down to over 4,000 meals a day by the end of the week. The group prepared lunch and dinner each day for the hurricane victims of Orange and the surrounding area. The volunteers stayed in the local Baptist Church's Family Life Center, sleeping in the gymna-
sium. the back parking lot of the Church. We had semi-truck parked around us, some with re with gallon size cans of food for pur use," said Ford. "We had an air compressor powered can opener which could open a one gallon can in two seconds flat!" "Our group had one head cook and the rest of us were flunkies who stirred, poured, washed
dishes and followed orders," Ford laughed. "We started cooking at 7:00 a.m. each morning for the noon meal, which we had to have cooked, and placed in large containers called cambros by
10:30 a.m. The evening meal had 10:30 a.m. The evening meal had to be cooked and in the cambros
by $3: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$ in order for the Red Cross to load them in their box truck and make the deliveries by meal time."
erything about the disas ter relief kitchen had to comply with Health Department rules kept at or above 160 degrees and we all wore gloves. The dishes, pots, utensils, etc. all wen sanitize is sanitize again," Ford said.
"Of course it was hard but we laughed and had fun, too. We came to jokingly refer to the giant utensils we stirred food with as our oars, because they reminded us of metal oars for rowing," Ford laughed. "Our

## The Lamplighter

A political flap has emerged over just exactly how America
entered the war against Saddam entered the war against Saddam on short memories among the electorate, and Republicans are banking on the leadership of
George W. Bush. Right now, it George W. Bush. Right now, it
appears that Democrats hold the winning hand. The electorate does, indeed, have short memories. And George W. Bush has not, for some time, exhibited the kind of leadership necessary to counter the
opponents.

The big issue, seized upon by his opponents now that the President is suffering in the polls, is whether or not the country was led into war on the basis of lies
by Bush and those around him. The President and his supporters point to a myriad of statements by Democratic leaders deploring the imagined "weapons of mass destruction" on the part America doing something about it. His detractors, including the sanctimonious Ted Kennedy, the hero of Chappaquiddick, and John Kerry, the fraudulent,
thrice-decorated Puiple Heart thrice-decorated Purple Heart
veteran of Vietnam, are leading the charge for Bush's opposition. We will make no bones about
the fact that we had the fact that we had our own thoughts, entirely different from
the President's, about going into the President's, about going into
Iraq in the first place. We have liaq in the first place. We have
long believed that the only successful ruler of that country, or rather, the only successful rule of that country, is going to depend on a strong central governmen and a strong ruler. A "democ racy", to our way of thinking (and
we know the region about as well we know the region about as well
as a non-Arab, or non-Muslim as a non-Arab, or non-Muslim
can) will do nothing but open up
the Mid-East to long-time tur-
moil. Since the days of
Hammurabi, nearly two thousand Hammurabi, nearly two thousand
years before the birth of Jesus years before the birth of Jesus
Christ, it has been thus . Even before Hammurabi any progress that was made, was made by someone strong enough to impose his will upon a reluctant
people. Whether that is good or people. Whether that is good or
bad depends, to an extent, on the values one places on various things.
But this But this country entered that
war with its war with its eyes wide open. I
don't think there is much doubt don't think there is much doubt and finish the job started by his father. Nor do I have any doubt that Bush was surrounded by others, in the Pentagon, in the Vice
President's office, in certain "rePresident's office, in certain "re-
ligious" circles, and by advisers ligious"circles, and by advisers
in Tel Aviv, who thought the world would be better off without Saddam and were prepared to use American troops to accomplish the task. But the effort
aimed at ousting Saddam had the aimed at ousting Saddam had the
support, indeed, the vocal supsupport, indeed, the vocal sup-
port, of many of those hypocrites, people like Harry Reed, or Ted Kennedy, or John Kerry, or John Rockefeller, who now see an opportunity to score political points
at the expense of principle at the expense of principle. Their
argument, as well as it cant be argument, as well as it cant be
deciphered, is "yes, but." They were "lied to" on the critically important votes of peace or war.
True enough True enough. But it was not Bush
who did the lying. They all had who did the lying. They all had
access to the same sleazy intelliaccess to the same sleazy intelli-
gence, intelligence furnished gence, intelligence furnished
them by a CIA that had gleaned that intelligence from sources around the world, including Israeli intelligence. It would not do the Democrats any good to get
too terribly technical about the oltribence mess in Washington because to do so would expose
where that intelligence came
from, and how America goes
about, or went about, acquiring it. (As a complete sidebar on the intelligence situation: I have never understood why the Presi dent handed out the nation's highest awards to people in leadership roles at the CIA who

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City of Floydada considers ways to crack down on vicious dogs

The Floydada City Counci met Tuesday, November 15 , and discussed the need for a more
strict City ordinance concerning strict City ordinance concerning
dangerous dogs in the City limits, especially Pit Bulls. Both City Police Chief Darrell Gooch and City Animal Control Officer Roy Moreno addressed the council. Police Chief "Pit Bulls have become a hazard in the City. They are running loose and not restrained. They (their owners) have no kennels, nor fenced areas to keep the
dogs. The dogs have attacked dogs. The dogs have attacked
children and elderly people." "A police officer had to shoo one ( a Pit Bull) a couple of weeks ago when the dog attacked the officer. A Pit Bull blocked the door at Friends Convenience the customers leave the store," said Gooch. The owner interfered with the removal of the dog. She was arrested and taken to Plainview for the night, accordGary Brown.
Moreno told the council, "We had to euthanise the dog that bit the 8 year old boy a couple of weeks ago. The head was sent to Austin and fortuakely
rabid." City Manager Gary Brown
added, "We were fighting a fire added, "We were fighting a fire
yesterday and two Pit Bulls kept us from going around to the other side of the house." According to Gooch, "Pit or more, are much more aggressive than any other breed of dog and shooting dogs in the City makes for dangerous stray bul-
lets. We try to catch the aggreslets. We try to catch the aggres-
sive dogs and euthanise them af ter three days. We then cite the
owners with fines, but they pay
the fines and purchase more dogs. We need a stronger ordinance Gooch recommende dinance that would force owners to fence in their dogs and muzzle them when walking with them. Council Member Jon Nielson
said, "The ordinance must be agsaid, "The ordinance must be ag-
gressive and not one, two or three offenses then we take the dog, but take it on the first offense." liams said "I think Monte Williams said, "I think we should
ban the owner from owning a dog for a certain period of time after the first offense."
City Manager Gary Brown added, "These are big dogs that can break chains. I am in favor of a strict ordinance. We have found a good one from Colorado.
We can pattern our's after it." Council Member C Schacht said, "I recommend we table this for now until we get our own strict ordinance and then
pass it at our next meeting." pass it at our next meeting."
In other matters, the cou approved a grant of $\$ 366,666$ available to the City to make more improvements at the City's airport. According to Brown, the irant provides money for repairing concrete areas at the airport
and a grass runway, along with many other projects. "This will cost the City nothing," said Brown.

rector addressed the council in Public Forum. Concerning the prospects of a dairy farm coming to Floyd County, Ross said, "This project will put dollars on

## Researchers test drip irrigation designs

By: Tim W. McAlavy Crop producers on the Texas subsurface drip irrigation systems the "Cadillac" of irrigation technology. They maximize wa ter use efficiency, boost caire less labor during operation due to automation.

But there is a drawback. Sub surface drip systems cost more to install.
Turnkey installation of such a system, including filters and au-
tomated controls, ranges from $\$ 700$ to $\$ 1,000$ per acre.
Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientists are currently testing and comparing sub-
surface drip irrigation systems to surf how lower-cost designs affect water distribution, crop performance and total yields. "The question is, can we reirrigation systems * reducing their initial costs * and still get good yields," said Jim Bordovsky, Experiment Station agricultural engineer based at Halfway.

We are in our fourth year of three subsurface drip designs " Bordovsky is conducting this research with Dr. Dana Porter, Experiment Station and Texas Cooperative Extension irrigation
specialist; Dr. Jeff Johnson, an specialist; Dr. Jeff Johnson, an

The experimental drip system laterals, or tapes. Each group represents a different drip system design.
The designs provide three levels of water distribution uniformity ranging from very good system) to poor (representing a lower cost system).
To achieve the three levels of water uniformity in the experiment, each design has a unique tape diameter and operating pressure with irrigation flow con-
trolled independently of the other designs.
All tapes are installed on $60-$ inch centers and water two 30inch rows. Emitters on each tape
lateral are the same size and lateral are the same size and
spaced 20 inches apart. All laterals are 1,320 feet long, roughly one-quarter mile. "The main differences in these designs are tape diameter and operating pressure,"
Bordovsky said. "We grow one Bordovsky said. "We grow one
variety of cotton using planting and fertilizer rates that are common in the area.
"Within this experiment, we use two different irrigation re-
gimes, each based on local evapo-
transpiration rates. In one regime we give the crop 100 percent of an estimated base irrigation rate. In the other regime, the crop re ceives 60 perce

fluctuated in a very narrow
ange, from 1,299 pounds per ange, from 1,299 pounds pe-
acre to 1,304 pounds per acre. acre to 1,304 pounds per acre.
But the scientists have noted a difference in water uniformity across the field among the thre systems.
"Redu
"Reducing the design standards will lead to less-than-per-
fect water distribution an greater yield variation along each row," Bordovsky said.
"The yield we get down the furrow is correlated to how th system distributes water. Poo
distribution of pre-plant irriga distribution of pre-plant irriga-
tion could really have an advers effect on cotton germination in dry years.
"Even so, these experiments indicate that we could reduce the
design standards and, therefore, design standards and, therefore,
the initial cost of subsurface drip systems without affecting overall cotton yield."
The scientists also plan to conduct an economic analysis to compare operating costs with total yields produ
three designs.
"We hope to have the eco nomic analysis done sometime in 2006," Bordovsky said. The Texas State Suppor Committee of Cotton Incorppartment of Agriculture's Agri cultural Research Service Ogallala Research Initiative pro vided financial support for this research.
