Winds and static create fire troubles for cities

Floyd County has been hit hard the past few weeks with several grass and module fires throughout the county.

High winds, low humidity, static electricity and power lines down have been the probable causes for most of the fires, according to Floydada Fire Chief Carroll Sims.

"In the past 11 days, we (the Floydada Volunteer Fire Fighters) have made 13 fire runs to fight grass fires, burning modules and (cotton) burrs," said Sims.

"Last week we were fighting a grass fire in 30 mph winds, with 9 percent humidity. On the run fighting the burr fire northwest of the City, we left the burrs floating in water and they still reignited after we left," said Sims.

Cotton producer Chris McIntosh of Floydada told the Hesperian-Beacon, "About two weeks ago, we lost 10 modules out of 11 on one-half of a circle

Floydada Volunteer Fireman and City Manager Gary Brown told the Hesperian-Beacon, "The grass fire on the east side of town started near a downed electric pole, but we are just not sure what ployees."

has started all the recent fires."

Assistant Fire Chief Preston Belt of Lockney said, "In the last three weeks, we (the Lockney Volunteer Fire Fighters) have made 12 runs to fight grass fires, module fires and burr fires inside gins. Some of the causes were from bearings going out on cotton strippers, static electricity, cigarettes thrown on the side of the roads and power lines being blown down.

Concerning the dry conditions and losses, Belt said, "Several days the humidity was two or three percent in the negative. I do know that the Foster brothers have lost four or five cotton modules to fire."

The Lockney Rehab Center had to evacuate 30 or more of their residents last Wednesday due to smoke blowing over the center from a nearby grass fire.

According to spokesperson Dawn Cheney of the Lubbock Rehab Offices, "The residents were moved across the street to Mangold Memorial Hospital in a matter of minutes with no injuries. We appreciated the help of the many community volunteers and the Mangold Hospital em-

Residents fall victim to scam artists

It may be the season of "good will toward men", but scam artists are also busy taking advantage of trusting people--especially elderly citizens.

According to Glenda Wilson, Vice President of Floydada's First National Bank, more than one customer of FNB has become a victim of scammers.

"One elderly woman gave up her bank account to a person who said they needed the information to remove her from telemarketing lists," said Wilson.

"You should guard your account numbers," said Wilson. "Banks already have your account information---there is no reason you should have to give

out that information to anyone over the phone."

Another scam to hit American consumers involves counterfeit checks and money orders--including U.S. Postal Money Orders. According to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service these scams are costing victims millions of dollars each month.

According to C. Kelly Aarons of the US Postal Inspection Service, "Con artists posing as students, tourists, or overseas military personnel ask for help in cashing checks and money orders, or they target vulnerable people looking for love or companionship.'

Postal inspectors have found

that in most cases con artists ship scams exclusively involving the check or money order and ask the victim to cash it, keep a portion as a "gift", and wire the remainder, usually to an overseas

The victim cashes the check and sends the money requested to the scammer. The check is then discovered to be bogus and the customer is then responsible to repay the bank for the bad

"It is important for customers to know that just because you can withdraw the money, it doesn't mean the check or money order

Recently Postal Inspectors have learned of three additional

Postal Money Orders.

In an attempt to lull the victim, the scammer sends the victim an email from "PostalMoneyOrder.com" advising the victim a money order has been approved in their name.

Also fake money orders bear a USPS trademark and logo (which bear no resemblance to the real thing).

Fraudsters are also sending "authorization letters" on fictitious USPS letterhead asking for aid in cashing the counterfeit Postal Money Orders.

For many years Laney's district has increasingly voted Republican, but it has also supported Laney. Laney had developed a reputation, as his district became more and more conservative, of being a fair-minded politician, and it was only when he chose to fly off to Ardmore, Oklahoma while the House was in session, that feelings within the



We worked from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon, met at the Scout Hut and loaded all the food in one pickup and weighed it.







Large seed supply anticipated for cotton

Now that Roundup Ready Flex technology cotton has been approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, a Texas Cooperative Extension cotton specialist expects new varieties to begin entering the mar-

Dr. Randy Boman, speaking at the Farm and Ranch Management Symposium during the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show, said as many as 55 new entries of cotton were tested at multiple locations by Dr. John Gannaway,

Agricultural Experiment Station cotton breeder. A large seed supply for many of the varieties is anticipated for launch in 2006.

With these new varieties and technology, producers need to be vigilant in seed selection, studying performance through demonstration plots and university data, before diving in, Boman said.

Look at the yield potential of a variety, but also consider adaptability, fiber quality (staple, micronaire, strength and uniformity), boll type (storm resistance) and disease and nematode tolerance, Boman advised.

High fiber quality alone can mean an extra \$100 per acre for a producer from a field with a two-bale yield, he said.

"Don't bet the farm on one variety," Boman warned. "Plant two or more varieties to spread

Newer producers also need to be aware of herbicide concerns when it comes to treating weeds in these new varieties of cotton, as well as traditional cotton, he

The new technology-based cottons such as Roundup Ready and Liberty Link refer to the type of herbicide which can be used to treat weeds. Roundup Ready cotton can be treated with the herbicides containing glyphosate, which are sold under a number of trade names. Liberty Link cottons can be treated with containing herbicides glufosinate, such as Ignite.

The two don't mix, Boman Link and conventional fields, the same as Ignite treatments can physically drip to Roundup Ready and conventional fields, and can cause damage, he said.

Tank contamination also can sneak up on a producer, he said. Roundupand Ignite will pull any 2,4-D remnants from a tank and hoses, and the producer will set his own cotton back.

Keep flawless records as to where your Roundup Ready, Liberty Link and conventional varieties are located, and make sure you apply the correct over-thetop herbicide to your field" Boman said. "Do not use a sprayer that has been contami-

nated with 2,4-D or other cottondamaging herbicides for overthe-top treatments."

More cotton information is available through county Extension agents or on the Lubbock Center Web site: http:// lubbock.tamu.edu, he said. Also, each Extension agent and gin manager has a copy of the Western Region Cotton Resource CD-ROM, which contains more in-

Monti Vandiver, Extension integrated pest management agent in Bailey and Parmer counties, discussed another type of treatment with producers - insect management.

Most important, Vandiver said. Small droplets of Roundup said, is to start the season with can physically blow onto Liberty an integrated pest management

Understand that foliar insecticides have to be applied in a timely manner, without skimping, because good coverage is essential to insect management, he

For producers using Bt cultivars, keep an eye on what is happening in the field, Vandiver advised. Do not plant the field and then walk away and not worry about the worms.

And finally, he said, don't worry about protecting late bolls which have little chance to mature, because it is not economi-


My dad is quite a guy, And I am proud to be his son. For he has something gold can't buy, A love as bright as the son.
