Most of the photographic enlargements were produced by the base Photo Lab.

NAF civilian employees get wage increase

Mixing drugs with alcohol fatal mistake

Bob woke up with the sniffles Friday morning, and killed himself and two other people Friday night.


The only things that tied these two events together were a couple of cold tablets, a few cocktails at a party, and the drive home that came to an abrupt end.

Bob and the two strangers he collide. with at a combined speed of 120 miles per hour were the victims of the "synergistic" effect of drugs combined with alcohol. This means the joint action of drugs which, when taken together, increase each others' potency.

It is what made a normally conscientious driver like Bob, who never drank to excess, exhibit all the behavioral characteristics of the town drunk, and kill with a lethal weapon — his car.

It can happen to anyone who takes frequent doses of so-called harmless drugs, usually for valid reasons and frequently under a doctor's care. A person taking several types of medication for different ailments is even more of a risk. Add only a small amount of alcohol and the results can be tragic.

Such mind-affecting drugs as diet pill tranquilizers, antihistamines, barbiturates, and bromides can impair a driver's ability to function properly on the highway. Add even a moderate amount of alcohol, and the driver's perception of time and space is altered and his driving equilibrium is thrown off. Reflexes are slowed, speech is slurred, vision is impaired, and walking is affected.



Willpower, budgeting key to successful saving plan

If a person really wants to save money, he must first understand himself. Sound like a form of "passing the buck?" Not really.

Some people are "wasters" and don't even know it. This is the man who doesn't get the last "Fzzzz" from the shaving cream can or the woman who tosses out shoes because she is "tired of them." How about the people who have the habit of eating that sandwich before bed (hungry or not), who make a separate trip to the base exchange rather than when they go to other places nearby, who buy that extra round of drinks because "Charlie always buys the last one," or who watch TV at night only to be ritually awakened by the "off the air" hum that follows the station's signoff? These are the wasters - and their number includes almost everyone in one way or another. Some people just fail to obey the law of PAYLESS supply and demand. If you earn \$400 a month, that is supply. If you spend \$400 a month, that is demand — all of it. If you want to save money, you just can't do it if you plan to spend all that you earn. You must establish priorities and stick by them. Decide what comes first. If you are to

save \$50 a month, set aside the first \$50 of your \$400, then force yourself to live on the remaining \$350.

At this point you probably say, "I can't live on that amount." If you are determined to save money, you can.

Establish a budget. Some people do this with a book, each page containing the amount of money to be used for specified things.

Set aside money in the amounts actually needed (and "needed" is the key) in three priorities: prime needs, important needs, and wants. Prime needs include food, clothing, and shelter as well as the supporting items such as gas, electricity, water, etc. For families, medical and dental care of dependents and education for children should also be included.

Reese people receive commander's thanks

I would like to take this opportunity to generally answer several Care Line inquiries concerning the labor strike which affected the use of the gates at Reese recently.

First, the restricting of usage for the golf course gate to the base was deemed necessary so that the construction worker's strike would not adversely effect the mission of the Wing. For example, if the strike picket line had been allowed to stand at both gates, then the truck lines delivering milk and other commodities to the commissary would not have been able to cross the picket line. Likewise, the same would have been true for merchandise for the Exchange and JP-4 fuel for the jet aircraft.

With the use of one gate the affected workers and suppliers of the construction companies, the picket line was then controlled.

The second point that should be addressed is that when a gate was to be designated for the exclusive use of the strike, then, under recent Supreme Court rulings, and those of the National Labor Relations Board, that gate must be restricted to the use of that group only. Therefore, none other than employees of the firms affected by the strike can use the gate, including military personnel. The carrying on of a peaceful strike by this Union is a right that free people have and is one which the Armed Forces of the United States is entrusted to protect. In conjunction with that charter, the Air Force at Reese did not and will not interfere with the relationship that the contracting agency, the Corps of Engineers, has with their contractor or employees. In this regard, I would like to thank each and every member of the Reese team for their understanding and outstanding cooperation during this period. I realize that the traffic lines have been long at times, but the adjustment that has been made bespeaks of the outstanding personnel of the Wing. Again, thanks to one and all!




Civil Service proposal seeks flexible work schedules test

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The Civil Service Commission has submitted a legislative proposal to permit controlled experiments with flexible and compressed work schedules in Federal agencies. The proposal would not reduce the present 40-hour work week for Federal employees.

The proposal would provide for a three-year test period. Alternatives to traditional work scheduling will determine what impact these schedules may have on such factors as efficiency of government operations, service to the public, mass transit facilities, and energy consumption. Under the flexible work schedule concept, or "flexitime" as it is popularly called, a "core time" during which all employees must be on the job is established. An additional period of "flexible time" is also established during which the employee may choose the additional hours he or she wishes to work to complete the 40-hour week within the limits established by the employing organization.

The proposed bill would also provide for controlled experimentation with compressed work schedules, the most common form of which is the four-day 40-hour work week. In recognition of the fact that the longer day, which is characteristic of a four-day week, may be difficult for some employees such as older workers and those with child-care responsibilities, the bill contains a provision that would allow the employing agency to exempt any employee from participation in this type of experimentation, if it would result in personal hardship.

The Commission will have the responsibility for overall coordination among agencies involved in development of the criteria to be used for evaluation.

School bells ring in change for students

Some big changes are in store for students in the Frenship School District this year, according to Wyman Richey, assistant superintendent of schools.

This year, all four schools in the district will enter the "trimester" system. Reese Elementary, Casey Elementary, Frenship Junior High and Frenship High School will enter the new system when classes begin Wednesday.

Features

Richey pointed out some of the features of the trimester plan. "Our high school students will benefit the most. Rather than have study halls as often, they will have a chance to take more electives in the course of the school year. Students may change classes every 12 weeks instead of every 18 weeks and get report cards every six weeks instead of nine weeks.'

He added that students in the lower grades would notice little change with the trimester plan.

Frenship schools, in the past, have had problems with teacher shortages. When asked if the problem arose this year, the assistant superintendent remarked, "No. As a matter of fact, we had and we wanted to keep the name, so about 250 applicants this year and only about 15 or 16 slots to fill. We were able to be pretty selective."

Registration for Frenship Schools begins Monday. Elementary and junior high school students will be taken care of Monday and high school students must complete registration Monday or Tuesday. Frenship school buses will be at Reese at 7:50 a.m., Monday to take students for registration. The buses will return before noon.



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

• to show the child how to use these exercises to stop asthmatic episodes early

• to improve exercise tolerance







Retired pay inversion amendment: hold status

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The Senate rejected Aug. 1, by a 48 to 42 retired pay on the effective date of margin, the Tower Amendment to the military procurement bill that provides legislative relief for the retired pay inversion problem. Previously, the U.S. House of Representatives had passed the bill by a 348 to 60 vote.

This means that the entire bill, Jan. 1, 1971. including the retired pay inversion amendment, is in a hold status until the House and Senate conferees can reconvene to reconcile their differences.

The Tower Amendment provides that persons who retired after Jan. 1, 1971, but prior to enactment of the legislation, will have their retired pay recalculated. If appropriate,
