The boy had just begun swimming lessons and his confidence had developed much further than his swimming ability. Since Sergeant Eldridge was soaking wet, he and his sons had to cut their fishing trip short. However, thanks to them, a young boy would not have his life cut short.

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The President has signed the Department of Defense Authorization Act 1977. The law contains significant changes to leave accrual and settlements for enlisted personnel.

authorized to sell any part of their leave balance and carry forward the remainder. However, the provision that no more than 60 days of leave may be sold by a member during an entire Air Force career was extended indefinitely.

The law deleted the entitlements Individuals who reenlist on their of basic allowance for subsistance expiration term of service or enter (BAS) and basic allowance for quarters (BAQ) on accrued leave

effective Sept. 1. Only basic pay will be paid after this date.

A save-pay provision in the law covers leave balances through Aug. 31. This means that individuals reenlisting after Aug. 31 will be able to collect BAS and BAQ on leave accrued to that date. However, on Aug. 31, leave balance will be reduced anytime a members takes

more leave than he/she has accrued effective Sept. 1.

Changes in the law were prompted for two reasons, cost and the intent of Congress to have service members take leave. Officials said experience has shown that the privilege of selling back more than 60 days of leave acted as an incentive for service members not to take leave. It is the intent of

Congress that leave be used as it is accrued for the purpose for which it is intended — relief from an oftentimes ardous work environment and as an aid to improve motivation and job performance.

OFFUTT AFB, NEB. (AFNS) -Three Air Force SR-71 reconnaissance aircraft broke six records previously held by Soviet MIG-25 and U.S. Air Force YF-12 aircraft. On July 27 and 28 the aircraft set records for flight over a verification.

1,000 kilometer, closed-circuit course, over a 15/25 kilometer straight course and for altitude in horizontal flight.

The records are unofficial. pending certification by the Federation Aeronautique International (FAI). The FAI is the accrediting organization for all aviation records.

First Record

On July 27 the first record-settingflight took place when Maj. Adolphus H. Bledsoe Jr., pilot, and Maj. John T. Fuller, reconnaissance systems officer (RSO), flew the SR-71 to 2,116 miles per hour. This set new marks for the world-absolute and-class records for speed over a closed-circuit course.

consecutive passes without varying altitude more than 150 feet between the two passes. Initial indications were that the first 15/25 kilometer straight-course attempt might not be recognized because of incomplete

Altitude accuracy is verified in two ways: By radar which is accurate to within 170 feet; and by highly calibrated cameras. On the second pass, high cloud cover prevented photo verification during the last few seconds of the run.

There was no problem with the speed of the record attempt, which was enough to establish a record. However, accurate altitude measurements are an integral part of the official record scoring.

Altitude Record

Capt. Robert C. Helt, pilot, and Maj. Larry A. Elliot, RSO, flew to 85,100 feet July 28 to set unofficial world-absolute and class altitude records for horizontal flight.

The course was 1,000 kilometers (621.4 miles) long above Edwards AFB, Calif. The plane had a payload of 2,200 pounds. The previous record was 1,853 m.p.h., held by a Soviet MIG-25 Foxbat.

Speed Record

Flying 2,194 m.p.h. on July 28, a second SR-71 bettered two records and topped unofficial records set just the day before. Capt. Eldon W. Joersz, pilot, and Maj. George T. Morgan, RSO, set world-absolute and class speed records over a 15/25 kilometer straight course.

The same crew on July 27 flew 2,189 m.p.h. to break the record of 2,070.101 m.p.h. set by the YF-12A prototype sistership of the SR-71.

FAI certification requires the aircraft to accomplish two

The flight breaks the reocrd of 80,257 feet held by the YF-12A.

The same SR-71 crew flew to 86,000 feet July 27 in an attempt to break the record. However, the FAI requires aircraft to maintain a level altitude during record attempts. There was a possibility that the SR-71 may have varied its altitude in the first attempt.

Since verification equipment and FAI scoring officials were available July 28, the makeup day, it was decided to run second record attempts and submit all flights for approval to resolve any possible lack of official verification.

The SR-71 holds two other records, set in 1974. The plane flew from New York to London in 1 hour and 55 minutes and from London to Los Angeles in 3 hours and 47 minutes.


Dear Sir:

Pharmacy provides vital services to Reese people

Most of us thing of a pharmacy as a place where we turn in a piece of paper (a prescription) and are in turn given some pills, an ointment, some syrup or another form of medication prescribed by a physician or other health professional. Perhaps it would be helpful to know what your Reese Hospital's pharmacy is and does.

The USAF Hospital at Reese provides a full service outpatient prescription department which serves active duty personnel, their dependents, retirees and their dependents. The pharmacy department is managed by a professional pharmacist, a highly skilled senior pharmacy technician, and three dedicated pharmacy specialists.

The medication prescribed by your physician is an integral part of the total health care system. The medicines that are dispensed at the pharmacy are extremely high quality medicines that have met the potency and bioavailability criteria imposed by the Food and Drug Administration and the Quality Assurance Branch of the Defense Personnel Support Center. Our stocks of medicines are not all inclusive; we do not have a sample of all drugs available in the country. Instead, we stock those drugs which our physicians and other health providers have decided they wish to use on a regular basis. As new drugs are marketed, our stocks of drugs change if our providers decide to add a newer product to our regular inventory.

Another service the pharmacy provides is the filling of prescriptions written by civilian practitioners. When the civilian practitioner prescribes a name brand product that the pharmacy does not stock, the pharmacy personnel makes every effort to





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


Health-and-welfare shipments get axe

Persons who have bought health and welfare items before Aug. 1, 1976, will be granted shipping authority upon evidence of date of purchase or certification of the date of purchase if documentation is not available. Items acquired on or after Aug. 1, 1976, will not be considered for approval.

Excess weight allowances will still be approved for special equipment or medical supplies required by a doctor.

Exceptions will also be made when overseas housing supply can not furnish certain items such as refrigerators or stoves. Persons going to bases with shortage of items may get permission to ship their own refrigerator or stove in addition to their regular shipment weight.

Six month evaluation reveals improved equal opportunity

Force has finished a six-month evaluation of its equal opportunity and human relations education programs.

Major areas evaluated included the human relations education program, the Air Force equal opportunity affirmative actions plan, and the equal opportunity programs for military and civilian

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Air personnel. The needs of personnel assigned to small, often isolated sites, were also examined.

> To measure program achievement and set a future course of action, 35,000 Air Force military and civilian personnel were surveryed between November 1975 and January 1976. Results confirmed the program had improved equal opportunity and human relations.

Phase III human relations education training will begin in September. This program will focus on the supervisor's role in combating unfair treatment.

An updated affirmative actions plan will allow commanders to compare unit progress in achieving equal opportunity goals with progress thorughout the Air Force. Key career actions, such as promotions and attendance at service schools, will be carefully evaluated for imbalances in race, sex, or ethnic background.

Air Force people programs for personnel assigned at small sites will receive emphasis. Personnel officials say the new actions will ensure greater goal achievement.

Air Force begins new flu program

On Aug. 15, the Air Force will instate a program to study the Swine Influenza that is expected to sweep the U.S. this winter.

The program will last from August through the end of March, and will include all Air Force installations with medical facilities. It has been dubbed the "1976-1977 Influenza Surveillance Program," and as the title suggests, it is only for study and not treatment of the disease.

Every tenth patient who meets the criteria set forth by Air Force authorities will be tested and observed by Reese medical personnel.

The criteria that must be met before one is eligible for the tests are as follows: A temperature of 101 degrees or more, the illness can not have lasted more than three days, and the subject must be more than 5 years of age.

One out of every ten of the people meeting this criteria will be asked to gargle three times in order to produce a specimen for study. They will also be subject to a blood test and a subsequent blood test 14 to 21 days late.

This information will help Air Force Medical Personnel monitor the frequency and severity of influenza in various geographic locations within the Air Force.



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
Fish Tournament
