HOMER ALTMAN TRIAL AT HASKELL IS UNDER WAY

J. A. Grigsby, Lee Howard, R. H. Willis and Bob Smith, of Floydada, are among the witnesses at Haskell this week in the trial of Homer Altman, former Floyd County boy, on a charge of murder, growing out of the death in Stonewall County last year of J. A. Tanner, ranchman. Tanner was found dead in the hog pen at his ranch with a bullet wound in his body.

The local men, two of whom are officers at present, and the fourth, J. A. Grigsby, a former sheriff, are character witnesses for the defendant. Altman was reared to young manhood in this county and lived here for nearly a year three years ago. The present trial is the second held.

Lionel Barrymore, awarded last year's acting trophy from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, has the grand characterization of Kringelin, a humdrum factory clerk who registers at the Grand Hotel to enjoy a brief period of splendor before he dies. This is his second appearance with his brother, John, with whom he recently played in "Arsene Lupin."


Lewis Stone as the shell-shocked doctor and Jean Hersholt as the porter who is anxious about the birth of his baby, head the large supporting cast, which includes Robert McWade, Purnell B. Pratt, Ferdinand Gottschalk, Rafael Ottonio, Morgan Wallace, Tully Marshall, Frank Conroy, Murray Kinell and Edwin Maxwell. In all some seventy individual parts are in the pictureization of the play, all of them important regardless of brevity.




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
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
