# Hesperian-Beacon looks back on 2005

The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon did it's best to cover the news in the county during 2005, and looking back through the newspapers of the year we found our citizens did their best to give us something to write about.

The newspaper told stories of outstanding achievements and celebrations of its citizens as well as the hard times that our citizens survived and rose above.

School news highlighted our students outstanding academic, vocational, and athletic achievements, and we also did our best to cover the politics and policies of our local governments.

After a failed school bond election, FISD finds itself regrouping in 2005 and looking for new ways to address building improvements and possibly another bond election.

Lockney ISD saw several administration changes with two new principals and a new superintendent.

The City of Floydada spent many months trying to find ways to tackle the expense of prisoner transfers and housing and studied the possibility of building a city jail. The thought was put on hold after Floyd County and Hale County reached an agreement to house prisoners in Hale County.

Pit Bull problems plagued both the City of Floydada and Lockney. The cities tackled the problems of writing new, and tougher, city ordinances after several dog attacks were re-

There was a final conclusion the controversial Commissioner's race between Ray Nell Bearden and Mike Anderson after a judge ruled in favor of Bearden.

A new Assisted Living Center broke ground in Floydada, and Uncles Convenience Store burned down.

Spring and summer weather dominated the news with tornadoes in May and June bringing destruction to crops and several

However, there was good news for many with a record breaking cotton crop and good harvests with other crops--including another good pumpkin

The year is wrapping up with another good cotton crop which may surpass 2005.

Citizens are also looking toward 2006 in anticipation of what will happen with 5 gas drilling permits in Floyd County.

As of June, over 600,000 acres. had been leased up in Floyd County by gas companies betting that natural gas will be a big commodity in Floyd County.

Plans are already being made for laying gas lines to transport the product.

Only time will tell if the explorations will bring big profits to gas companies and to this

Floyd County Commissioners voted to accept a trial contract with Hale County jail for the purpose of housing future county

Alexis Hall and Erin Mangold each received a 1st division rating in UIL Voice Competition at Estacado High School in the Solo and Ensemble division.

A City of Lockney truck was attacked by a pit bull who punctured two tires with his teeth.

In a February 17 LISD board meeting, Phil Cotham was voted in as the new Superintendent.

February 25, the Floydada Whirlwind Basketball team won the Class 2A Area Champion-

February 26 two juvenile boys escaped from the PAC, stole a car, and led police on a high speed chase. After 4 days they turned themselves into authori-

March

Outstanding citizens were honored at the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, March 7. They

were: Extra Mile Award to Jon Jones, Employer of the Year Jerry Vaughn; Volunteer of the Year Linda Matsler, and Citizen Through the Years Charles Tyer.

The Whirlwind Tennis Team won the Regional Team Tennis Tournament, March 3rd.

Four art projects from FHS qualified to compete at state competition in Houston. The artists were: Lindsey Leatherman, Kristan Lackey, and Justin

The Duckwall-Alco Company announced they would be closing the local Duckwall's Store. A closeout sale will begin on March 18. The store has been in operation since January, 1998.

Citizens came before the Lockney City Council to protest Pit Bulls in the city limits.

April

Lockney Mayor Roger Stapp was named the Citizen of the Year at Lockney's Chamber of Commerce Banquet on April 2.

A November 2004 controversial election was still in the news in April. Lawyers were still presenting arguments for incumbent Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden and challenger Mike Anderson.

Judge John Forbis was to rule in the case.

Floydada High School BAPA Parliamentary Procedure Team won first place in state for the 2nd year in a row and qualified for the National Leadership Confer-

The April 18th paper reported on the end of 2004 ginning--fi-

The total count of bales ginned was 262,621-- a record for the county.

Plans were being developed to build a Veterans Memorial Park in Lockney to the east of the Lockney Fire Department.

A newly organized veteran's association called the Texas Plains Veterans Association has undertaken the project. It is being led by Ed Marks.

The group plans on erecting flags in a circle for every branch of the service and a P.O.W. flag. In the center of the flags will be

a rifle with a helmet on top, combat boots, and dog tags--the symbol of a fallen soldier. The items will be encased in glass to prevent vandalism.

In an April 21 board meeting Lockney ISD trustees hired JeanAnne Williams as the new Lockney Elementary principal.

Lockney High School participated this month in the Shattered Dreams program.

FHS Art students took top honors in state competition. Kristan Lackey, Lindsey Leatherman, and Justin Vargas all won "Superior" ratings at the VASE State Art Competition in

A "Letter of Intent" from Judge John Forbis brought an end to the controversy surrounding the November 2004 Commis-

sioners Race. Forbis sent a "Letter of Intent" to the 110th Judicial Court.

Forbis stated he intended to rule in favor of incumbent Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden.


Part of the controversy centered on a write-in ballot that had been discarded because the name had been written on the wrong line. The vote had been for challenger Mike Anderson. The Judge ruled the vote had been properly discarded.

Another controversial vote involved a mail in ballot in favor of Bearden. The ballot had arrived to the Post Office in time for the election, but after the election day to the County Clerk's office. The judge ruled the ballot was legal and should count in favor for Bearden. This gave Bearden a one vote win over

Anderson. A ground breaking for the upcoming Assisted Living Center in Floydada, was held on May 2. It will be an 11,000 foot center--the first of it's kind in Floyd County.

The front page of the May 5th paper featured several state winners in different categories in Lockney and Floydada schools.

The May 19th paper headlined stories of tornadoes, hail, and flood in Floyd County. South Plains was hit by 10-15

inches of rain, putting the home of Harlan Crume, of Providence, under water.

A tornado hit the South Plains community breaking out windows and tearing down a long stretch of power lines. A total of 30 distribution poles and 6 transmission poles were downed.

Six tornadoes were reported in Floyd and Hale Counties, but mostly touched down in unpopulated areas.


One home and two barns, west of Ralls, were destroyed.

The announcement and withdrawal of the announcement made headlines because of a State law that requires an office holder to resign from their current office if they announce their intentions to run for a different office. Golightly still had 3 years left on her term and did not want to have to va-Apple. Now all students, 6th - cate her office while running for County Judge.

According to law when Golightly announced her intentions she technically resigned her position. And because she had announced her intentions the Commissioners Court could not legally appoint her to fill out the remaining time as Tax Assessor.

Golightly informed the Commissioners that she had been given bad information from the Secretary of State's office and line four feet deep in the bar thought she was acting in a legal

To clear up the matter, Golightly told the Commissioners she was "withdrawing her name for consideration of County Judge at this time," and would re-file for her current office. She will have to file her intentions to seek her current office by January 2, 2005.

The October 27 paper reported another good cotton crop. This crop was making "better

grades" than in year's past. Dryland yields are running between 200 to 500 pounds per acre, while irrigated is averaging between 700 to 900 pounds per acre.

Floyd County lost around 700,000 acres of cotton to early hail storms during the summer. Ginning is already in full swing.





### Year end crop and weather summery

Though many producers struggled with the effects of extreme weather, the state's agriculture industry persevered and made the best of 2005, said a Texas Cooperative Extension expert. Jose Pena, Extension economist in Uvalde, said early rainfall made vegetable and crop production especially successful this year despite later drought.

"Early, above-average spring rain and low relative humidity helped produce near-record yields of most spring vegetables and some row crops," Pena said. "For example, cotton production in Southwest Texas experienced record yields under heavy irrigation.'

The most significant struggle for many producers was lack of soil moisture, he said, including "a severe dry spell from April to December, with rainfall as low as 75 percent of the long-term average in a large portion of the state. As a result, crop agriculture experienced increased irrigation requirements.

Thanks to record-high energy prices, necessary irrigation also became more expensive for many producers, Pena said.

Because of the state's severe and extreme drought conditions since July Texas along with Illinois ~ was one of the country's driest regions in 2005, according to the National Drought Mitigation Center.

Dr. David Anderson, Extension livestock economist in College Station, said dry conditions were a challenge for many cattle producers in the eastern half of

"Significant drought had a large impact on the hay crop and hit pastures hard," he said. "Many producers had to begin buying hay much earlier than normal, and the hay that is available is often poor in quality.

"Of course, hurricanes impacted some producers in Southeast Texas; high fuel costs hit them hard and will continue to do so in the coming year."

However, high cattle and calf prices were helpful, Anderson

said. "Prices have been record high over the last couple of years," he

"It's a mixed bag for cow-calf producers. While prices have been good, drought and increasing fuel costs have increased dra-

matically.' Pena said gross agricultural income increased significantly because the markets were good for livestock. Increased production costs, however, will likely mean that net income will nearly match or be slightly lower than

Anderson said even though livestock production was not as successful as last year, it was certainly more productive than it was five years ago.

"In the coming year, I expect to see calf prices decline as cattle inventory expansion occurs in the U.S.," he said. "But prices should still be at relatively good levels. The opening of the Japanese market for beef is positive, even though it may take a long time to regain significant market levels."

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced on Dec.11 that the U.S. will resume exporting beef to Japan. Trade was severed in 2003 when a Japanese embargo prevented U.S. beef from being sent to Japan after the state of Washington reported a case of bovine spongiform encephalopathy (commonly referred to as BSE, or "mad cow"

The cattle market has gradually improved since 2003, Pena said, and the future should be good for producers.

"The cattle market outlook for 2006 remains bright," he said. "The favorable market may extend into 2007 as Japan allows U.S. imports again.

The future looks good for crop producers as well, Pena said.

'The cold weather during December 2005 will help conserve the sparse moisture left in the soil profile," he said. "It will also reduce the potential of insect and disease problems in the coming

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas has announced the availability of \$72.37 million 2006 conservation program funds for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), the EQIP Ground and Surface Water Conservation Program

(EQIP-GSWC) and the Wildlife

Producers and landowners interested in submitting applications for 2006 funding have until February 17, 2006 to prepare and sign their applications.

Following the end of the signup period all applications will be ranked based on a predetermined criteria set. An NRCS conservation planner ill develop contracts and conservation plans for each successful application. Producers with approved 2006 contracts can begin implementing the approved conservation practices in Spring 2006.

For 2006, Texas funding priorities were developed with the assistance of local input, the NRCS State Technical Committee and Texas State Conservationist Dr. Larry Butler and his

The initial \$72.37 million allocated for Texas will be used to solve locally identified resource problems in individual counties and will also fund special statewide resource concerns recommended by the Texas State Technical Committee such as water quantity, water and air quality, wildlife habitat and control of invasive species

A breakdown of the initial allocation amounts shows \$66 million is designated for priority addressed through the EQIP program. A total of \$34 million will

be used to provide county base funding throughout the state and an additional \$32 million will be targeted to specific needs conservation concerns including brush Habitat Incentive Program and invasive species management, irrigation water conservation, water and air quality related animal feeding operations, water quality, assistance for limited resource farmers and ranchers, reforestation and wildlife habitat.

The EQIP-GSWC program received an initial 2006 allocation of \$5.5 million. The EQIP-GSWC program is dedicated to water conservation measures in Texas counties that utilize the Ogallala Aquifer.

An additional \$4.5 million in funds will supplement the EQIP-GSWC in Ogallala counties. Total funding for irrigation and water conservation in the Ogallala region of Texas will total \$10 mil-

The WHIP program was allocated \$870,000 in 2006.

Funds for EOIP, EOIP-GSWC and WHIP are authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill as tools to enhance voluntary conservation activity on U.S. farms and ranches. The programs offer technical and financial assistance to eligible participants to install or implement structural or management practices on eligible


