman in a

Marks laughed at the thought of giving a torpedo for a retirement gift. "Most people would get gold watch," said Marks.

"It is inert and presents no port from the military," said Marks said.

Accrding to Marks, Ross had put the torpedo on his front lawn as a landmark to make his house

"Ross was soon visited by a bomb squad and the ATF," said Marks. "They all had a good laugh after learning it was inert.

"Ross was glad it would have a good home where it would be displayed as part of our military history.'

Marks used a 20 foot enclosed trailer belonging to the City of Lockney to haul the torpedo home. It is 19 feet 4 inches long, has a diameter of 20 inches and weighs 2,380 pounds.

Terry Ellison, Lockney's Junior High Principal since 1985, has been cleaning out his office and giving instructions to his replacement, Todd Hallmark.

Ellison announced his retirement from LISD in last month's school board meeting.

A native of Aspermont, Ellison graduated Asperment High School in 1963:

Ellison says he has loved every minute of his time as Lockney's principal. "I've loved it even in the bad times.

"I've tried to prove to the kids that I was only here for one reason and that was for them.

"I tell them I still have eyes and I still have a phone--all they have to do is call me if they need me."

Ellison said he has decided that about the time he finally figured out what to do, that it was then time to go.


"I just can't put how I feel on paper," said Ellison. "It just doesn't look right."

Shuttle display now at Museum

The Floyd County Historical Museum has a new display about the space shuttle that burned up over Texas a couple of years ago.

Eloy Martinez commissioned wood craftsman, Scott Phillips, to build a one-of-a-kind shuttle model, out of several types of wood, in remembrance of the STS-107 crew.

Martinez graduated from Floydada High School in 1968. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry from Texas Tech University.

Martinez is presently Senior Process Engineer at Lockheed Martin Space Systems Company. He is responsible for developing new process equipment and thermal shielding for the shuttles'

external fuel tanks. Scott Phillips resides Alabama and is a logistics engineer for Lockheed Martin at the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center.

Phillips started his wood working hobby 20 years ago. He has built 75 Space Shuttle models out of fine woods.

He documents each model to make sure he does not duplicate

The Space Shuttle model at the Floyd County Historical Museum is made of 11 different fine

Some of the woods contained in the model are mahogany, walnut, maple, cherry, poplar, holly, locust and hackberry.







High Plains Groundwater District releases annual depth to water measurements

The plentiful rainfall that blessed the High Plains, region with a bountiful 2004-cotton crop left a secondary and just as significant boost deep underground according to the high Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock.

Based on depth to water measurements conducted in early 2005 at more 1,207 observation wells located in the district's 6.8 million acres service area, 2004 reversed a three-year trend as water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer that underlies the region showed a net rise of 0.74 feet.

The change is attributed to reduced pumpage from the aquifer during the 2004 production season and HPUWCD officials caution that the reported water level rises during 2004, as indicated by the 2005 measurements, should not be interpreted as extensive recharge to the aquifer in most cases. They note the changes are more likely a result of greater leveling and refilling of dewatered zones within the aquifer in the vicinity of previously pumped wells.

The exceptions to this theory may be the area of southern Lynn County and various locations of Lubbock County, as well as other possible locations in the water district where the shallow depths to the water table may allow rapid infiltration of water to the works with farmers and ranchers aquifer.

Lynn County had the largest average annual change in water levels with an increase of 3.46 feet. Bailey County and the portions of Crosby and Floyd Counties within the district recorded average water level increases of more than one foot.

Cochran, Hale, Lubbock, and Parmer Counties, plus the portions of Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Hockley, Potter and Randall Counties within the district recorded average water level increases of less than one foot. The portions of Castro and Lamb Counties within the district recorded average water level decline of less than one foot.

Depth to water level measurements are normally made during January to March each year to allow stabilization of water levels in the aquifer following pumpage during the previous year of ground water production.

The current issue of the High

Plains Water District's newsletter, The Cross Section, features the results of the annual 2005 depth to water level measurements. It contains individual county maps, which provide the approximate location of each well in the district's observation well network. Each map is accompanied by available 1995, 2000, 2004, and 2005 depth to water level measurements for individual wells in that county. Also listed are available total changes in water levels for each observation well for the periods 1995 to 2005, 2000 to 2005, and 2004 to 2005.

Destroy cotton crop before you replant

Farmers on the High Plains of Texas know that crop damage from foul weather is one challenge they will have to contend

Recent storms in the area unleashed hail, high winds and heavy rains that caused significant damage to the emerging cotton crop of many growers. They must make a decision soon about whether to replant cotton or plant an alternate crop.

But before they plant an alternate crop, they need to do a thorough job of destroying remaining cotton plants in their fields, said Charles Allen, program director of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

"If High Plains growers fail their cotton before the certification date and keep it free of fruiting cotton plants for the remainder of the season, they qualify for a credit on their assessment," he

"They'll really help themselves if they do a thorough job of plowing down cotton plants in their fields before they plant another crop," Allen said.

Ensuring no viable cotton remains before planting the new crop, saves the growers money, Allen said.

If the cotton is not destroyed, it may grow back and provide a haven for the cotton boll weevil, he said. The weevils will feed and reproduce in the cotton and become a source for infesting remaining cotton fields.

Allen said foundation employees will continue to trap and monitor fields originally planted to cotton to ensure any hostable cotton or potential boll weevil populations are detected. If weevils are found, the fields will have to be treated, along with any adjacent cotton fields.

The new weevil populations and additional field treatments add to the total cost of eradication, he said.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation is a nonprofit, grower-initiated and funded organization dedicated to eliminating the cotton boll weevil from the state in the most cost-effective and environmentally responsible manner possible.

After trading lower Thursday, cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade finished the day Plains late Tuesday. The storm in positive territory as trade buying enabled futures to overcome and heavy rainfall and caused early weakness, traders said.

According to USDA, net export sales of 112,700 bales of evening storm dealt a second U.S. cotton in the week ended blow to some cotton producers May 28 were 70 percent less than south of Lubbock where an early the prior week and the four-week average. Major buyers included China, Turkey, Indonesia and Mexico. Net sales of 29,600 bales for delivery in 2005-06 were primarily for South Korea, Canada and Japan.

Export shipments of 257,000 bales were seven percent less than the previous week and nine percent less than the four-week average. Primary destinations included China, Turkey and Thailand.

In the spot cotton market, online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas were lower in the week ended June 2 as sales totaled 392 bales compared to the previous week when 1,618 bales were traded. One analyst credits the decrease to cotton producers, reluctance to sell at current prices. Average prices received by producers in the most recent week ranged from 37.28 to 40.56 cents per pound compared to 35.10 to 40.96 cents per pound the previous week.


