Bankers issues apology

Bankers and La Esperanza settle lawsuits out of court

The lawsuit filed by Bankers Petroleum against La Esperanza and the subsequent counter-suit by La Esperanza was settled out of court, Friday, July 22.

The details of the settlement are sealed but all claims were dismissed "with prejudice", meaning that neither side can address the issues again in a lawsuit.

Also part of the settlement was a "private and public apology" by Bankers president, Mr. Ford Nicholson, to La Esperanza Oil and Gas and owner Nancy

"In the hearing held in Floydada on Monday, July 18, 2005 it became apparent that due to misinformation and miscommunications, some claims were erroneously stated in Bankers' pleadings filed in the lawsuit. It certainly appears to me that the facts revealed at the hearing exonerate La Esperanza and Nancy Shockey from many of the alle-

gations of wrongdoing." Bankers also congratulated La efforts in the Palo Duro Basin ways for the most part." Bank-

"La Esperanza has successfully acquired 50,000 net mineral acres from a U.S. public company," said the apology, "then leased an additional 150,000 gross mineral acres beginning the summer of 2004 through March 2005, and then leased an additional 153,000 gross mineral acres in the Shale Play in Briscoe, Motley, and Floyd Counties."

Nicholson said Bankers' has the highest regard for La Esperanza achievements in the Palo Duro Basin Shale Play."

Bankers also "clarified" that the "net" acreage, mentioned above, totaled approximately 255,000 acres.

Both Bankers and La Esperanza will pay their own court costs

According to Raul Guerrero, title manager with La Esperanza, "Both companies will still be cooperating with each other but will not be partnered anymore. We

Esperanza on "its monumental will be going our own separate ers and La Esperanza will still be active in the Palo Duro Basin Shale Play and all past leasing agreements entered into with La Esperanza and Bankers will be honored according to Guerrero.

"La Esperanza will be expanding into other counties also," said Guerrero.

In the original lawsuit, filed July 6, Bankers had claimed a 'breach of contract" by La Esperanza.

La Esperanza denied all claims and sought damages of \$810,1663.27 from Bankers.

Both companies had also sought temporary restraining orders against each other.

Bankers is an oil and gas company "engaged in the business of exploring for and producing oil and gas. LEOG is an oil and gas company engaged in the business of leasing for oil and gas acreage within the area generally known as the Palo Duro Basin.'

The Lockney City Council met Thursday, 7-21-05 for their regular monthly meeting.

The final agenda item to be considered was a resolution to apply for a grant with Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas Capital Fund Downtown Revitalization Program. Ron Hall explained it was a \$135,200 grant requiring a \$14,300 match by the City. This also passed unanimously on a motion by Ham Gammage and second by J.D. Copeland.

Hall continued, "I will be needing letters from the downtown business owners explaining why they would like to see the sidewalks replaced and confirming what bad shape they are currently in by August 1.

Other routine agenda items were passed unanimously and the meeting adjourned on a motion by Ham Gammage and second by Junior Brotherton.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Rodger Stapp, City Administrator Ron Hall, Police Chief Jerry Edwards and Councilmen J.D. Copeland, Junior Brotherton and Ham Gammage. Also present were city employee Dickie McCarty and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.



The Lamplighter

We see by the Austin paper (in a piece by Mike Ward) where the Texas State Senate has voted to increase the pay of all sorts of judges substantially, and in the process increase their own retirement pay, substantially and incidentally. The Texas House of Representatives had previously voted to do the same thing, but minor differences remain between the two chambers, which will no doubt be ironed out quickly, since their own situations can be improved thereby.

In passing, however, it should be noted that David Dewhurst, the Lt. Gov. and leader of the Senate, says he will allow no conference committee votes until the Legislature takes care of the business for which the Governor called them together. That means they have got to come to some sort of agreement on taxes and school finance before they increase their own income.

The story noted that the present situation, that of tying the pay of judges, particularly District judges, to the retirement income of Legislators, started way back in 1991. When the pay of judges goes up, the retirement pay of Legislators goes up also, and has, since that time. Now

who do you think, gentle reader, was running the House of Representatives at that time, and had the genius to engineer such a thing.? If you don't know, we're not going to tell you, but you may, if you wish, call Pete Laney over in Hale Center and ask him. He was around during those years, and may remember. He may even return your phone call, if he doesn't know what you are call-

tion was, according to the story, authored in the Senate by our own Senator Robert Duncan, of Lubbock, who otherwise has a pretty good head on his shoulders. But Duncan is a lawyer, out of the law firm of Crenshaw, Dupree and Milam, or something like that, whom many of us supported despite the fact that he was, publicly, "advised" on politics by Karl Rove. Senator Duncan would normally do what he could to incur the good will of District Judges before whom he might be called upon to practice. Other lawyer-Senators are in a similar boat. The current situation is no exception, and as long as voters tolerate it, there will be no

Over the years, as long as the

present damnable situation has prevailed, certain people have advocated tying lawmakers' retirement income to school teachers income. I don't know why it has to be tied to anybody's salary, other than their own. Many people, including no few school teachers, have opposed that idea from the beginning. And the legislature, in its wisdom, is reluctant to adopt any idea that may have some organized resistance The present pay raise legislaanywhere in the electorate. That is merely a given. retirement income of state officials, of which Legislators are a part, are, for the most part, pegged to an involved formula that credits age, length of service, and pay schedules to retirement income, people like Speaker Tom Craddick down in Midland, would have drawn \$103,500 when he retires, but will now, obviously, get more. (He's been in the Legislature since 1968. Former House Speaker Pete Laney has been there a little less.) This is of course despite the fact that a member of the Legislature draws down only \$7,200 a year for what is supposed to be a parttime job, plus \$128 for every day they are in session. Reach, throw, then go

Contrary to what's portrayed in movies, drowning victims usually don't scream and splash when in distress - they just go

underwater. "When we encourage people to watch over your family near the water, we're encompassing several messages, including never swim alone, keep a close watch on friends and family in the water, and keep a constant eye on children," said Steve Hall, education director for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Hall recommends that groups or families assign one person to keep a constant watch on both adults and children in and near the water.

"It's especially important to be aware of hazards when you're on an open water body like a lake, river or bay," added Hall. "Someone who is a weak swimmer may be in the water at waist level and their next step could be a 10-foot drop-off."

rescue experts includes the steps, "reach, throw, then row."


The first step is to use a rope, tree branch or other object to try to reach the swimmer from shore. The next step is to throw something buoyant such a life jacket, inner tube or a plastic foam ice chest. If the first two steps fail, put on a life jacket and row out to the swimmer with a boat or a

"Unfortunately, we see many multiple drowning cases where folks go into the water to rescue a friend or a loved one who is drowning and they end up becoming a drowning victim as well," said Alfonso Campos, chief of marine enforcement at

"It's essential that you first try to help the swimmer using the reach, throw, and row method. If those steps don't work and you must go into the water because there is no other option, it's essential that you wear a life jacket, take a flotation device for the swimmer, and call for help or alert someone before you head into the water," he said.

Floydada Boy Scouts attend National Scout Jamboree

BOWLING GREEN, Va.

A July 24, 2005 AP story in the Washington times recently reported on the tent city that has sprung up on an Army base, an hour from Washington D.C., which will house more than 40,000 Boy Scouts, leaders and volunteers from around the world arriving for the 2005 National Scout Jamboree.

Floydada Troop 357 has 3 Scouts attending the Jamboree.

AP Reporter Michael Felberbaum quoted military spokesman Major Vince Mitchell, "It is extraordinary to see. If this was a city in the commonwealth of Virginia, it would be the seventh-largest city."

The story goes on to say "the temporary village, created every four years at Fort A.P. Hill since 1981, is in jeopardy because a federal judge recently ruled that the Pentagon can no longer financially support the event.

"If the ruling stands, the Boy Scouts of America would have to find another location for their next gathering.

"A lawsuit filed by the American Civil Liberties Union of Illinois contends that the Defense Department's sponsorship violates the First Amendment because the Scouts require members to swear an oath of duty to God. No other youth organization receives millions of dollars in government support, the lawsuit

"In exchange for getting the use of the Army training base, the Scouts have spent about \$20 million on base improvements that include road paving and plumbing upgrades. The Army uses the Jamboree as an opportunity to train its personnel in crowd control, communications and other logistical skills.

"It is our belief that what they do is not fund the Jamboree," said Robert Bork Jr., a spokesman for the Irving, Texas-based BSA. "It is not as if the military is writing us a check."

"Still, an estimated \$7.3 million in government money will be used to transport military personnel and goods to the base for this year's event, which includes a scheduled visit from President

Tips on Turf

Floyd County Cooperative Extension Service will provide helpful information to homeowners regarding lawn care or tree management. This week we'll discuss a simple method for evaluating your lawn's irrigation system. The following information is provided by Mr. Roger Havlak and Drs. David Chalmers and James McAfee with Texas Cooperative Extension. The following recommendations can be applied for automatic systems as well as traditional water hose and sprinklers.

Have you ever wondered if your irrigation system is placing water evenly throughout your landscape? Do you have areas in your turf that seem to remain rather dry compared to other sites in your lawn? Do you have any idea how many inches of water is applied when you irrigate for an hour? One method used to answer all of these questions is an "irrigation audit"

An irrigation audit is used to evaluate the performance of your irrigation system. By performing an audit, one can obtain an application rate (inches of water per hour) as well as the distribution uniformity of your system. It is a rather simple task to perform.

From time to time we the Just take several catch cans (i.e. tuna fish cans, cat food cans, dog food cans, etc.) and place them in one of your zoned areas. Place a catch can two feet from each irrigation head and one between irrigation heads. Turn on that irrigation zone for 15 to 30 minutes and measure the amount of water (inches) captured in the cans with a measuring tape or ruler. Record the values and obtain an average for all the can measurements. For example, if your average is 1/4 inch for 15 minutes, you would then have an application rate of 1 inch per hour for that zone. By drawing a diagram of your zone, you can also record the values for each head and see just how uniform the water is being applied to your lawn. Do this for each zone to evaluate your entire irrigation system. Make the needed adjustments to your system so that you can have an efficient and effective irrigation system.





Does the "Open Container" law apply when I'm in my

No. This law, effective Sept. 1, 2001, prohibits the possession of an open container of an alcoholic beverage in the passenger area of a motor vehicle. It does not apply to watercraft.

Can my driver's license be suspended if I'm arrested for operating a boat while intoxicated?

Yes. Effective Sept.1, 2001, a person's drivers license will be automatically suspended if the arrested person:

powered with an engine having a manufacturer's rating of 50 horsepower or more; and

*The person refuses to pro-

vide a specimen (breath or blood) to determine intoxication.

The period of suspension for first time offenders is 180 days.

Who reports boating accidents to your department?

It is the responsibility of the boat operator who is involved in the accident. Each operator must file a boating accident report if the accident:

*Results in death; or

*Injuries to a person requiring medical treatment beyond first aid; or

*Causes damage to vessel(s) or property in excess of \$500.
