CO-OPS' HIGH SALARIES

Everybody in every line has been put "on the spot" by those with whom they come in contact during the past eighteen months and the pressure is becoming more pronounced as time rolls along and all the relief measures adopted to date have come to nought so far as reviving business and raising commodity prices for farmers to the pro-

fit-point is concerned. Among those who have been criticized are the co-operatives who have gone out in the market to buy capable and honest management for their various enterprises. Tremendously high wages have been paid and are being paid in some instances. This practice has been under fire from numerous angles. It has gone so far as to be suggested seriously that congress should limit the salaries that may be paid legal-

"While the purpose is to do something that will be helpful best judgment is that such legislation would work irreparable harm to the co-operative movement. Co-operatives, to succeed, must have management equal to or better than that Entered as second class matter of competitors in the private trade such management is by paying salaries comparable to those obtainable for similar work in similar lines for other employers.

The argument that a co-operative manager is a "public servant" is incorrectly taken, those who favor high salaries declare, because such an employe is hired to function as merchandiser of the members products and not to perform a pub-

The point which is sometimes overlooked is that a \$10,000 man might be a lot cheaper in the long run than a man who would work for his board and room in any line of business. 




