
Lt. Col. Jack Herbert, speaking for the operations side of the house, explained what was involved in training 300 new pilots each year. He pointed out that management of the students' time requires

Colonel Boughton explained that "tight money" and fewer daylight hours during the winter makes the aircraft upkeep job tougher. He also gave many instances of how inflation has caused the price of supplies to skyrocket.

Air Base Group Executive Officer, Lt. Col. Bill Dederich, told of sacrifices support agencies are making in order to provide more money for the logistics function.

Present plans are for regular meetings of the top three enlisted grades with base senior officers. This should allow for vital information to reach the people at all work levels.

Once, while trying to explain the structure and operations of a flying training squadron to a civilian friend, I rediscovered an old truth. # letters

We thought the readers of THE ROUNDUP might be interested in the possible results of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), which has been ratified by the Texas Legislature.

The proposed 27th Amendment presents a great threat to the American way of life and could be the most important issue ever decided. One of the communist goals is total equality of the masses. The ERA is vague and over-simplified and leaves the door open to numerous consequences.

Under this amendment, it would be unconstitutional to deny a marriage license to any person because of sex. This means that homosexual marriages would be legal.

With the ERA in the constitution, state anti-abortion laws, since they are obviously designed on the basis of sex, would be a violation of the ERA.

As now formulated, the amendment permits no exceptions for the military. Neither the right to privacy nor any unique physical characteristic justifies different treatment of the sexes with respect to voluntary or involuntary service. This means that girls 18 or older would have to register for the draft.

The bill would require a husband to support a wife only when she is unable to support herself. The ERA would bar a state from imposing greater liability for support on a husband than on a wife.

The Texas Legislature ratified Amendment 27 and it will be their responsibility to revoke this action. If you object to any of the above possibilities, you should oppose the ERA. Write your state senators or representatives. Ask them to vote for recission (repealing) the ratification of the ERA in Texas. As my five-year engagement here at Reese AFB draws to a close, I would like to do something rarely done — praise the hospital. Granted, I am prejudiced because I work there, but who better would know our faults and virtues?

Granted, we have our misfits like any other organization, but these people are usually weeded out and what remains are concerned, conscientious, dedicated and knowledgeable. "The hospital personnel are sloppy?" Maybe some are sometimes, but they stick out a lot more in those white uniforms.

With the physician shortage in the military, we found ourselves minus a doctor in the General Therapy Clinic. As extra duty, five experienced medical technicians see patients during morning sick call and afternnon appointments, voluntarily. The Emergency Room technicians, without the benefit of the traditional in-house MOD, take care of 99 per cent of the patient load after regular duty hours.

I have heard the complaint that some patients bring up about not being seen by a doctor, but by a "sergeant". Granted we have not had the four years of training in a medical school, but we are trained in the basics of our profession and have enough common sense to know our limitations; to refer what we can't handle to a physician. Surely one wouldn't demand an officer to fix the electric wiring in a building just because the airman doesn't hold an engineering degree. Some of the technicians in this hospital have spent extra hours after duties in courses in cardiogaphy and emergency medicine in order to better our work.

Yes, we have our faults, but I think the hospital here at Reese has done a hell of a job considering all the shortages and obstacles we face.

The Military Pay Section of Accounting and Finance is offering Military Pay Inquiry Form Letter.

The purpose of this letter is to enable a customer to make an inquiry and get an answer quickly, without having to come in person to the Military Pay Section.

The letter is designed to provide space for identifying the person making the inquiry, for stating the inquiry and for giving an answer all on the same piece of paper.

Military Pay will do two things to make the service worthwhile. First, we will guarantee an answer in three days (based on one day for the inquiry to come in through distribution, one day to be answered, and one day to return through distribution).

Second, they will control each inquiry to make sure it is answered. Thus, the service should be timely and dependable.

There are three features of this service which should prove advantageous to you. First, this service is voluntary; you are not required to use it but Military Pay hopes you will find it helpful to do so. Next, it is convenient. You can make an inquiry at any time without leaving your place of duty. Finally, you will receive the information requested. If Military Pay needs to see you they will let you know.



know about the new officer evaluation report (OER) system but probably were afraid to ask . .

That's not the title of a new Air Force Now film nor the latest edition of AFM 36-10, "Officer Evaluation Reports (Majors and Below)."

Lt. Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, provided detailed answers to 13 questions about the new OER system.

THE ROUNDUP will carry the complete text of General Roberts'

"Everything you've wanted to remarks in an eight-part question and answer series.

Some of the questions that will be answered include:

· Why do we need a new OER

· What effect will the new OER system have on promotion opportunity?

· What will be the impact of the greater variety of ratings possible under the new system?

• Is there any advantage, under the new system, to being assigned to a base versus higher headquarters?

· What effect will the mix of "old" and "new" OERs have on future promotion boards?

 Why is there a closed evaluation form for lieutenant colonels? Are there plans to one day include majors on the closed form?

The following is the first of the eight-part series:

Question: Why do we need a new OER system?

Answer: A new OER system was necessary because of increasing problems associated with the past OER. The biggest problem with the old system was inflated ratings. As late as 1961, less than five per cent of all Air Force officers received a topblock rating. Bfore establishment of the new system, nearly 90 per cent were rated in the highest block. By the end of last year, 75 per cent of all officers received five consecutive "9" ratings.

Understandably, the inflation problem in the old system eroded the effectiveness of the OER as a promotion selection device and as an assignment tool. With nearly everyone rated in the top block, it became increasingly difficult to identify the really top-notch officers.

Even though many of us dislike rating others, and being rated ourselves, we have to recognize that evaluations are necessary in the A Force to document achievements, assist in assigning the right officers to the right jobs, and to provide a written picture of performance. Because of its importance to the officer and the Air Force, the new system was developed to restore the OER's effectiveness in selecting the best officers for increased rank and responsibility.



(DOS) have been selected for early release in June.

that these additional adjustments including such factors as location, are needed to support required cost savings and meet yearend military strength ceilings. They are consistent with Air Force efforts to separate those who do not have career intentions.

Groups affected by the DOS rollback are:

• Reserve pikots and navigators in flying status codes 1, 3 and 6 who would have less than five years' total active Federal military service (TAFMS) as of June 30, 1975, and who have dates of separation between July 1, 1975 and June 30,

• Nonrated Reserve line officers. including permanent flying status years' total active Federal military an established DOS from July 1 through Dec. 31, 1975

About 100 Reserve officers with rollback have been provided to established dates of separation servicing consolidated base personnel offices who will notify the appropriate commanders. Officers were individually screened and Air Force officials emphasized selected based on Air Force needs, replacement requirements and Air Force skill requirements.

Officials emphasize that reclamas to the DOS rollback will be accepted only for extreme personal hardship. The hardship must be clearly beyond that experienced by others affected by the program. Appeals based on absence of civilian employment, school schedules, or unexpected financial loss caused by sale of homes, etc., do not qualify.

Certain categories of officers were exempted from the program. These include officers who were (or are) SEA PW/MIAs, medical service officers, judge advocates.

Also included are officers who code 2 who would have less than five completed a full-time education program at a civilian institution service as of June 30 and who have and have not served at least one day on active duty for each day of training received.


