Commander's Comments ...

Last week I discussed three qualities of leadership which are important to individual progression and success. They are: JOB KNOWLEDGE, SELF CONFIDENCE, and a SENSE OF HUMOR.

In continuing this subject, I would like to mention four other qualities which are most important for anyone in a supervisory position to take into consideration.

ABILITY TO LISTEN - Someone once said, in effect, that you don't learn much when your mouth is open. This is important for the leader to remember, for it is by listening and perceiving that he has the opportunity to gain "feedback," learning more about the desires, feelings and attitudes of his subordinates.

FLEXIBILITY - A leader can expect to deal with the unexpected — in the form of changing situations and a multitude of individual personalities. Being able to adapt the requirements of the job to fit specific circumstances, and still stay within established procedures, often taxes the supervisor's imagination to the utmost. However, a leader should be able to somewhat emulate the pine tree, which, although it bends with the wind, always returns to its upright position.

LOYALTY — This quality is more than a trait; it is an absolute requirement. Loyalty is often referred to as a twoway street, and I subscribe to this opinion wholeheartedly. Just as the subordinate is expected to be loyal to his supervisor and the organization, so is it imperative that the leader be loyal to those dependent upon him for guidance.

CONVICTION - Being sure you are right and pressing on no matter what the odds is an apt description of this quality. However, conviction often must be tempered with a generous amount of judgment and flexibility in order that desired results be achieved. Convictions, and the courage to carry them out, often spell the difference between an outstanding leader and a poor one. It could well be said, in this regard, that the difference between being good and being great is just a little more effort.

Next week we shall conclude this discussion with three final attributes which, I feel, are essential to the makeup of a good supervisor

In it we see the door of death swing wide into a new life, and thus there is the joy of knowing that this present life with its fears, disappointments, sorrows and trials, and yes, even its joys has its fulfillment in something greater, the greater life of eternity.

Yet, seeing this door of death swing wide into a new life, there is, too, a distinct and healthy note of fear in facing the endless stretches that will satisfy our hearts. For if death is conquered and life goes on forever, while the good is preserved, the record of evil, too has to be faced. The man who is utterly fearless at such a prospect is somewhat of

Briefly, the conquest of death not only opens up the possibilities of heaven but also of hell; it guarantees judgment, complete and accurate casting up of all accounts. This life then, must be lived with a view to eternity. This is the only safe and sane course




