

### Doctor Credits Corpsmen's Acts With Preventing Death

Thanks to two Reese Air Force Base hospital corpsmen and their knowledge of emergency procedures, A3C David Russell of the 3500th Supply Squadron is alive and well today.

It was just another day the morning of Oct. 21 when A3C Robert E. Rockhold, medical service specialist, and A2C David A. Boyd, Rockhold's on-the-job training assistant, were giving flu shots in Base Supply.

One of about 70 airmen who already had passed through the line, Airman Russell had returned to his desk before beginning to feel ill. Shortly thereafter he fell over, unconscious. From that moment things

happened fast.

ammonia and Russell became partially conscious. Believing the worst to be over, Rockhold returned to the shot-giving area, while Boyd stayed at Rusell's side.

Russell collapsed once more. Again, Rockhold was summoned as Boyd started mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Rockhold began clos-

ed chest massage, pumping Russell's chest with his hands.
Rockhold took a moment to call the hospital emergency room and in minutes Dr. Gary Jones arrived by ambulance.

'Airman Russell's breathing had Airman Russell's breathing had stopped and no heartbeat was heard by the airman," reported Dr. Jones later. "On arrival at the scene I noted the patient not to be breathing; a very weak thready radial pulse was palpable and his pupils were dilated; his color was ashen." ashen.

Dr. Jones gave a shot of medi-cine intended to help the heart beat and restore breathing. gen was administered. Airman Russell responded somewhat and hospital emergency room.


"I feel the man may very well have died without the level-headedness and quick thinking of Airmen Rockhold and Boyd,'



#### Academy Asks Application From Airmen

(ATCPS) — Young, single airmen in Air Training Command may be overlooking a chance to apply for admission to the Air Force Academy. Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. John P. McConnell recently expressed this view in an all commands letter.

"The interest among young airmen in applying for the Academy and the Preparatory School has not met our expectations," General McConnell stated. "We believe," he added, "that this may be due in part to the fact that some airmen are not aware of the

opportunities available to them."
Each ATC base has appointed a project officer to counsel interested airmen on the Academy program, entrance requirements and application procedures. The project officer at Reese AFB is 1st Lt." Harold Campbell.

There are two methods by which airmen may be appointed to fill vacancies — direct appointment vacancies — direct appointment and through the Academy Pre-paratory School. These are described in AFR 53-10 and AFR 53-14, respectively.

Appointment vacancies in each class entering the Academy are provided by law. There were 27 vacancies that were available qualified airmen in the class which entered in June and the number of such vacancies will reach 85 by

Airmen desiring more informa-tion should contact their base project officer.

The Air Force by Presidential order must "provide, as directed by proper authority, such missions and detachments for service in foreign countries as may be required to support the national policies and interests of the United States."

To answer this, we must briefly retrace the history of welfare funds in the United States military services. In the days of the Old West, Army Posts were established in remote areas. Supplies were often hard to come by, especially luxury

As a result, Suttler Stores sprang up on these installations. A suttlers further agreed to donate was allowed to operate a profitmaking enterprise on post. These suttlers further agreed to donate a small percentage of their profits to the post commander. This money was used to aid needy dependents and for other purposes deemed necessary by the commander.

This system has expanded to our present Army and Air Force Exchange Service. The Army and Air Force Motion Picture Service has also been added. Both organizations now comprise the funding source of the non-appropriated fund - morale, recreation, and welfare program. The Base Ex-change Service contributes 85 per cent of its profits yearly ward the welfare program and the Motion Picture Service is assessed 15 per cent of its profits. This amounted to approximately \$110

million in 1964.

This money is deposited in a central welfare fund, administered by a board composed of senior officers from the Army and Air Force Military Branches, with the funds divided between the Military Branches based on military strength. Each board in turn divides their dollars among the major commands. The money is then allotted to the respective installations based once again upon military strength.

Each command, along with the Central Welfare Fund, withholds a certain amount of money for contigencies and grants. Grants obtained through this program are used to construct and equip many morale, recreation, and welfare activities. Part of the dollar you spent today at your Base Exchange or theater will come back to you in the form of a service elsewhere on base, and there you have the reason for the BX and Theater. 
