Air Force takes new action to solve copilot overmanning

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The Air the overmanning in copilot flying

Cockpit requirements and associated flying hours have declined more rapidly in recent years than the pilot inventory could be reduced. One result is that temporary overmanning among copilots in multiengine aircraft has reached levels that, if continued, will not allow young pilots to gain experience at acceptable rates.

Air Force officials expect future inventory adjustments to reduce this overmanning. Meanwhile, two programs have been developed to provide some short-term relief while presenting young rated officers with excellent career-broadening opportunities outside of the cockpit.

The temporary augmentee Force is taking new action to reduce support program (TASP) and temporary overmanning of the operations staff (TOOS) have been approved for implementation in the Military Airlift Command and Strategic Air Command. These programs will permit young pilots to gain experience in nonrated and operations staff positions, followed by a return to cockpit duties.

> Officers with 500 to 1,000 hours of total flying time who have at least one year of aircrew experience, following completion of their aircraft qualification course, are eligible for the TASP/TOOS programs for a maximum of one year. Officers with between 1,000 and 1,500 hours can participate for a maximum of two years.

Officials emphasize that the large majority of these assignments will not involve permanent changes of station. After one of these assignments, participants will be returned to their original crew duties. Additionally, major commands will provide ground and simulator training wherever possible in order to reinforce the officers' rated skills.

Air Force officials point out that ongoing programs, such as the rated supplement and the feet-on-theramp programs, will continue to ease aircrew overmanning. Together, these programs will allow young rated officers to gain valuable experience outside the cockpit while permitting a more efficient use of limited flying time.

Enlisted personnel wear new chevrons

(AFNS) - With certain temporary exceptions, personnel promoted to E-2, E-3, or E-4 will wear new chevrons with a blue star in lieu of the current silver star according to Air Force personnel officials.

The new chevrons are available in the Base Exchange. However, they will not be available at Clothing Sales for at least a month.

To keep from requiring people to purchase chevrons in the BX, special rules have been set. People promoted to E-3/E-4 after June 1 may (1) Elect to continue wearing their old chevrons at the lower grade until new chevrons for the higher grade are available at the Clothing Sales Store, or (2) they may buy the new chevrons in the BX.

Personnel currently serving in grades E-2 or E-3 are not required to change to the new insignia until they are promoted to the next higher

Since chevrons are part of the clothing issue at Basic Military Training (BMT), personnel who entered BMT before June 1 will have been issued the old style chevrons. To avoid wasting these chevrons, the following rules will apply for these individuals:

•Four year enlistees who entered BMT prior to June 1 are authorized to wear the old style E-2 chevron (Silver Star) upon their initial promotion to E-2. They will be required to wear the new style chevron (Blue Star) when promoted

·Six year enlistees who entered BMT prior to June 1 were issued E-3 chevrons; consequently, they are authorized to wear the old style chevron (Silver Star) upon their initial promotion to E-3. They will be required to wear the new style chevron (Blue Star) when promoted

A good number of you have already heard me say that our biggest problem is communication. It is, and I mean it. Benefit Program has disadvantages

Even with its disadvantages, SBP is worth consideration by every member with dependents, but it is not necessarily best for everyone.

'Survivor Benefit Plan for Retired Members of the Uniformed Services" (DOD PA-11A) points to three circumstances in which the retiring person would not be "strongly encouraged to participate in SBP at the maximum level". They

· "When he or she has taken other obviously adequate measures to provide survivor protection for his or her spouse and dependent children.

• "When total family assets are so substantial that part of the member's retired pay is not needed to assure adequate protection for the survivors.

• "When a retiree's spouse is near or past age 62, since SBP payments are reduced by Social Security eligibility of the beneficiary."

The first two categories are of particular interest. In many cases, especially for members under age 50, a substantial amount of life insurance can give more flexibility and avenues of choice than can

For members who are still several years away from retirement, a buildwill make last minute decisions unnecessary and will be less expensive.

Following is a comparison between SBP and life insurance in a number of pertinent areas.

INSURABILITY: Not required under SBP. Evidence of insurability, usually a medical examination required by insurance

PREMIUM OR COST: SBP reduction in pay may be less, comparable to term insurance required to provide the same amount of monthly income. However, although life insurance in the required amount might cost more initially, there are two important up of insurance and investments offsetting factors - a build-up of

cash value and a gradual reduction in cost through annual dividends. For example, by the 20th year most participating (mutual) companies are paying a dividend equal to approximately 50 per cent of the gross annual premium. In effect, SBP is like a tax deduction from gross pay. Life insurance premiums are not deductible. SBP reduction continues for life even if all eligible beneficiaries die. With life insurance, you have a choice of cashing in the policy, stopping payment and taking a reduced, paidup policy, or continuing the policy. Obviously, you also can select another beneficiary.

LIMITATIONS: None with SBP. Life insurance contracts contain a two-year suicide clause and a twoyear contestable period.

PROCEEDS AT DEATH OF INSURED: SBP income is taxable as received by the beneficiary. Life insurance proceeds are received income tax-free. Furthermore, the proceeds can be invested in taxexempt bonds currently yielding more than eight per cent, thus preserving the capital and avoiding

SOCIAL SECURITY: Offsets decision.

TOTAL DISABILITY: The SBP reduction continues. A life insurance policy can be issued with a provision to waive the premium if you are totally disabled.

CONTROL: SBP is almost entirely beyond your control. Once in effect, life insurance becomes a unilateral contract you control.

All of these are elements to consider. Obviously, it is of great advantage if you can consider these years ahead of time, acquire insurance and other assets early rates do go up with age - adopt a plan, and stick with it.

Sex is for union



July's SRB list deletes, adds certain career fields

for Zone A selective reenlistment bonus (SRB) has been approved by the Air Force and will be effective

The current list will expire for all new applications on that day. However, the list will remain active for retrainees who are in technical training on the notification date, which was June 1.

Terminations

Following is a list of career fileds which will lose their SRB July 1: 304X1, 304X6, 326X2, 328X3, 307X0, 316X1, 316X2, 317X0, 326X0, 326X1, 328X1, 328X4, 341X1, 341X2, 341X7, (345X0), 541X0, 208X0, (203X1), 206X0, 276X0, 276X1, 276X2, 303X2, 304X0, and 691X0.

Airmen may still collect the SRB in the above career fields if they reenlist before July 1.

Reductions

Four career fields will have their SRB reduced to multiple 2 July 1. They are: 304X5 from SRB-3, 463X0 from SRB-3, 464X0 from SRB-4, and 511X2 from SRB-3.

Increases

The following specialties will have their SRB multiple increased to level indicated, effective July 1.

Personnel in retraining status will still qualify for SRB payment in specialties that will be deleted or reduced if they are retraining in conjunction with the Careers Program as of June 1. Airmen in retraining who desire to qualify for the SRB must: (a) sign a reenlistment intent statement indicating they intend to reenlist immediately in the SRB skill upon class graduation/upgrade and qualification at the three skill in the training-in AFSC; (b) reenlist immediately following class graduation/upgrade (within five days) unless a waiver is granted by AFMPC/DPMC. The commitment for the Air Force to pay the SRB expires after five working days, and personnel who reenlist subsequent to the five day suspense are not entitled to the SRB at the level before termination or reduction was

AF offers incentive pay to self movers

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Do it yourself household goods moves will pay members part of the money they are now saving the government.

A proposal to pay members an incentive for making "Do It Yourself Moves" was approved by the Joint Service Per-Diem Committee and has been in effect since June 1.

Do it vourself moves are optional and officials expect them to be used primarily by persons with small or

Do it yourself moves works as

A member desiring to use the "do it yourself" method will contact the Traffic Management Officer (TMO) as he would for any other move. The TMO, after counseling the member, contacts the local designated rental dealer and authorizes the issue of an appropriate size truck or trailer and packing materials. The member picks up the equipment, packs and loads his property, drives to the authorized destination, unloads the truck or trailer, and delivers it to the designated rental dealer at destination. Before leaving, one must have a weight ticket to document the weight of the shipment in order to be paid by the Finance Office. The weight ticket can be obtained at any Air Force Base.

The origin base Finance Office next figures the incentive to be paid the member. It is figured at 75 per cent of what it would have cost to make the shipment by government Bill of Lading (GBL), minus the U-Haul costs. The member is paid the difference by the Accounting and Finance Office.

If property is lost or damaged during the "Do it yourself" move and the member can establish it was not his fault or negligance, payments may be made under the Military Personnel and Civilian Employee Claims Act.

The maximum that can be paid under this law is \$15,000. However. there are many other limitations to this law say legal officials.

Officials say members can use privately owned trucks and trailers to make "Do it yourself" moves. Campers, pickups and vans may not be used for making "Do it yourself" moves. Using one's own vehicle is more complex and requires two weight tickets; one for the vehicle's empty weight and the other with the cargo load.



- Start with short, 15-minute exposures and gradually increase
- · Don't rely entirely on commercial suntan products to prevent sunburn. They're inadequate, unless a sunscreen is used with them. The best sunscreens contain para amino benzoic acid (PABA), and should be used daily two or three days before you get into the sun. PABA is incorporated into the skin, and will not wash off as easily as commercial products.
- · Avoid strong rays between 1000 and 1500 hours.

- · Latitude is the most important factor influencing the amount of burning rays reaching the skin. The lower the latitude,
- the greater the risk of sunburn. · Sunburn can occur on hazy,
- foggy and/or overcast days. · Reflected rays off snow, water and sand can cause sun-
- If you do get mildly sunburned, aspirin is sometimes prescribed to relieve pain and aching, and cool compresses with milk or water for 20 minutes, every two or three hours.

For severe sunburn, see a doctor. Some severe sunburns require hospitalization and treatment similar to thermal burns.

Academy dedicates new dorm

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The newest Air Force Academy cadet dormitory has been dedicated in memory of Capt. Lance P. Sijan before an assembly of the cadet

Sijan, a 1965 graduate of the Air Force Adademy, died in a North Vietnamese prisoner-of-war camp in 1968. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions while in captivity. Sijan is the only academy graduate to have earned the Nation's highest military honor.

The captain's parents attended the ceremonies. They later watched the unveiling of their son's portrait in Arnold Hall Theater.

Gratuities rule applies to all ranks

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Deputy Secretary of Defense William P. Clements, Jr., says that conflict-ofinterest rules which prohibit accepting gratuities from Defense contractors apply to everyone in the Armed Forces including junior officers and enlisted men.

He stressed that regulations are not merely limited to senior civilian and military officials, but prohibit such social amenities from Defense contractors as accepting free lunches and golf gar-es.

In a recent "Directions 76" American Forces Radio and Television Service interview, Mr. Clements pointed out that the ban applies from high officials to the mid-management level, and that every enlisted man "just has to hold himself above that sort of thing and not subject himself to criticism by taking gratuities, by taking a Christmas present, by taking lunches or dinners or a golf game, or whatever it might be.'

The Deputy Secretary gave this rationale: people are the biggest asset in the Department of Defense and the American public has to have absolute confidence in all of our

"We just have to hold ourselves apart from that kind of criticism," Mr. Clements said.

And for would-be duck hunters, he added, "Pick a duck-hunting friend who doesn't work for a Defense



Needless pain results from everyday activities

Accidents in ATC during May resulted in 51 injuries - three of which required hospitalization.

The injuries occurred in a wide routine day-to-day chores to calf, roping. Following is a brief description of a few of them.

•An airman first class cut his hand on a pane of glass stored beside his bed.

•A second lieutenant picked up a soldering iron. He burned his hand because he picked it up by the wrong ceiling while running and jumping downstairs.

•An airman first class cut his variety of activities ranging from hand twice during the month. Once while prying frozen steaks apart with a knife; then several days later, while prying on an engine part with a screw driver.

> •Two civilians sustained eye injuries in separate mishaps. Neither wore the required protective safety glasses.

•Finally a staff sergeant who was

•A sergeant hit his head on the squatted near the edge of his roof, bent over and you guesses it toppled from the roof onto the ground. He suffered a fractured spine and wrist.

> The remaining accidents are equally senseless happenings. The old saying, "There's a right way and a wrong way to do it," holds the key to avoiding similar embarrassing, if not downright painful, mishaps. A little forethought, application of common sense, and less hasty actions is all it takes.



West Texas has several good off road bike trails

If, with the coming of such fine spring weather, you've been searching for a place to ride that high fendered, knobbie tired nonstreet legal bike of yours, you're not alone - I've been looking for two years. But don't lose hope; there are some spots that are pretty good, and more seem to be opening up.

The single area nearby is often referred to as the pit, due to its onetime status as a source of gravel. Located just north of the Loop off route 84, the pit has several acres open to dirt riders. Though you'll cover all the trails in fairly short order, it can offer some challenges and is the only truely local riding

An area that offers a lot of promise has just recently been leased and opened south of Lubbock just off the caprock. Stovall's Yamaha controls the property, and by contacting them you can (for \$4 a day) secure permission and a map showing you how to get there. I've ridden the area once, and found it a nice change of pace. There are numerous dirt roads and some trails that will challenge the experts. In fact, part of the 1975 Post National Enduro course lies in the riding area.

Probably the best spot around is a good 140 miles and three hours away to the north of Amarillo. If you

Canadian River and turn right. you'll find mile after mile of all sorts of trails. There's a variety of terrain here-hills, sand, whoop-te-doos, and water. And once again, many dirt roads are available for the casual rider. One of the nicest things about this area is plenty of spots to camp. It makes for a super weekend to take your tent along and spend a relaxing evening gazing into a campfire.

do we define communication? Exactly what is it?

Dozens of definitions have been offered, but they all depend upon the author of the book we read and his personal interests. Basically, Ithink it can be boiled down to the transmitting of needs, ideas, or feelings from one person to another person or to a group of people, usually to achieve a specific purpose.

The art of effective communication is generally considered to be a recent development; however, the oldest fragment of manuscript

The flick of a switch or the turn of a knob will bring the far corners of the world into our home. Where would we be today without it? Individual opinion and national and international events are influenced or controlled through mass communication. Our daily lives would be very dull and perhaps unbearable without newspapers, TV or personal contact and conversation. We must have communications!

So much for definitions, history, and philosophy. Let's talk about daily communication here at Reese. How many times do problems occur where the only excuse to be offered is that "I didn't hear that," or "I didn't understand it that way." I am afraid this happens all too frequently, but

why should it happen? Effective communications is and must be an uncluttered two way street between management and every worker. Perception or understanding of what is said is the key. The same word can have different definitions. Also, individuals will react differently because of inattention, distractions, or other factors of the situation in which the communication occurs. More abstract things such as the mood of the individual or the personal or official relationship between people can drastically affect what people "hear". A group of people listening to a presentation or instructions may have considerably different impressions of what the speaker was trying to convey. By the time this personal interpretation is passed through several levels of management the original intent of the communication may be totally distorted. Also, consider that delayed communication can result in unnecessary rumors based on inaccurate or imcomplete information.

Clear, concise, and timely communication is necessary for effective accomplishment of our jobs whether you are a commander, a flight mechanic on the line, or an administrative clerk. Our words must convey an accurate picture of what is required so the desired end product wil be available when it is needed. Too late, too little, or even too much can be equally disastrous. The wrong information costs us time, wasted dollars, and perhaps most importantly, people who are unhappy or do unnecessary work when "the word" is not properly passed. In today's Air Force, we cannot afford to have either misinformed or ple. Do your uninformed part in iz. or ¿ communications and ever eat Reese will benefit.


