"The book will cover Floydada to San Diego," said Harberts. "The trip took 1 year and one month and covered zig zag miles of around 3,000 miles.'

A native of Statesville, North Carolina, Harberts started his trip on March 10, 2004 in Oriental, North Carolina.

'The original plan was to travel around North Carolina with a plow mule and write newspaper articles," said Harberts. "Then I was going to lead a life

of 'productive reliability" Harberts figured the trip would take 2 months.

"But there comes a time when the plan breaks down and the adventure starts," said Harberts.

Instead of just a trip across North Carolina, Harberts traveled across Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California.

Harberts said he reached the end of his journey to the Pacific Ocean on April 10th 2005.

Along the way Harberts recorded his journey with pictures and a journal. The stories were posted on his website: River Earth.com, and have become popular with the public.

"I get letters from everywhere," said Harberts. "And so do Woody and Maggie.

According to Harberts they encountered their worst weather in the Rocky Mountains.

"We set out too late and came to the Rockies in the winter. But it turned out to not be so bad because when we came to the desert it was still cool weather.

"In the Rockies my teepee Harberts has returned to the froze into a big ice cream cone and my olive oil jelled."

> "In Brownfield a man put a pony cart together for me. I got four Desert Command water jugs and took off. The cart and supplies got us across the desert."

> In California, on the last leg of the journey, a spooked Maggie caused the supply cart she was pulling to be wrecked.

Harberts recalls the incident on his website:

'The potato truck roared toward us and left Maggie with one decision, leap into the irrigation canal or rlunge down the road

"Maggie chose dust over drowning, took her buggy airborne and belly skidded to halt in the date palm grove.

'The truck billowed by a flattened Maggie and Woody just stared. She lay there in the dirt and palm fronds, wrapped in tugs and breaching like a poorly tied hay bale. Then out shot her front legs and up rose her tail and she was standing again.

"But the buggy ignored her lead. It just lay there on its axles, the port-side wheel busted to the heaven-side of repair.

"Oh and now the cursing really started. It made the sailor in me feel better but had no effect on the wreckage before me. Eighteen of the wheel's thirty-six spokes had been wrenched loose from the rim. I cursed and fumed and then counted again. Not a single lousy spoke had jumped back into its ragged hole.

"It was over. Maggie's faithful buggy, the one she'd sledded

"Then I set about salvaging


"What did I really need?

"I stuffed a few things into Maggie's saddlebag; the camera, my photos, my notebook, a clean shirt, a bit of rice and olive oil. Not much more.

"Then, to make sure the load was even, I weighed the saddlebags. The left one weighed nine pounds. The right one weighed

"The stuff that mattered in this journey had been reduced to under twenty pounds.

I tied the tipi and sleeping bag behind Woody's saddle along with some rope. Then I lashed a

"Every night I had to ask permission to sleep on someone's land or to be put up somewhere. "In the desert some people showed up with 150 pounds of feed for Maggie and Woody. They actually lost some weight when they finally got to California. They had been so fat."

Harberts says 1/3 of his book is already written.

"I'm retracing my trip as much as I can to jog some memories. I hope to have the book written by Christmas."

Harberts isn't quite sure what the title of his book will be, but he promises to let everyone know when it is completed.

"I thought about naming it, 'The People I Sleep With', but that was already taken. The working title now is, 'Too Proud to Ride a Cow".





Undaunted by damage caused by the South Plains tornado last May, friends, family and neighbors nevertheless held their annual "Breakfast with Mamie," June 8, 2005.

For example, there are nearly 5,000 different kinds of ladybugs and 400 of them live in North America, and the ladybug is one of the most beneficial insects. They consume huge numbers of plant-feeding insects.

Although most of the ladybugs in our neighborhood have red bodies with black spots, some have yellow or orange bodies with black spots and are able to "play dead" to protect them from predators such as birds. Most experts believe that birds won't eat insects that are dead or have these colorations since insects that are red and black or yellow and black usually stings or taste bad. Although not poisonous to humans, some ladybugs sting and in most species, when in the larva stage, can produce a distinctly felt nip on one's finger, if

By Sandra Lass and Vir- Aphids are the ladybug's favorite food. One female adult my consume 75 aphids a day while the smaller male may eat as many as 40 aphids. Now that's an appetite!

Those of us who have roses and other flowers are very happy to see ladybugs arrive in the springs. Virginia told us that a female ladybug will lay more than 1000 eggs in her lifetime and that the Asian ladybug can live up to 3 three years if conditions are right. Ladybugs hibernate during winter in protected places, such as logs, buildings or underground covering vegetation where many hundreds of ladybugs may cluster together.

Like bears, ladybugs feed on their stored fat during hibernation. And incidentally, all ladybugs are called ladybugs or ladybeetles as they are called in some parts of the world, even if they are gentleman bugs.

have sent Congress proposed legislation designed to bring several U.S. support programs into compliance with WTO rules, but significant changes to the U.S. cotton program could still be months away as Congress takes up the issue.

A key part of this legislative proposal is the USDA's announcement that it is recommending an immediate elimination of the Step 2 program. The Step 2 program is part of the three-step cotton competitiveness provisions through which the government compensates exporters and domestic mills that buy U.S. cotton. It is designed to keep U.S. cotton competitively priced with cotton from other parts of the world.

The U.S. programs that would be impacted by the proposed legislation were deemed non-compliant in the recent WTO Dispute Settlement Panel's findings in the Brazil-U.S. Cotton Subsidy case. The USDA proposal requires Congressional action to become permanent.

Last week USDA announced and implemented changes to the Export Credit Guarantee Program (GSM-102), the Intermediate Export Credit Guarantee Program (GSM-103) and the Supplier Credit Guarantee Program (SCGP) in accordance with the W'i'O appellate body's decision. Since that time USDA has also recommended that Congress pass appropriate legislation to immediately terminate the Step 2 cotton program.

Cotton industry groups, led by the National Cotton Council of America, have already voiced their opposition to the Administration's proposed timetable for removing Step 2.

The NCC continues to advocate a structured time frame for phasing out the Step 2 program that allows U.S. cotton merchants and textile manufacturers the maximum possible time to adjust during the course of 2005-crop marketing period.

Additionally, the NCC has recommended that Congress insist on a clear understanding of

Officials from the United Brazil's intentions regarding tates Department of Agriculture these issues before any change is made in the U.S. cotton program.

> "The process of complying with the WTO Dispute Settlement Panel's findings has entered a new phase," says PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett. "Now that the Bush Administration has sent a set of proposed changes to Congress, the efforts of the cotton industry will be focused on the development of a reasonable time-frame for terminating Step 2. The cotton industry has worked hard to find a way to retain the Step 2 program and has consistently disagreed with any plan that included the immediate termination of the pro-

> PCG officials will continue to work closely with the NCC and with the members of the House and Senate Agriculture Committees to craft a more reasonable

> termination schedule.' USDA's proposed legislation also includes changes necessary to make its previously announced modifications to the Export Credit Guarantee Program (GSM-102), the Intermediate. Export Credit Guarantee Program (GSM-103) and the Supplier Credit Guarantee Program (SCGP) permanent.

USDA's announced changes in the three export credit guarantee programs took effect July 1.

First, CCC has initiated use of a risk-based fee structure for the GSM-102 and SCGP programs. Fee rates are now based on the country risk that CCC is undertaking, as well as the repayment term (tenor) and repayment frequency (annual or semiannual) under the guarantee.

The new fees respond to a key finding by the WTO that the fees charged by the programs should be risk based.

Also, as of July 1, the CCC will no longer accept applications for payment guarantees under GSM-103.

Any remaining country and regional allocations for GSM-103 coverage under fiscal year 2005 program announcements will be reallocated to the existing GSM-102 program for that country or region.

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

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
