Lockney women help "Rita" victims

Lockney residents, Rise' Ford and Renee' Hrbacek, spent September 15 - 23, doing disaster relief work in Orange, Texas, following Hurricane Rita.

The ladies reluctantly agreed to have their story publicized, in the hope that others who want to help, but do not know how to go about it, will be encouraged to do

The ladies worked through First Baptist Church in Plains, which has its own disaster relief feeding team. The Church's efficient set up includes kitchen components which can be trucked to the disaster location and set up on site under a tent. Such things as tables, a number of 80 quart size cook pots, gas burners, restaurant style dish washing multi-tub unit, refrigerator/freezer, among other needed items are included

A revival visit led to Ford's and Hrbacek's eventual involvement in the disaster ministry. "Three or four years ago, Rev. Bill Wright, Pastor of First Baptist Church in Plains, preached a revival meeting at First Baptist Church in Lockney where I and my family, as well as the Hrbacek's attend. He mentioned the church's disaster relief team." said Ford

The "seed" was planted then in Ford's and Hrbacek's hearts to be of help when they could, following a disaster.

September, 2005, they both felt led to complete a Yellow Cap training course being offered. It required of anyone before volunteer. "Renee" and I were unaware of just how quickly we would be needed," said Ford.

"When the call came, the Lord laid it on our hearts to go."

The group of 17 volunteers coming from such places as Brownfield, Farwell, Lockney, Mission, Plains, Seminole and New York worked in conjunction with the Red Cross to prepare over 7,000 meals a day at the beginning of the week, tapering down to over 4,000 meals a day by the end of the week. The group prepared lunch and dinner each day for the hurricane victims of Orange and the surrounding area. The volunteers stayed in the local Baptist Church's Family Life Center, sleeping in the gymna-

"The kitchen was set up on the back parking lot of the Church. We had semi-trucks parked around us, some with refrigerated units, others loaded with gallon size cans of food for our use," said Ford. "We had an air compressor powered can opener which could open a one gallon can in two seconds flat!"

"Our group had one head cook and the rest of us were flunkies who stirred, poured, washed dishes and followed orders," Ford laughed. "We started cooking at 7:00 a.m. each morning for the noon meal, which we had to have cooked, and placed in large containers called cambros by 10:30 a.m. The evening meal had to be cooked and in the cambros by 3:30 p.m. in order for the Red Cross to load them in their box truck and make the deliveries by meal time.'

"Everything about the disaster relief kitchen had to comply with Health Department rules. they can serve as a disaster relief The food we prepared had to be kept at or above 160 degrees and we all wore gloves. The dishes, pots, utensils, etc. all went dren, Janee', Karah and J. Paul.

through a cycle of wash-rinsesanitize in bleach water-then sanitize again," Ford said.


"Of course it was hard work, but we laughed and had fun, too. We came to jokingly refer to the giant utensils we stirred food with as our oars, because they reminded us of metal oars for rowing," Ford laughed. "Our head cook would send an order to Red Cross for the food. However, we didn't always get what we ordered. We prepared 'one pot' meals which always included fruit as dessert. Some of the meals we prepared included such things as soup, spaghetti, ravioli with green beans, chicken breast with mushroom gravy, rice casserole and Mexican casse-

Ford added, "One afternoon, Renee' and I went out in a Red Cross truck to help deliver the meals. With one exception, we stayed in the back of the truck to dish up the meals into styrafoam to-go containers, which were then handed out to the people. There were groups in the area who worked with food lines, but ours delivered the food.'

"The most difficult thing for for both of us, I think, was seeing the devastation and the conditions in which the people were living. It really humbled us," Ford continued. "It is impossible for me to adequately describe that week. You just had to have been there. Though we were very tired and ready to come home, it was a great experience and we would do it again in a heartbeat."

Construction planned for new entrance into Floydada

With the help and collaboration of a newly organized group of people, and the Floydada Development Center, a brand new entrance will be welcoming people to the City of Floydada.

The FDC, on Monday, purchased the former Tino's Restaurant, located at the Y intersection in Floydada.

The Restaurant has been vacant for many years and has fallen into disrepair.

The group of citizens has formulated a plan to turn the eyesore into a tourist stop for visitors. "We want to make Floydada a planned 'Road Trip'," said Dora Ross, one of the groups

The plans involve using a Pumpkin theme and the FDC will be sponsoring a contest to get citizens to submit their ideas for the entrance.

The Floydada Chamber of Commerce has already pledged \$500 to kick off the project and the FDC is seeking contributions to make the entrance a reality.

"Phase One of our fundraising goal is \$45,000," said Ross. "We want to eventually do all the entrances to the City, but the entrance at the Y is the top priority.

'We know we want a pumpkin theme and we envision one idea of a real Cinderella Coach being pulled by a white horse.

'We have already found a place that will build the carriage. It will be usable and we can take it to various parades to promote Floydada. Our Floydada "queens and princesses" can ride in the

"The Coach will stay at entrance (until it is used) and will be a great spot for people to stop

and get their picture taken. 'We hope to get enough ideas to spread the theme to all the en-

The FDC is a separate entity from the Floydada Economic Development Corporation and was formed for educational purposes and community and eco-

"The legislature has tied the hands of the Economic Development Corporation in cities who voted to have the Corporations," said Ross. "When the Corporations were first formed we had more freedom with what we could spend your tax dollars on. Now there are very strict guidelines. There will be no tax dollars spent on this project. It will have to be privately funded.

"The newly formed Floydada Development Center does not have the strict guidelines of the EDC--but it is still an IRS recognized tax-exempt (not-forprofit) organization.

Floyd County: Apollo Energy Operating Company LP is awaiting the availability of Equipment to Frac the W.D. Miller Lease Well #1. As of Monday November 21, a date has not yet been scheduled for this work.

Floyd County: Apollo Energy Operating Company LP, Ceretha Watson Lease Well #1 as of Monday November 21 were at a depth of 9,000 feet and were fishing for lost drill collars.

Floyd County: Apollo Energy Operating Company LP has received a drilling permit for the W.D. Miller Lease Well #2, horizontal completion. The surface location of this well will be 660 feet from the South line and 660 feet from the West line of Section 24, Block 1, AB&M Survey. The penetration point location of this well bore will be 973 feet from the South line and 983 feet from the West line of Section 24. The terminus location of this well bore will be 2,750 feet from the South Line and 2820 feet from the West line of Section 24.

Floyd County: Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. has staked their first location to be drilled in the Palo Duro Basin, the Glen Misener Lease Well #1. This well will be located in the Southeast Corner of Section 18, Block 1, AB&M Survey, 6 miles Northeast of Floydada.

Floyd County: Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. has staked their second location to be drilled in the Palo Duro Basin, the Larry Jones Lease Well #1. This well will be located in the South half of Section 134, Block 1, AB&M Survey, 3 miles Southwest of Dougherty.

Grey Wolf Drilling Rig #861: As of current available information, negotiations were ongoing between Apollo Energy Operating Company LP and Bankers Petroleum (US) Inc. as to which well, the Apollo Operating Miller #2, or the Bankers Petroleum Misener #1 will be drilled first by the Grey Wolf Drilling Rig #861 when the rig is finished on the Ceretha Watson Lease Well #1.



A political flap has emerged over just exactly how America entered the war against Saddam Hussein. 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City of Floydada considers ways to crack down on vicious dogs

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, November 15, and discussed the need for a more strict City ordinance concerning dangerous dogs in the City limits', especially Pit Bulls.

Both City Police Chief Darrell Gooch and City Animal Control Officer Roy Moreno addressed the council. Police Chief Gooch said, "Pit Bulls have become a hazard in the City. They are running loose and not restrained. They (their owners) have no kennels, nor fenced areas to keep the dogs. The dogs have attacked children and elderly people."

"A police officer had to shoot one (a Pit Bull) a couple of weeks ago when the dog attacked the officer. A Pit Bull blocked the door at Friends Convenience store last week and would not let the customers leave the store," said Gooch. The owner interfered with the removal of the dog. She was arrested and taken to Plainview for the night, according to a report by City Manager Gary Brown.

Moreno told the council, "We had to euthanise the dog that bit the 8 year old boy a couple of weeks ago. The head was sent to Austin and fortunately it was not

City Manager Gary Brown added, "We were fighting a fire yesterday and two Pit Bulls kept us from going around to the other side of the house."

According to Gooch, "Pit Bulls, that can weigh 120 pounds or more, are much more aggressive than any other breed of dog and shooting dogs in the City makes for dangerous stray bullets. We try to catch the aggressive dogs and euthanise them after three days. We then cite the county. The family interested in

owners with fines, but they pay the fines and purchase more dogs. We need a stronger ordinance than what we have now."

Gooch recommended an ordinance that would force owners to fence in their dogs and muzzle them when walking with them.

Council Member Jon Nielson said, "The ordinance must be aggressive and not one, two or three offenses then we take the dog, but take it on the first offense."

Council Member Monte Williams said, "I think we should ban the owner from owning a dog for a certain period of time after the first offense."

City Manager Gary Brown added, "These are big dogs that can break chains. I am in favor of a strict ordinance. We have found a good one from Colorado. We can pattern our's after it."

Council Member Clar Schacht said, "I recommend we table this for now until we get our own strict ordinance and then pass it at our next meeting."

In other matters, the council approved a grant of \$366,666 available to the City to make more improvements at the City's airport. According to Brown, the grant provides money for repairing concrete areas at the airport and a grass runway, along with many other projects. "This will cost the City nothing," said

Floydada Economic Development Corporation Executive Director addressed the council in Public Forum. Concerning the prospects of a dairy farm coming to Floyd County, Ross said, "This project will put dollars on the tax rolls. The school alone will receive \$75,000 in taxes. It will add 25 to 30 new jobs in our putting in the dairy farm will be back in January, 2006 to secure the land. We could have a dairy farm here within a year, if the people of Floyd County approves

Following some discussion, the council unanimously approved banning the chemical 2-4-D from being used in the City limits from March 1 through November 10. City Attorney Karen Houchin told the council, "2-4-D can drift up to 225 feet per application."

A Main Lift Station Force Main bid (material only) of \$76,360.30 by contractor K. W. Sharp of Lubbock was approved by the council. The bid is the material cost involved to repair the City's Main Lift Station using PVC pipe.

According to Brown, "We have decided we can put this line in and save the City a nice sum of money. The pipe market seems to be at a lull right now and hopefully the bid will be good."

The council appointed Mina Pesina to the Housing Authority Board for a two year term expiring December, 2007. Pesina is replacing Mary Poole who re-

The council voted to demolish an old house, remove the trash and clean the lots at Lot 11-12, Blk 24, Original Town, at 416 West Lee Street. Brown stated, "The house is not worth having on the property. It is in bad shape and is being used by rats, skunks and other undesirable critters."

The council approved an ordinance closing public streets and alleys in Blocks 6, 10, 11 and 12, Starks Addition, an addition to the Town of Floydada. This property is northeast of intersection of W. Price and Second Street.

"We have to provide the tutor for 6 weeks," said Cotham. "Usually the student comes back to school before the 6 weeks is up.'

Principals gave enrollment reports to the Board. Elementary school has 288 students, Junior High has 135 students, and High School enrollment is 196.

The trustees approved membership with Caprock Shared Services Arrangement and also approved local policies for the use of school facilities for non-school purposes, and the policy on what non-school literature can be dis-



Researchers test drip irrigation designs

Crop producers on the Texas High Plains have long considered subsurface drip irrigation systems the "Cadillac" of irrigation technology. They maximize water use efficiency, boost crop yields in most cases and require less labor during operation due to automation.

But there is a drawback. Subsurface drip systems cost more to install

Turnkey installation of such a system, including filters and automated controls, ranges from \$700 to \$1,000 per acre.

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientists are currently testing and comparing subsurface drip irrigation systems to see how lower-cost designs affect water distribution, crop performance and total yields.

"The question is, can we reduce design standards for these irrigation systems * reducing their initial costs * and still get good yields," said Jim Bordovsky, Experiment Station agricultural engineer based at Halfway.

"We are in our fourth year of comparing cotton yields among three subsurface drip designs."

Bordovsky is conducting this research with Dr. Dana Porter, Experiment Station and Texas Cooperative Extension irrigation specialist; Dr. Jeff Johnson, an Experiment Station and Texas Tech University economist, and Experiment Station research technician Joe Mustian.

The experimental drip system is made up of three groups of drip laterals, or tapes. Each group represents a different drip system design.

The designs provide three levels of water distribution uniformity ranging from very good (representing a more expensive system) to poor (representing a lower cost system).

To achieve the three levels of water uniformity in the experiment, each design has a unique tape diameter and operating pressure with irrigation flow controlled independently of the other

All tapes are installed on 60inch centers and water two 30inch rows. Emitters on each tape lateral are the same size and spaced 20 inches apart. All laterals are 1,320 feet long, roughly one-quarter mile. "The main differences in these designs are tape diameter and operating pressure," Bordovsky said. "We grow one variety of cotton using planting and fertilizer rates that are common in the area.

"Within this experiment, we use two different irrigation re-

transpiration rates. In one regime we give the crop 100 percent of an estimated base irrigation rate. In the other regime, the crop receives 60 percent of the base irrigation rate.

Irrigation in this study is applied as a supplement to rainfall from June through August. "2001, 2002 and 2003 were dry years, but we received record rainfall in 2004," Bordovsky said. "Our rainfall in 2005 has been more typical, although an isolated hail event did affect yield. In order to compare crop yields among these three subsurface drip designs we take yield samples at five locations along each lateral line within each design.'

With four growing seasons behind them and another almost in the bag, the scientists have reached some preliminary con-

"We have learned that environmental and physical factors can affect cotton yield uniformity as much as the irrigation system

Bordovsky said. "We're talking about things like hail, blowing sand, insect or disease pressure, soil type and topography.

'We've also learned there isn't much overall yield difference for an entire field among the three different subsurface drip designs. at 60 percent of base irrigation. Our total average yields have research.

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gimes, each based on local evapo- fluctuated in a very narrow range, from 1,299 pounds per acre to 1,304 pounds per acre.

> But the scientists have noted a difference in water uniformity across the field among the three

'Reducing the design standards will lead to less-than-perfect water distribution and greater yield variation along each row," Bordovsky said.

The yield we get down the furrow is correlated to how the system distributes water. Poor distribution of pre-plant irrigation could really have an adverse effect on cotton germination in dry years.

"Even so, these experiments indicate that we could reduce the design standards and, therefore, the initial cost of subsurface drip systems without affecting overall cotton yield.'

The scientists also plan to conduct an economic analysis to compare operating costs with total yields produced in each of the three designs.

'We hope to have the economic analysis done sometime in 2006," Bordovsky said.



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

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
