## Reese workers triump

While most of us were snug in our warm homes Saturday and Sunday, there were 40 men from Reese who gave up their shelter for a frozen, snowy flightline and some unpleasant duty.

There is a sign that has been posted at many Special Services activities on base. It reads, in part, "Mission Essential -What does this mean? It means that without you, our flightline personnel, it just wouldn't go . . . Thanks for a great iob." This sums up the feeling of Col. Schuyler Bissell, wing commander, and all senior staff officers for the job these men and members of the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron (CES) did during the weekend.

#### **Major Storm**

A major winter storm rolled into the South Plains. Along with freezing rain and more than four inches of snow came the complete shutdown of the base. The regular cross country missions, having been launched Feb. 21, were unaffected by the severe weather which moved on to spawn tornadoes and floods not far from the Texas panhandle.

The men of the 64th Air Base Group went to work. Members of the Transportation Division and the 64th CES manned the grades, snowplows and sand spreaders to keep main roadways on base open. Battling 28-degree temperatures and winds of more than 40 miles per hour, the job began. TSgt.' David Register of the Pavement and Grounds Section of the 64th CES commented, "It was pretty frustrating. As soon as we would blade off the snow, it would blow right back."

Meanwhile, the men of the Transportation Division were answering many calls for wrecker service to get cars unstuck around the base and in Reese Village. At the same time they were fighting the frost, trying to keep the roads open through the main gate to the Reese USAF Hospital and the commissary.

Night finally came and brought an end to the heavy storms. Still in the dark early Sunday morning, Amn. Donald L. Hatch and Amn. Calvin C. Beck of the 64th CES came on duty to begin the process all over

#### Another Problem

As the sun rose Sunday, so did another problem . . . What to do about the 30 Reese planes that were out on cross country missions? The field was still closed because of a solid sheet of nearly an inch of ice on the runway.

The problem had two major impacts. To strand the planes at the bases they had flown to on the cross country missions would mean the pilots would have to be paid at least another day of per diem. There were 30 planes out. With two pilots per craft, the looming per diem figure was around \$1,200. Secondly, the planes would not be available for use Monday when the weather for flying returned to clear skies and calm winds.

Something had to be done.

Racing against the clock, eight men of the 64th CES Pavements and Grounds Section began the almost impossible task of clearing the runways and main taxiways. Using graders, frontloaders, mechanical snow brooms and truck mounted snow plows, they worked from 8:30 a.m. until nearly 3 p.m. before the runways and taxiways were clear.

Meanwhile, flightline airmen were busy cleaning off the airplanes and making necessary preparations for the 30 Reese planes to return. While doing this, they also assisted Transient Alert with the recovery of three Marine airplanes and one Cessna T-37 from another base, also on cross country. The days were long and hard for the mechanics. Working with the wind chill factor around five degrees below zero, members of the 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron (OMS) kept the planes clean in addition to their regular weekend duties.

Action was being taken all over the base to keep Reese from being paralyzed by the rough weather. B Flight of the Security Police Division had their hands full, handling many traffic situations and helping motorists get unstuck.

It was a joint effort, one that epitomizes what a team effort should be. Of the entire work force that labored during the frozen weekend, a large portion were volunteer workers. People left their warm homes, their families, their televisions to come to work on a miserable weekend because they knew there was a job to be done.



In last week's SKY LINE column, I discussed the chain of command. An important part of our chain of command at Reese is the "Open Door" policy. I believe that every commander and supervisor must always have his door "open" to his subordinates in order to best accomplish the mission.

If anyone in a unit has a problem which remains unsolved, his ability to do his best suffers. The problem may be with the job or it may be a personal problem or complaint. Too often we wait too long to discuss the problem and it becomes more serious.

All supervisors at Reese are willing to listen and help. In order for them to help you, they must know your problems as well as the unit's problems. Even in the best organizations, problems will occur which need the supervisor's attention. Usually, he can find the solution. But when he can't, he can help you talk to someone who can.

A supervisor's door is open to people with complaints and

suggestions as well as problems. Every member of the Reese team should know that he or she can state a complaint to the commander and receive a fair and confidential hearing. The commander will try to correct the situation if he can.

You may not have a problem, but an idea for a better way to do things. See your commander or supervisor. Each year millions of dollars are saved by the good suggestions of Air Force people.

If you have a complaint, problem or suggestion, I hope you know that a series of doors is open to you. See your supervisor first. His door is open and he can probably help you. If he can't, he will direct you to someone who can.

In order for our chain of command to be strong, all supervisors' doors must remain open. We do not go straight to the top, but through the series of open doors starting in each organization. With open doors, we can communicate, solve our problems and achieve our goals for 1975.

# AF concerned about 'force modernization'

High-level government officials are concerned about the Air Force's modernization. You should be, too.

Force modernization is a term tossed about lately, especially when reading articles and news reports concerning the latest weapon systems under development.

Before we can ever begin to understand the reasoning behind force modernization, we must understand first what the term implies. What is force modernization and how does it affect our day-to-day Air Force operations?

First of all, force modernization means that the Air Force must have the weapons that are equal to or better than the opposition. If we have this up-to-date force in operation, no enemy will dare attack. This assumption is based on historical fact. In all recorded wars, aggressors only began wars they believed they would win. There are no examples of the militarily weak attacking the militarily strong with the idea of winning. In short, you don't start a war you don't believe you can win.

By having an equal or superior force, war can be avoided. Our Air Force, by operating with modern weapon systems, deters aggression.

We must continue to be strong and vital. For without a modern force, the guarantee that peace will prevail is lost. (An AFNS Editorial)

The Air Force Village also provides general nursing care, not normally included in retirement benefits, to its residents.

A key objective of the Air Force Village is that no qualified applicant shall ever be refused admission because he or she cannot pay.

The Air Force Aid Society (AFAS) was created and to aid members of the Air Force in emergencies and to help their children attend college and vocational schools.

Presently the Security Police and Ground Safety Divisions are coordinating a draft copy of a Reese AFB bicycle safety regulation. This regulation will include bicycle registration, operating privileges, traffic safety requirements, and operator responsibilities. When finialized, it will simplify the procedures for enforcement.

For the past six months, the Security Police bicycle accident/complaint rate has been zero. Therefore, bicycle operation enforcement has not been a primary concern. Emphasis on strict enforcement usually picks up during the most common usage, in spring and summer. This is not to say that we allow obvious violations to go unpoliced. I know for a fact that patrolmen and gate guards have verbally warned or issued traffic citations to bicycle riders. This enforcement will continue. The new regulation on bicycle operations and registration will be ready for distribution in late March.

### Steps you should take in case of animal bite

The first thing to do if you or your child is bitten by an animal is to wash the wound at home with plenty of soap (any soap) and warm water.

If the biting animal is an owned pet, try to get a complete description of the animal. You need to know the species (dog or cat), color, sex, whether collar and tags were on the animal, owner's name, address, phone number, and where the bite occurred. If you can talk to the owner, tell him to keep the pet confined to the home or tied up for 10 days.

You also need the circumstances surrounding the bite. Was the animal provoked or unprovoked? If you can ask when the animal was last vaccinated and if it has been sick lately, it will help.

Next, go immediately to the Reese Hospital Emergency Room. There the emergency room attendant will ask for all the above information, which he will place on an Animal Bite Report. The attendant will then wash the wound again, give a tetanus booster and call the physician on duty (MOD). A determination will be made as to whether antirabies treatment needs to be started. Unprovoked bites from stray animals would probably warrant this

The attendant will call the Security Police and the base Veterinarian. The Veterinarian will, in turn, contact the animal owner and instruct them to keep the animal under quarantine for 10 days.

The pet owner is also required to take the animal to the base Veterinarian for an exam at the start (within 24 hours of the bite) and end of the quarantine period. If the animal remains healthy all during the 10-day quarantine, then the animal does not and did not have rabies in his mouth at the time the bite occurred and the victim will not be required to take the painful 14 to 21 shot antirabies series.

If the animal dies for any reason during the quarantine period, then the animal's brain tissue must be submitted to Austin, Tex. for rabies testing and the patient started on the antirabies series.

Reserachers in the Federal Department of Health, Education, and Welfare Communicable Disease Center are trying to find a painless antirabies vaccine that only requires one or two shots instead of a series of 14 to 21. Until this new vaccine is available, we must keep doing all we can to prevent this dreaded disease.




