# In Doubt This Morning

Terrell, Thompson, Pierson **Command Lead In** Run-Off.

(By Texas Election Bureau) In Judge and Sheriff Contests Dallas, Texas, Aug. 28 — The Democratic nomination for the governorship of Texas was in doubt when the Texas Election Bureau had tabulated more than 850,000 votes and closed for the night at 1:30 o'clock this morning. Governor Sterling maintained a fair lead, at one time being around 22,000 until more than seven hundred thousand votes had been counted, then went into second place. Mrs. Ferguson's lead afterward went above four thousand, then dwindled away, leaving Sterling in first place again, by a slim majority of 2601 votes with the chances perhaps fifty-fifty that he would or would not stay there.

Returns to the Texas Election Bureau at 1:30 a.m. from 233 out of 254 counties in the state, including 108 complete, show the following totals for candidates in Saturday's Democratic run-off primary: Governor: Ferguson
