Colonel Morris commented, "Sergeant Biddle, in all his professional and personal acts, personifies all the qualities desired in top Air Force NCOs. He has the initiative

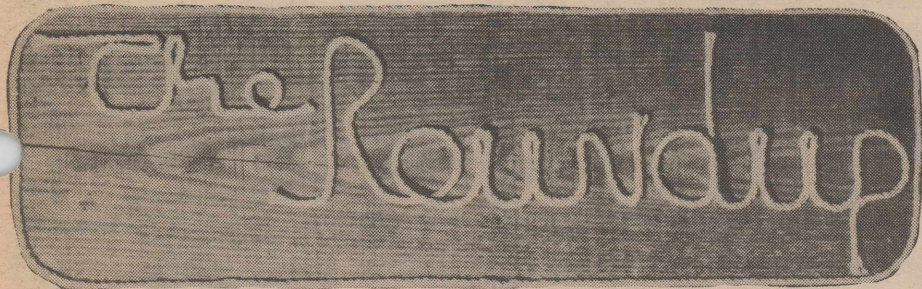
to ferret out the problems, the technical expertise to devise appropriate solutions and the leadership ability to get the job done."

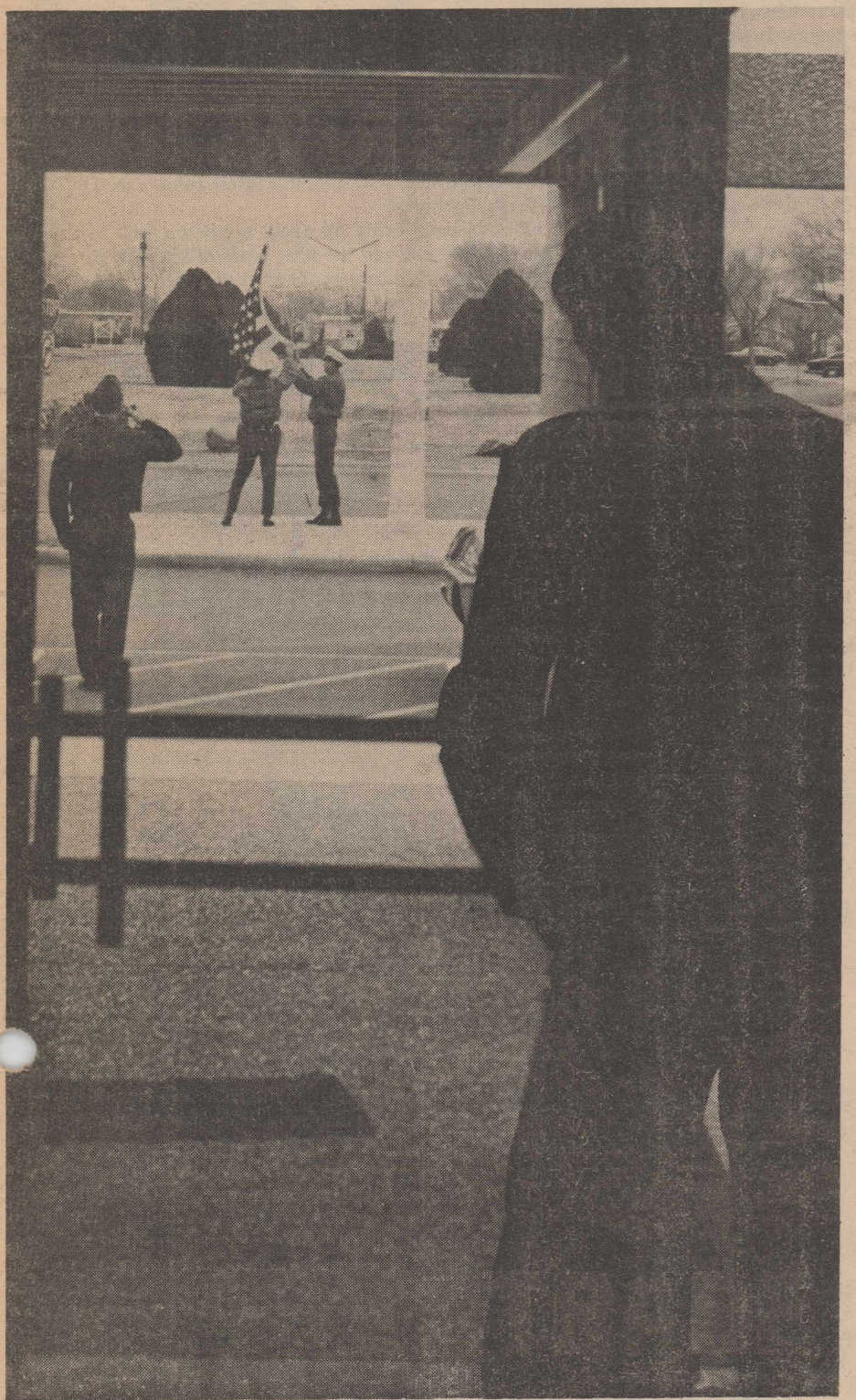

Top three officer, enlisted grades meet

A "Top Two" meeting in November, with Col. Schuyler Bissell talking to chief and master sergeants, resulted in another recent meeting at the NCO Open Mess. This time, the top three enlisted grades received operations, logistics and support briefings from Reese senior officers.

It was generally agreed by enlisted and officer alike that the lower ranking airmen were not being kept informed. New problem areas and changes in priorities are not being revealed to everyone on the base.

Lt. Col. Jack Herbert, speaking for the operations side of the house, explained what was involved in training 300 new pilots each year. He pointed out that management of the students' time requires

precise planning on the part of many people.

Col. Al Boughton, deputy commander for Logistics, showed through the use of slides how a real team effort is needed to keep enough aircraft flying to meet the mission's needs. Colonel Boughton explained that "tight money" and fewer daylight hours during the winter makes the aircraft upkeep job tougher. He also gave many instances of how inflation has caused the price of supplies to skyrocket.

Air Base Group Executive Officer, Lt. Col. Bill Dederich, told of sacrifices support agencies are making in order to provide more money for the logistics function.

Present plans are for regular meetings of the top three enlisted grades with base senior officers. This should allow for vital information to reach the people at all work levels.

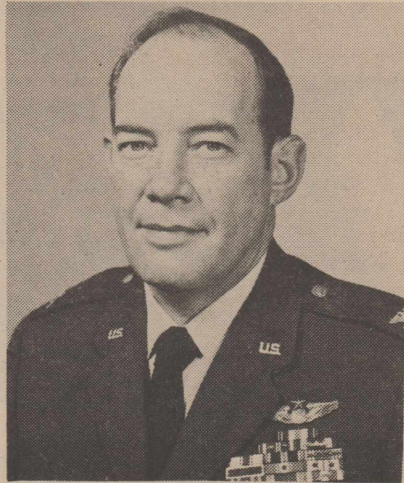

Once, while trying to explain the structure and operations of a flying training squadron to a civilian friend, I rediscovered an old truth. I realized once again that, although the squadron is comprised of both physical and human resources, the building in fact belonged to Civil Engineering. The furnishings and equipment were Supply's. Indeed, even the planes we flew belonged to the Deputy Commander for Logistics.

The truth, therefore, was easy to see. The squadron, as with all units, consists of **PEOPLE - PEOPLE** who fly and perform the mission and **PEOPLE** who support the mission.

The General Electric Company once had as its slogan, "Progress is our most important product." I would like to plagerize to some extent and say that in the Air Force "People are our most important resource." We thought the readers of *THE ROUNDUP* might be interested in the possible results of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), which has been ratified by the Texas Legislature.

The proposed 27th Amendment presents a great threat to the American way of life and could be the most important issue ever decided. One of the communist goals is total equality of the masses. The ERA is vague and over-simplified and leaves the door open to numerous consequences.

Under this amendment, it would be unconstitutional to deny a marriage license to any person because of sex. This means that homosexual marriages would be legal.

With the ERA in the constitution, state anti-abortion laws, since they are obviously designed on the basis of sex, would be a violation of the ERA.

As now formulated, the amendment permits no exceptions for the military. Neither the right to privacy nor any unique physical characteristic justifies different treatment of the sexes with respect to voluntary or involuntary service. This means that girls 18 or older would have to register for the draft.

The bill would require a husband to support a wife only when she is unable to support herself. The ERA would bar a state from imposing greater liability for support on a husband than on a wife.

The Texas Legislature ratified Amendment 27 and it will be their responsibility to revoke this action. If you object to any of the above possibilities, you should oppose the ERA. Write your state senators or representatives. Ask them to vote for rescission (repealing) the ratification of the ERA in Texas. Sir:

As my five-year engagement here at Reese AFB draws to a close, I would like to do something rarely done — praise the hospital. Granted, I am prejudiced because I work there, but who better would know our faults and virtues?

Granted, we have our misfits like any other organization, but these people are usually weeded out and what remains are concerned, conscientious, dedicated and knowledgeable. "The hospital personnel are sloppy?" Maybe some are sometimes, but they stick out a lot more in those white uniforms.

With the physician shortage in the military, we found ourselves minus a doctor in the General Therapy Clinic. As extra duty, five experienced medical technicians see patients during morning sick call and afternoon appointments, voluntarily. The Emergency Room technicians, without the benefit of the traditional in-house MOD, take care of 99 per cent of the patient load after regular duty hours.

I have heard the complaint that some patients bring up about not being seen by a doctor, but by a "sergeant". Granted we have not had the four years of training in a medical school, but we are trained in the basics of our profession and have enough common sense to know our limitations; to refer what we can't handle to a physician. Surely one wouldn't demand an officer to fix the electric wiring in a building just because the airman doesn't hold an engineering degree. Some of the technicians in this hospital have spent extra hours after duties in courses in cardiography and emergency medicine in order to better our work.

Yes, we have our faults, but I think the hospital here at Reese has done a hell of a job considering all the shortages and obstacles we face.

Enlisted Council discusses problems

The Reese Enlisted Advisory Council met Monday to discuss several important issues and problems.

A question raised at a previous Council meeting about the different rates charged for dry cleaning and pressing different types of pants was answered. Prices charged at the laundry and dry cleaning facility on base conform with established Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) rates. In some cases prices are lower than AAFES standards. The key factor in the difference in prices charged is that different pants vary in the amount of labor it takes to press them.

Seat Belt Checks

The question of where and how the Security Police make seat belt checks was raised. MSgt. Joe Ruiz of the Security Police said that normally seat belts are spot-checked during at least one shift every 24 hours. Checks are made on cars at

the main gate. Who is stopped is left up to the SP on duty.

A question was raised as to dependent identification cards. Dependents should get new I.D. cards if their old cards are damaged or expired. Changes in the card holder's appearance do not mean he or she has to get another card.

Another item was Security Police arresting and handcuffing procedures and possible harassment by SPs. Sergeant Ruiz said that SPs try to limit harassment through training.

'Must Have Control'

"We can dictate policy, but only the policeman knows what he will do on the scene of a crime," Sergeant Ruiz said. "The policeman must have control of the situation at all times. Maybe they overreact sometimes, but it's better to be safe and alive. Would you want the violator to have the advantage, or the policeman? Put yourself in his

place," Sgt. Ruiz added.

It was brought out that the Reese athletic program is taking a \$4,000 cut from the Central Base Fund. This will be offset by Operation and Maintenance Funds. The Reese athletic program spent \$15,000 in 1974. In 1975 cost consciousness will be the key to good operation and service.

New reinforced grills are being placed in the doors in the barracks to lessen the number of barracks thefts, the Council was told.

Regular Meetings

Col. Schuyler Bissell, talking about the recent Top Three meeting, said that it would be established on a regular basis. They will be held on the third Wednesday of every month. See Page 1 for more on the Top Three meetings.

"The Top Three is a new way to make people understand what our mission is, what our problems are, and what has to be done to solve

those problems," the colonel said.

Asked his stand on parades, Col. Bissell said that he favors parades, weather permitting.

"Parades make people aware when we've accomplished something," he added.

A request made through the Council for office workers to be able to wear fatigues in winter was

turned down. Colonel Bissell explained that a Wing supplement to AF Manual 35-10 covers what uniform is to be worn. If prolonged severe weather warrants, Colonel Bissell said that he would put out the word that fatigues may be worn.

The next Enlisted Advisory Council meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m., Feb. 24 in the NCO Open Mess.

AFO offers new data request form

The Military Pay Section of Accounting and Finance is offering

a new service to its customers: The Military Pay Inquiry Form Letter.

The purpose of this letter is to enable a customer to make an inquiry and get an answer quickly, without having to come in person to the Military Pay Section.

The letter is designed to provide space for identifying the person making the inquiry, for stating the inquiry and for giving an answer all on the same piece of paper.

Military Pay will do two things to make the service worthwhile. First, we will guarantee an answer in three days (based on one day for the inquiry to come in through distribution, one day to be answered, and one day to return through distribution).

Second, they will control each inquiry to make sure it is answered. Thus, the service should be timely and dependable.

There are three features of this service which should prove advantageous to you. First, this service is **voluntary**; you are not required to use it but Military Pay hopes you will find it helpful to do so. Next, it is **convenient**. You can make an inquiry at **any time** without leaving your place of duty. Finally, you will receive the information requested. If Military Pay needs to see you they will let you know.

Thomas J. Patterson will be the featured guest speaker at the National Prayer Breakfast services to be held at the Officers' Open Mess at 1 a.m. Monday.

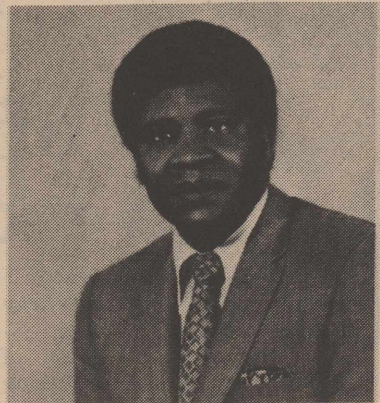

Thursday - The order is reversed, and the teens will compete in a ping pong tournament while the preteens compete in pool.

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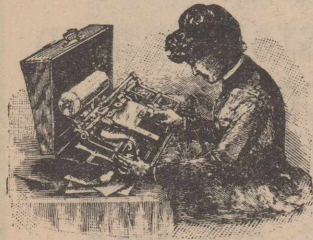

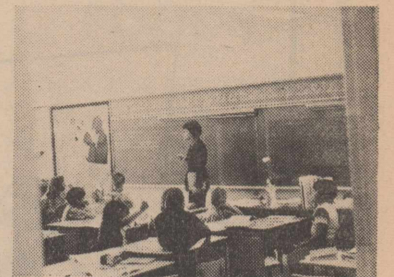
There are currently about 60 families residing in the community who are part of the Reese work force

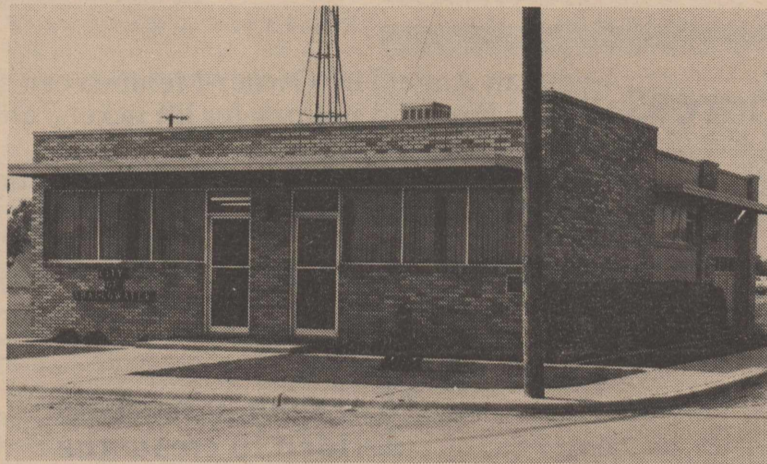

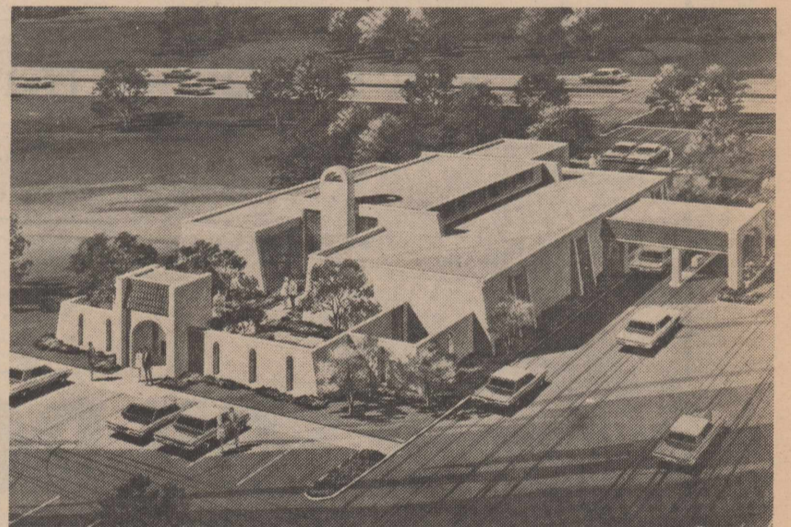
Classrooms are bright and cheerful.

I think that at least one light ought to be working out there next to the road because, for example, this morning I walked out there and almost stepped into a hole. If someone is not familiar with the grounds around here they do not

know where to step and we are going to have an accident. I think the money saved on energy is not as important as someone losing maybe six weeks or longer with a broken ankle or dislocated back.

Series will answer questions on new OER

"Everything you've wanted to know about the new officer evaluation report (OER) system but probably were afraid to ask..."

That's not the title of a new Air Force Now film nor the latest edition of AFM 36-10, "Officer Evaluation Reports (Majors and Below)."

Lt. Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, provided detailed answers to 13 questions about the new OER system.

THE ROUNDUP will carry the complete text of General Roberts'

remarks in an eight-part question and answer series.

Some of the questions that will be answered include:

- Why do we need a new OER system?
- What effect will the new OER system have on promotion opportunity?
- What will be the impact of the greater variety of ratings possible under the new system?
- Is there any advantage, under the new system, to being assigned to a base versus higher headquarters?

• What effect will the mix of "old" and "new" OERs have on future promotion boards?

• Why is there a closed evaluation form for lieutenant colonels? Are there plans to one day include majors on the closed form?

The following is the first of the eight-part series:

Question: Why do we need a new OER system?

Answer: A new OER system was necessary because of increasing problems associated with the past OER. The biggest problem with the

old system was inflated ratings. As late as 1961, less than five per cent of all Air Force officers received a top-block rating. Before establishment of the new system, nearly 90 per cent were rated in the highest block. By the end of last year, 75 per cent of all officers received five consecutive "9" ratings.

Understandably, the inflation problem in the old system eroded the effectiveness of the OER as a promotion selection device and as an assignment tool. With nearly everyone rated in the top block, it

became increasingly difficult to identify the really top-notch officers.

Even though many of us dislike rating others, and being rated ourselves, we have to recognize that evaluations are necessary in the Air Force to document achievements, assist in assigning the right officers to the right jobs, and to provide a written picture of performance. Because of its importance to the officer and the Air Force, the new system was developed to restore the OER's effectiveness in selecting the best officers for increased rank and responsibility.

AF sets June outs for reserve officers

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) - About 100 Reserve officers with established dates of separation (DOS) have been selected for early release in June.

Air Force officials emphasized that these additional adjustments are needed to support required cost savings and meet yearend military strength ceilings. They are consistent with Air Force efforts to separate those who do not have career intentions.

Groups affected by the DOS rollback are:

- Reserve pilots and navigators in flying status codes 1, 3 and 6 who would have less than five years' total active Federal military service (TAFMS) as of June 30, 1975, and who have dates of separation between July 1, 1975 and June 30, 1976.

- Nonrated Reserve line officers, including permanent flying status code 2 who would have less than five years' total active Federal military service as of June 30 and who have an established DOS from July 1 through Dec. 31, 1975.

Lists of the officers selected for the rollback have been provided to servicing consolidated base personnel offices who will notify the appropriate commanders. Officers were individually screened and selected based on Air Force needs, including such factors as location, replacement requirements and Air Force skill requirements.

Officials emphasize that reclamation to the DOS rollback will be accepted only for extreme personal hardship. The hardship must be clearly beyond that experienced by others affected by the program. Appeals based on absence of civilian employment, school schedules, or unexpected financial loss caused by sale of homes, etc., do not qualify.

Certain categories of officers were exempted from the program. These include officers who were (or are) SEA PW/MIAs, medical service officers, judge advocates.

Also included are officers who completed a full-time education program at a civilian institution and have not served at least one day on active duty for each day of training received.

The Minuteman is a key element of the TRIAD concept of land-launched missiles, long range bombers and missile carrying submarines. The Minuteman IIIs have an improved propulsion system and a new guidance system. The improved missiles are capable of carrying multiple independently targetable reentry vehicles and penetration aids. 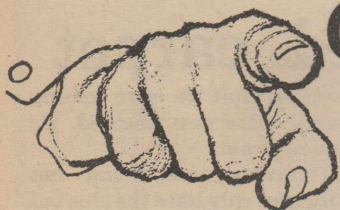

Crime Stop Ext. 2400

In 1964, a young woman was murdered in New York within sight and hearing of 38 people. No one would come to her aid.

In 1965 a police officer, struggling to prevent a suicide, asked for help from many passersby but only one person stopped.

Each citizen must take steps to report crimes they see taking place. You, as a citizen, have the chance on a day-to-day basis to prevent crime by reducing the opportunity for others to commit them. Often people are accessories to crime through neglect or through being naively. A crime is often partly caused by the person who leaves his keys in his car, his house unlocked, and unlit or newspapers piled on his front porch when he is away.

In most cases burglars look for homes where many papers are lying on the doorway or the lights are out. Have a neighbor or good friend collect your papers and mail when you are on vacation. Always secure all your property that you can.

Leaving such items as bicycles in the yard while you are at work or during the hours of darkness invites thieves to rip you off. Most people with the "It can't happen to me" attitude often return to find that it can and has.

Remember, crime is not only the province of the police. Everyone can help fight the battle by stopping chances for theft and by reporting crimes in progress.

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
