

H. D. Clubs Help In **Making Floyd County** Farms Pay Dividends

Thousands of dollars worth of food, profits on poultry and farm products, better homes, and many happy families all go to show that Floyd County women did a big job this year in helping to keep ex-penses down on the farm and in turning much home-grown stuff into profit as shown in the annual re-, port just completed of the county home demonstration agent, Miss Martha Faulkner.

The records of the 4-H pantry demonstrators show the greatest amount of work done while the poultry demonstrators come in for a large share of the profits that were made during the year just closed. The report shows that there were 14 active home demonstration clubs in the county during the past year with a total enrollment of 337 members and 8 4H Girls Club with 100 members

In the pantry work there were 14 demonstrators with 322 pantry co-operators and 352 special cooperators, the latter are those women who do not belong to organized home demonstration clubs but who were aided by club women in canning and other activities of food conservation.

The total number of quarts and pounds of fruits, vegetables, meats and preserves put up by the women is 424,102 and the estimated value of the products is \$133,554.52.
