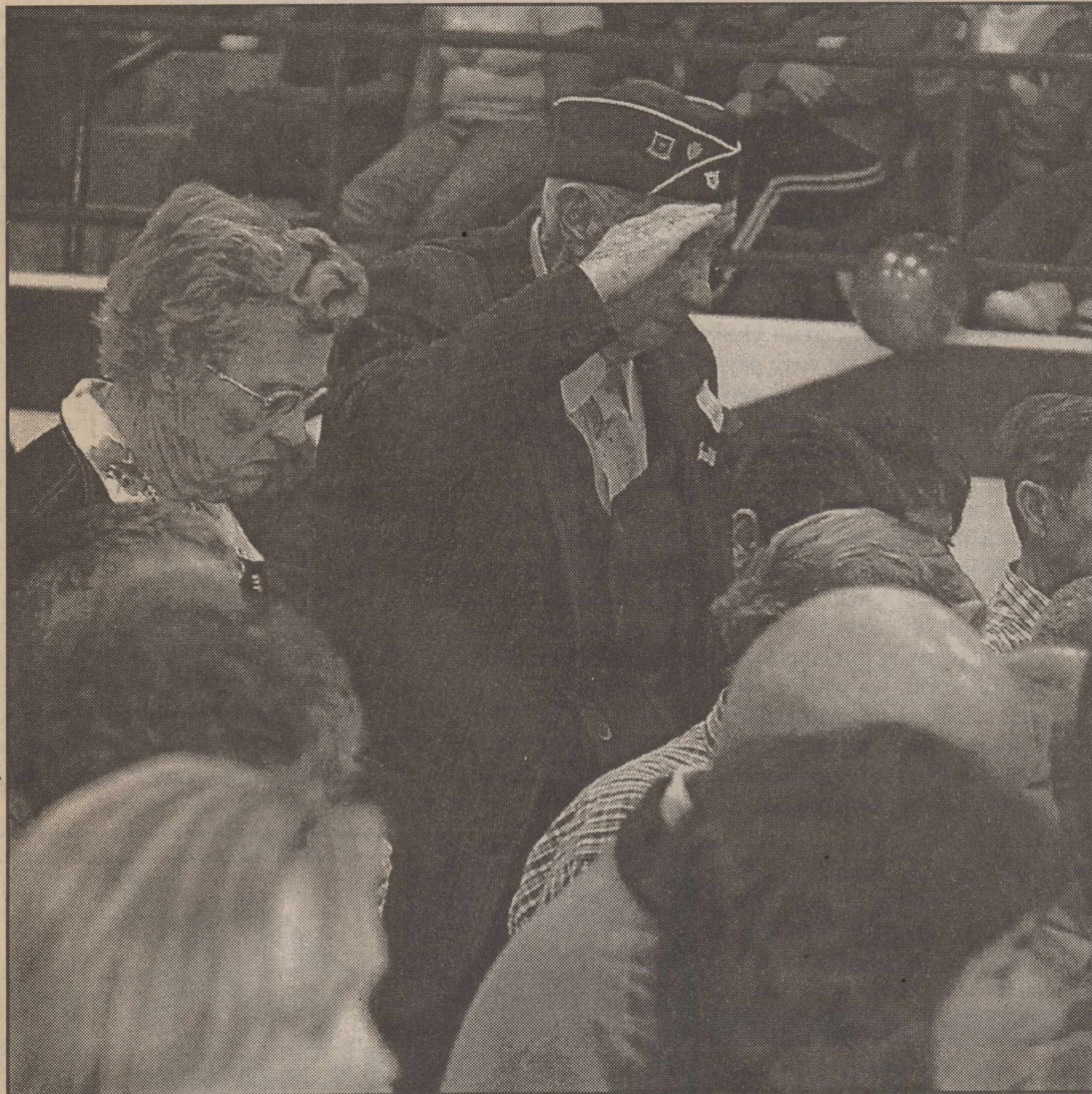

## FISD looks at cost of new wing at High School

The FISD Board met in regular session Monday, November 14, and heard a brief presentation from Burnett Hunt of Grimes & Associates of Wolfforth concerning FISD facility needs and a timeline for holding another bond election in November, 2006. Hunt told the board, "We must regroup and redevelop the overall scope of the work needed because of the rising fuel and construction costs. It is very tough right now to give you some exact dollar figures, but we hope to be more accurate at your next meeting." According to Hunt, instead of constructing a complete new building, as planned in the previously failed bond election, "Now we want to add a new facility (west wing) to the high school's west court yard, making room for the junior high (students). We hope to make your dollars go as far as they can with

## Palo Duro Basin Oil and Gas Update

**Floyd County:** Apollo Energy Operating Company L.P. W.D. Miller Lease Well #1 has been perforated and the operator is evaluating further stimulation plans.

**Floyd County:** Apollo Energy Operating Company L.P. Ceretha Watson Lease Well #1 last Friday lost circulation at 5252 feet. On Tuesday were drilling ahead at a depth of 7100 feet.

**Floyd County:** Apollo Energy Operating Company L.P. has staked a new location in the South part Section 24, Block 1, AB&M Survey. This well will be a South offset to the Miller #1. Apollo Energy Operating Company has announced that this well will be the Miller #2 and will be permitted as a horizontal completion. Building the location began on Tuesday morning and Apollo Energy Operating Company plans on moving the Grey Wolf Drilling Rig #861 to this location when the rig is finished on the Ceretha Watson #1.

**Floyd County:** BASA Resources, Inc. Foster Lease Well #1 reached total depth of 9750 feet. Last Thursday the well was logged. On Monday, November 14 7 inch production casing was set to 9521 feet. Patterson-UTI Drilling Rig #494 was rigged down on Tuesday and was moving to a location in Kent County.

**Motley County:** Tyner Texas

Operating Company reported that the R.G. Stephens Lease Well #1 was perforated in the upper and lower sections of the lower Penn Shale. Reported upon perforated 156 feet of the upper section of the Lower Penn Shale that R.G. Stephens #1 flowed gas to the surface, the bottom hole pressure was 3027 pounds per square inch. A packer was set to isolate and test the upper section of the Lower Penn Shale. Reported test results were: Open Flow Test - 1500/mcf a day of gas and 37 1/2 barrels a day of condensate at 20 pounds flowing tubing pressure; 1 Inch Choke - 1000/mcf a day and 25 barrels a day of condensate at 50 pounds flowing tubing pressure; 25/64 Inch Choke - 400/mcf a day of gas and 10 barrels a day of condensate at 100 pounds flowing tubing pressure (from Tyner Resources Ltd. November 7, 2005 news release). The upper section of the Lower Penn Shale was then fraced. As of Tuesday morning were swabbing back frac fluid.

**Patterson-UTI Drilling Company:** Rig #494 is moving from the Palo Duro Basin to Kent County to drill a horizontal re-completion. Rig #494 is tentatively scheduled to return to the Palo Duro Basin in about three weeks, after the Kent County job, and will continue drilling Floyd County.

The Los Angeles Times, which normally keeps pretty close tabs on Middle Eastern affairs, had a report recently we saw nowhere else, and quite frankly we are somewhat skeptical. But if true, it is most interesting, and perhaps even beneficial for the USA. It said, in effect, that Jordan's intelligence network has supplanted Israel's Mossad as our CIA's favorite working partner.

We would hasten to say we read the Los Angeles Times report in the Israeli newspaper Harretz, which reported the matter and gave the LA paper credit, specifically one Michael Scheuer, a recently resigned CIA agent who has been interviewed, along with many others on the subject.

Mr. Scheuer said our CIA and the Jordanian General Intelligence Directorate, have become closer since the Twin Towers attack of 9/11 in New York City. They became even closer, said the former CIA agent, following reports of leaks from American intelligence circles indicated this country has practiced torture on certain captives. Israel has traditionally followed those practices, and even their courts have voiced approval. (It perhaps should be noted that certain U.S. Senators have used the spun version of Is-

raeli behavior to criticize U.S. policy on the same subject.) The story hinted, but did not vouchsafe, that the former closeness between CIA and Israel's Mossad had something to do with both the practice and the change in working relationships.

At any rate, in our opinion, the change from Israel's Mossad to Jordan's GID in the buddy-ranking department, may have rather significant implications for the United States. For many years the CIA and Mossad have been like two peas in the same pod. It was not necessarily a matter of the CIA believing Mossad was so terribly much better in Middle Eastern intelligence matters, it was simply the realization by CIA that they had to pay attention to Mossad because of certain U.S. Senators. Besides, we were paying the Israelis big bucks to provide us with the intelligence, even if what they provided us was wrong.

If, now, following many fiascoes in the Middle East where Israeli intelligence figured so highly, the CIA has begun to downgrade the Jewish intelligence network as it relates to the Muslim world, we will be a lot better off. They, (the Mossad) after all, have had an axe to grind, and American servicemen and taxpayers have paid the price.

Not that Jordanian intelligence will be a big improvement over Israeli intelligence. But at least Americans should now know how the people furnishing the intelligence feel about the bottom line. The Israelis have, for many years, done all they could to get the U.S. involved in Middle Eastern matters on their side. A sufficient number of religious leaders and lobbyists have supported that effort, and a sufficient number of Congressmen have been most supportive of those efforts. Fortunately, not all.

The vast majority of American citizens are reduced to getting information about Middle Eastern affairs from either the White House or Congress. In either case, a very, very, few are more concerned about the people back home than they are about campaign donations from certain interests, or, from what now passes as "the media," organizations increasingly concentrated in the hands of special interests.

The idea that members of the CIA are some sort of superior beings, endowed with higher intelligence and nobler spirit, is just so much hogwash. We lived in a nest of CIA agents in McLean, Virginia, not far from the Agency's headquarters at Langley. One of your Editor's

closest friends as a little girl, was the daughter of the guy who finally pieced together the so-called Ho Chi Minh trail, a network of various trails from North Vietnam, through Laos and Cambodia into South Vietnam. The CIA folks were regarded, rightly, as bureaucrats like most others who inhabited the warrens around town. In practically every case, we knew who worked for this agency, or that agency. There were talkative ones, and quiet ones. There were some who regarded their stint with CIA as the high point in their career. There were others who could hardly wait until their 20 years were up so they could depart. In short, most of those I knew in my 14 years at that location were just about like anybody else. Sometimes right, sometimes wrong.

But they were not paid to be in doubt, even if that meant scrounging for information anywhere they could get it. And the Israelis, having been at that game much longer than we, knew how to fill any void, or, when necessary, make sure a void did not exist. Their goal is obviously the same as any people's goals ought to be...self-perpetuation. Now, if the third-hand, leaked, story is true, Israelis will have some competition from Jordan when it comes to filling that void.

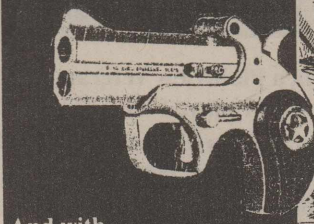

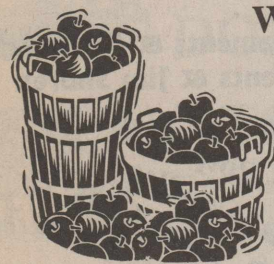

Mr. Baxter will be honored with a 100th Birthday Party at Main Street Church of Christ, Lockney on Saturday, November 26, 2005, 2:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. The families of Roy and Linda Kidd and Bob and LaVonne Baxter welcome their community family and friends to join them in this centennial celebration.

Clyde Baxter has begun celebrating his 100th birthday early with a visit from his 92 year old brother, Ernest Baxter of McKinleyville, California; Ernest's children, Leota Lovelace of McKinleyville, Margie Knight of Roseburg, Oregon and Bill Baxter and wife Opal of Branson, Missouri. Mr. Baxter also has a nephew, Junior "Bud" Brotherton and his daughter Renee Armstrong and family who live in Lockney.

Another niece, Floy Baxter Lancaster of Duncan, Oklahoma

was also here visiting. She is the daughter of the late Bascum Baxter.

Mr. Baxter was born to John Henry and Sara Jane "Miss Jenny" Baxter November 27, 1905 in the town of Gunter which is in Grayson County, East Texas. J.H. and "Miss Jenny" migrated from Hopkins County in East Texas to the South Plains area to homestead near Muncy in the 1920's. They subsequently relocated to the Lone Star area.

Mr. Baxter is the oldest of seven children born to the Baxters; Clyde, Bascum "Smiley", Ernest "Stompy", Horace, Lena Baxter Brotherton, Beula and Florence.

He and Ernest are the only surviving siblings. Ernest is 92 years old.

Clyde attended schools in Muncy and Lone Star then graduated from Silverton High School. He reminisced, "I remember living with Ma Quinlan and work-

ing at her restaurant for room and board while going to school at Silverton. The restaurant was attached to her house, and I slept on a pallet on 'the dirt floor.'"

His first job was running a road grader pulled by a tractor.

He married Alma Jarboe in Lockney, July 24, 1930. They were married 67 years before her death. They had two children, Linda, married to Roy Kidd of Lockney and Robert (Bob), who is now deceased. (He was married to LaVonne Priddy.)

Mr. Baxter now resides in the Lockney Health and Rehab Center.

Ernest remembers his older brother as, "Being as good of an older brother as I was a younger brother. I remember staying with Clyde and Alma at Aiken and baling hay for \$1.25 a day--- and they were twelve hour work days. I always knew I had a place to stay if I needed it. When dad was run over by a car, December 26, 1949, Clyde had to be in charge of the farm."

Clyde and Ernest reminisced about the cart drawn by two mules, Judy and Dinah, that their dad customized for them to drive the five miles to school at Lone Star.

Their dad built a covered top on the cart so the children would be protected from the weather. "Clyde, who was about 13 years old at the time, would drive the mules for us. We would stop and pick up other children on the way to school when the weather was bad," said Ernest. "We would remove the harness when we arrived, then stake out the mules to graze until time to go home."

The J.H. Baxter homestead sold in 1947.

Clyde and Alma farmed the Jarboe homestead as well as other places in the area. They farmed at Aiken, then at their homestead at Lone Star, before moving into town.

## FISD discuss options for facilities' needs

the bare minimum for construction."

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn added, "We have met twice with the school board recently paring down and cutting down (excesses) and setting goals for the school district. We plan on meeting with Vince (Vialle, of Grimes & Associates) after Thanksgiving to look at our options and the one that will fit our finances. We want to look at the overall scope before we go to the bond election."

Hunt concluded, "By conjoining your campuses, four into two, you will save \$400,000 per year. We will factor that into the plan, revisit and look at your elementary needs. This will help you make your final decision."

No action was taken and the next FISD board meeting will be December 8, according to Vaughn.

In a related matter, the board was presented the monthly financial report by Business Manager Sharon Rainwater. The report showed General Operating funds at \$2,077,880.09, with a 365 Day CD at First National Bank of Floydada at \$3,387,000 (designated for facilities, according to Vaughn), and a 90 day CD at FNB at \$1,500,000.

A Cash Flow Statement showed a Current Cash Balance (overall) at \$7,032,169.56, with a Fund Balance at \$5,492,150.97 as of 9-1-05.

"We estimate our cash flow increase to be \$266,779.88 (this school year). However, with our student count dropping and our cafeteria overtime, it is hard to

estimate," said Rainwater.

Rainwater also gave a Tax Statement showing \$1,205,949.25 collected from the Current Tax Roll of \$2,177,230.78. This is 55.42 percent collected, compared to 36.35 percent collected last year at this same time.

The board discussed a parking lot repair and re-graveling estimate, by Butch Finkner of Petersburg, to plow up and repack the Field House parking lot just north of the Whirlwind Gym.

The estimated repair cost of the north one-third of the parking lot was \$18,768 without a 4" caliche base, and \$24,768 with a 4" caliche base. The south two-thirds estimated repair cost was \$30,600 without a 4" caliche base, and \$43,834 with a 4" caliche base.

Vaughn said, "There are many ways we can do this. We have several options."

Board President Bill Dean said, "I think we should put as little into this as we need to until the bond election."

Board Member Bart Greer said, "Maybe we could just fill the holes at the entrances with caliche for now."

No action was taken and Vaughn concluded, "Okay, we will just patch it up."

Also, no action was taken on the purchase of electronic voting machines for the school district. Superintendent Vaughn recommended no action to be taken now. "Maybe we can share some machines with the county. Our minimum cost in this will be over \$10,000. We need to know the rules for upkeep, programing and

the cost for the years to come. How long is the life of these machines?, asked Vaughn.

The board unanimously approved May 13, 2006 as the date for the School Trustee Election.

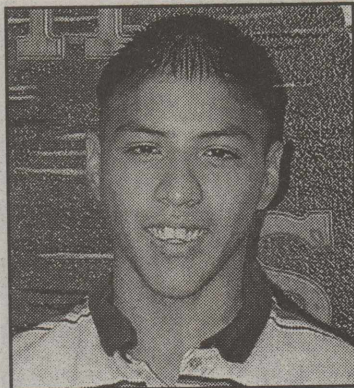
The board approved a 2005-2006 budget amendment of \$70,000 to be added to the cafeteria budget. "Our revenues are dropping and our expenses are going up. We have lost students this year and we are running four cafeterias. In our last bond election, we had plans to eliminate two of our cafeterias by consolidating campuses," said Vaughn.

The board passed, in a split vote, a recommendation by Vaughn to seek a "wajver" to start classes on August 16th, or 17th, for the 2006-2007 school year, before Austin passes a mandatory start date, according to Superintendent Vaughn.

Board Members Amado Morales, Lyle Miller, Jill Warren and Bill Dean voted for the motion, while Board Member Bart Greer voted against the motion. Board Members Rachael Castillo and Kerry Pratt were absent from the meeting.

The board approved a request by the City to tear down a house and remove trash from Lots 11 & 12, Blk 24, Original Town, at 416 W. Lee Street, Floydada.

Also, approved by the board were: FISD Head Start policy committee bylaws, a new credit card limit of \$50,000 by employees and signed by Superintendent Vaughn or Business Manager Rainwater, and the resignation of teacher-assistant Randi-Jo Covington of FJHS.

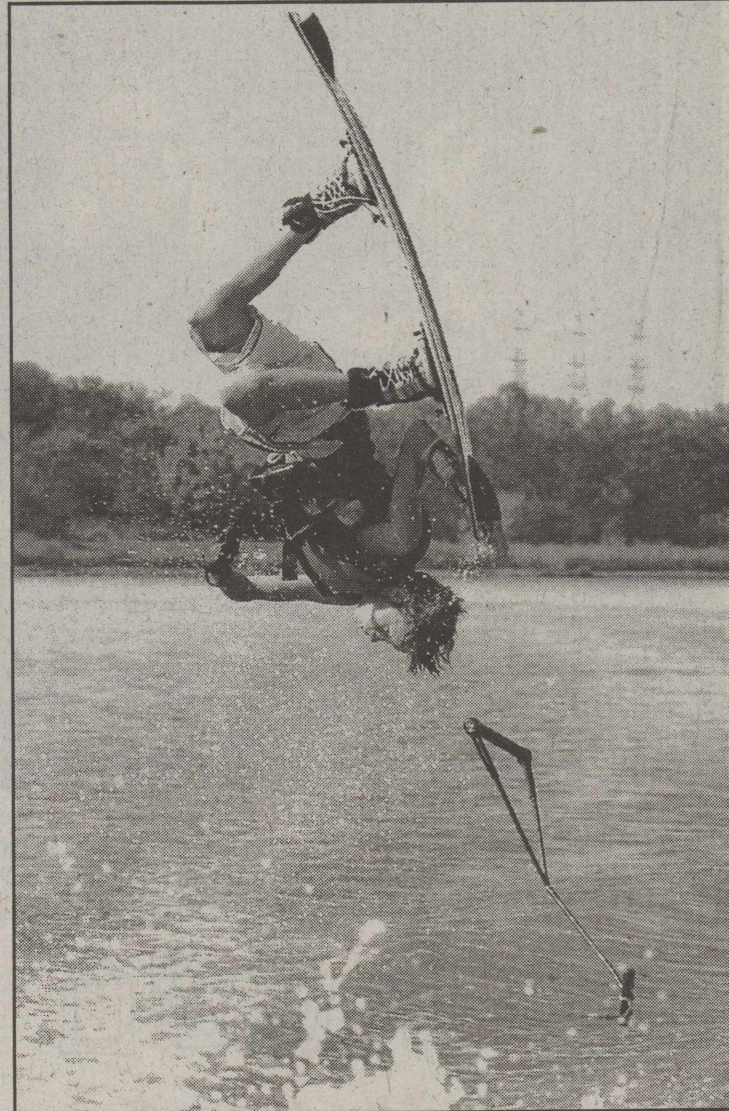
## Perez placed 15th at State

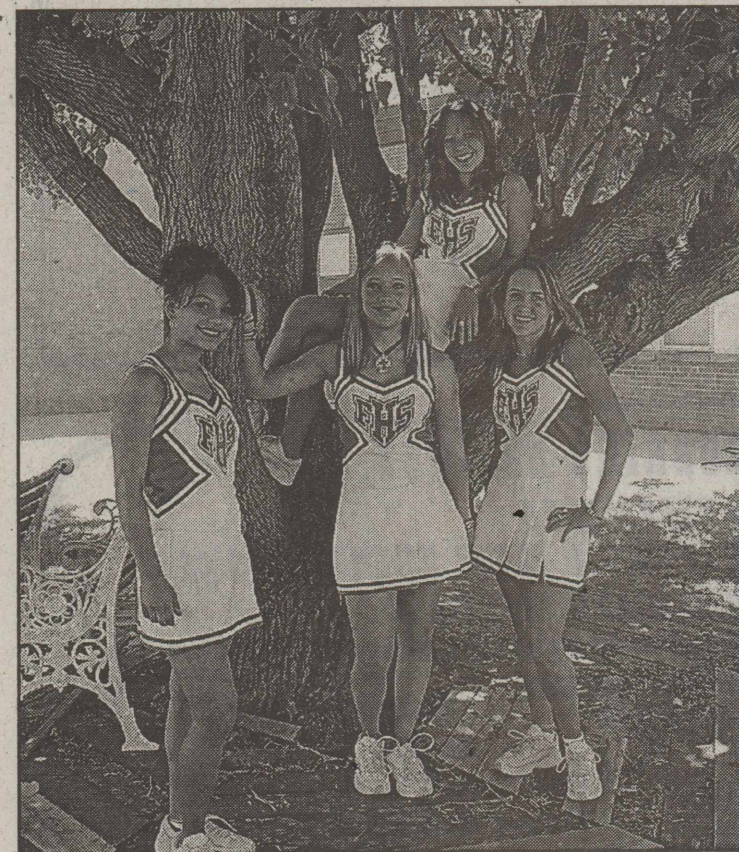
The intermediate division was 15 and under.

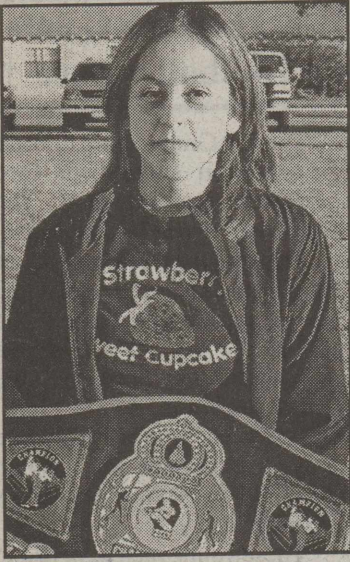

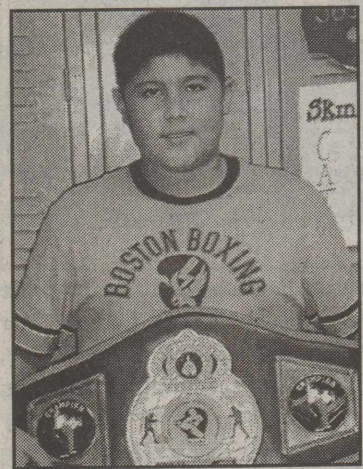

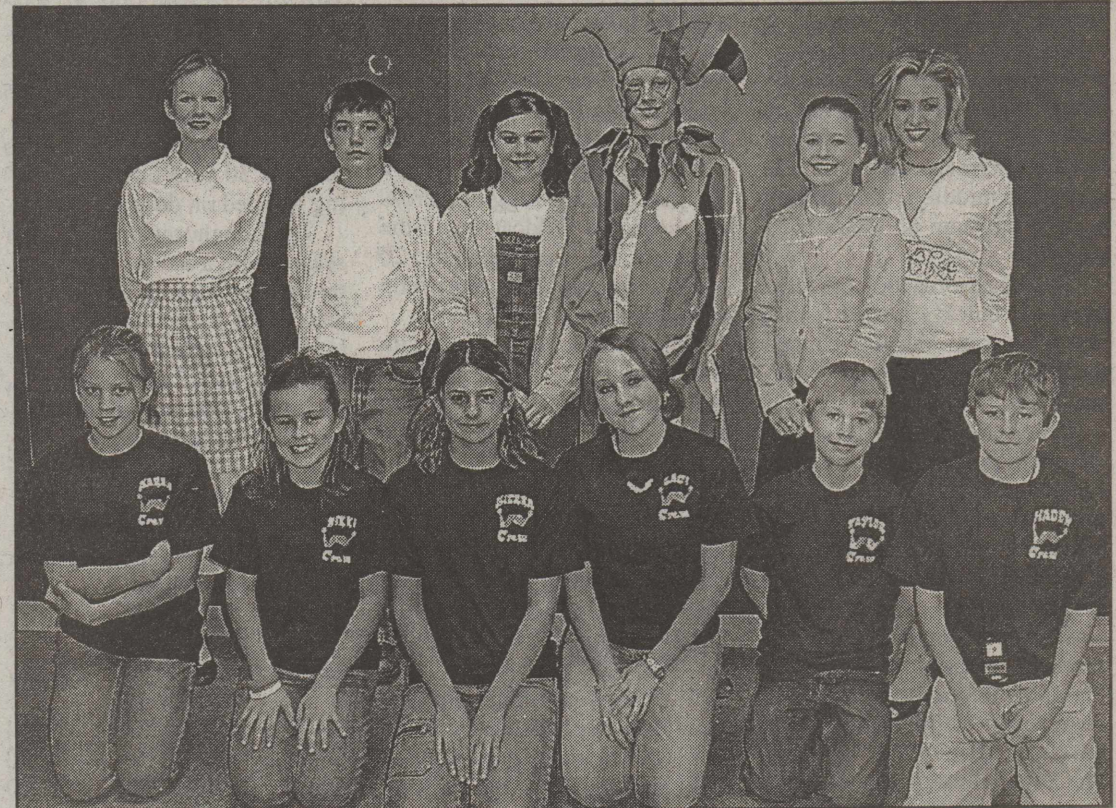

## Longhorns come up short against Idalou

The Lockney Longhorns met the Idalou Wildcats in a Bi-District rematch in Plainview last Friday night. The Wildcats came in to the game ranked high in the state. Idalou defeated Abernathy 20 - 3 for the District 5 - 2A Championship the week before. On paper, Idalou appeared to be the heavy favorite.

The Longhorns took advantage of the underdog role in the first quarter. Lockney came out on fire to start the game, and Idalou came out flat. They also took advantage of a strong South wind. The wind was a major factor in all playoff games around the South Plains. Lockney won the coin toss and elected to defer. Idalou started their first possession on their 19 yard line. Rion Aufferl took the air out of Idalou's drive when he tackled Weston Sales for an 8 yard loss. Idalou was forced to punt and the field position battle was underway.

Lockney's opening possession started near midfield, but the Horns were forced to punt as well. Idalou then took to the air, but Jon Sherman broke on a pass across the middle giving the ball back to his team on Idalou's 31 yard line.

The Longhorns took the turnover and quickly turned it into points as John Vasquez capped the drive with a five yard touchdown run.

Idalou tried some trickery on their next possession. However, Jonathan Silva snuffed out a reverse and made a tackle for a loss forcing the Wildcats to punt back to the Horns. Wes Davis caught the short punt and made some fancy moves to return the ball 25 yards to Idalou's 15 yard line. The Longhorn offense found the going tough against a stout Idalou defense all night. Dahlen McCarter attempted a 25 yard

field goal that split the uprights giving the Horns a 10 - 0 lead to end the first quarter.

The first quarter was all Lockney's. The second quarter was all Idalou's and then some. The quarter started off with both teams trading punts. On Idalou's second possession, the Wildcats (with the wind to their back now) reached the endzone making the score 10 - 7 with 6:26 to go in the half.

Lockney was again forced to punt into a strong headwind. The Longhorns had done a remarkable job of bottling up Idalou's heralded tailback to this point. However, Weston Sales broke through the left side of the line and sailed down the sidelines for a 54 yard touchdown. This gave Idalou the lead 14 - 10 with 4:38 left in the second quarter.

With the clock winding down, the Horns put together a drive that took them into Idalou territory. However, Idalou's AJ Bravo stepped in front of a Blaine Hall pass and returned it to midfield before he was forced out of bounds. On the very next play, Idalou's quarterback hit a wide open receiver in the flats. After a 51 yard run zig-zagging across the field, the Wildcat found the endzone. The score swelled to 20 - 10 with only 1:19 remaining before halftime.

The second half started with the Longhorns receiving the kickoff and heading South into the wind. The Horns were once again forced to punt.

Idalou took the ball at the 50 yard line. After driving deep into Lockney territory, the Wildcats were turned away on fourth down when John Vasquez came up with a tackle behind the line of scrimmage on the 7 yard line.

The Longhorns moved the ball away from the endzone trying to gain some field position. A Tyler Kidd punt gave the ball back to

Idalou on their 45 yard line. Shortly after, Rion Aufferl recovered an Idalou fumble. The Longhorns came up with a critical stop on that possession because the Wildcat's time with the wind to their back was running out.

On the following possession, Lockney could not manage to get anything going. They were forced to punt for the seventh time in the game.

It is generally known in high school football that when it is extremely windy, the team that can score going into the wind will usually win the game. Neither team had done so at this point in the game. All scoring had occurred in the North endzone.

Idalou had the ball at their 30 yard line to start the quarter. They kept the ball out of the Longhorn's hands with a 70 yard drive that ended with a 3 yard touchdown pass. The score was now 27 - 10 with only 4:19 remaining in the game. The time consuming drive gave Idalou a three score lead and more or less clinched the game.

Lockney moved the ball to Idalou's 30 yard line before being stopped on downs.

The Longhorns finished their season with a 5 - 6 record. Although they came up short in their final ballgame, the 2005 Lockney Longhorns had a season to be proud of. Thank you seniors for your wonderful leadership throughout your career. You exemplified B.O.B. with your closeness to each other. Your example of effort and determination is your legacy that you have left behind.

The 8th Grade Football team turned their shorthorns into Longhorns last Thursday. The Horns pulverized Friona 30-12.

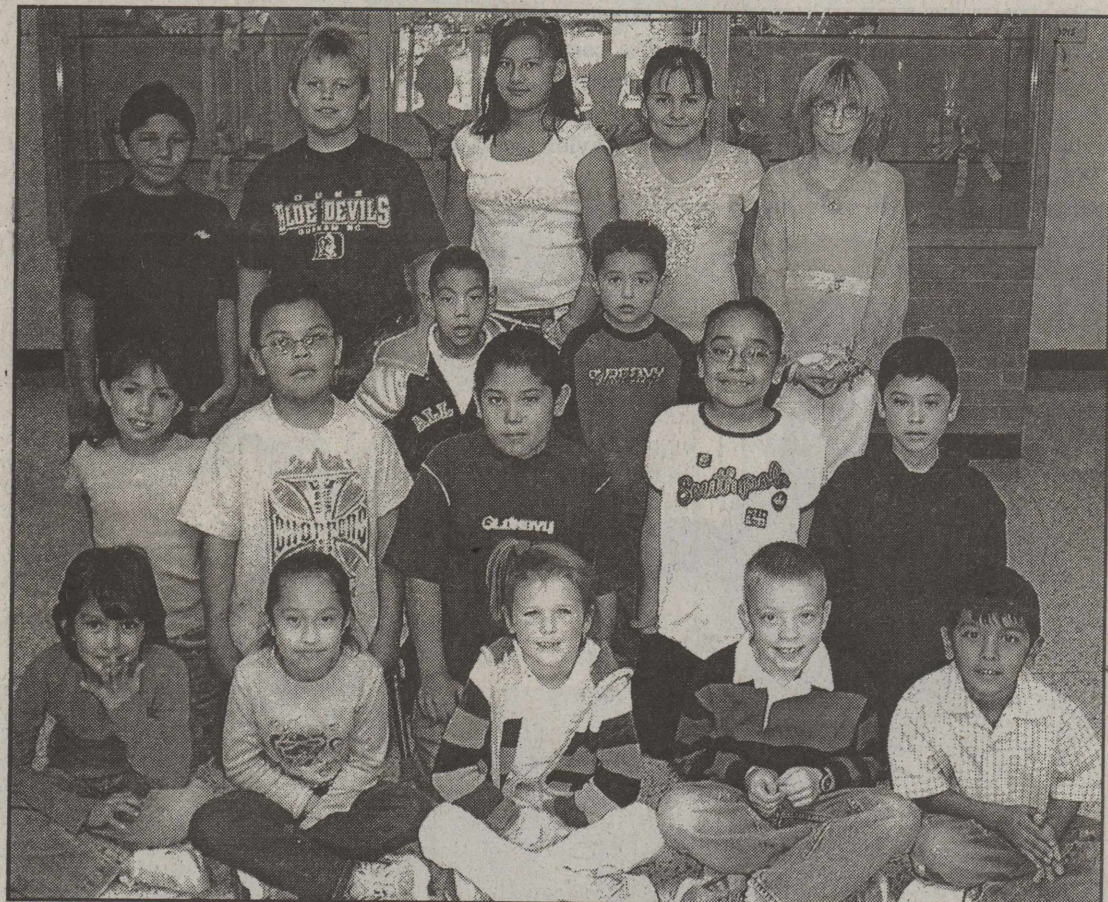

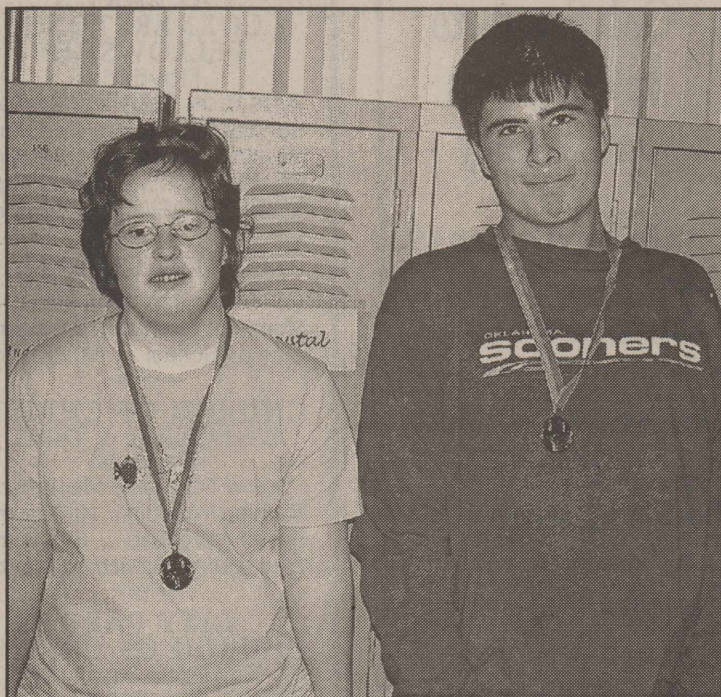
