Excellent growing conditions for the U.S. cotton crop and the anticipated increase in domestic and world cotion production con ained in USDA's Septembe fuel bearish sentiments in the market this week.
USDA's second objective as sessment of U.S. production prospects for $2005-06$ placed the bates, 991,000 bales more than he August forecast and just 968,700 bales shy of the recordbreaking 2004 crop.
In its re-evaluation of planted and harvested acreage, the demillion acres and the harvested acreage at 13.67 million, suggest ing an abandonment of just 3.5 percent of plantings. Estimated yield was raised 34 pounds per acre from A pounds.
Estimated production in the oullwest was raised by 1.13 milion bales to a total of 7.6 mil tion. The boost was primarily due the Texas crop. The area for harvest remained unchanged at 5.50 million acres in Texas, but yields were boosted 94 pounds to a to

Hurricane Katrina hit the Coast, have damaged well over 100,000 acres of cotton through a combination of hail and high winds. It will be some time before this most recent storm damage is fully evaluated and a final acreage loss figure is calculated
Of utmost concern to produc ers right now is that even though the crop report bears out what many are seeing in their fields, the 2005 crop still has ground to cover before that record break-
ing projection can be fully realized.
For the season it appears somewhere between 300,000 400,000 acres of cotton have been severely damaged or destroyed during the course of the 2005 growing season. Ironically, half or more of those losses may
have occurred the weekend of August 27 .
Due to the timing of the USDA survey process, it is likely that most of the losses from the weekend of August 27 , and certainly any losses that have occurred since that date, will not be
picked up until the next crop propicked up until the next crop pro
duction report is released.
