

HORSE PARASITE CONTROL

In studies of drugs to remove internal parasites of horses, scientists of the United States Department of Agriculture have found that the drug, carbon disulphide, used for the removal of bots and other intestinal parasites from horses, could also be made effective against certain species of large stomach worms of horses, for which previous treatments were of slight value.

This was accomplished by using a stomach tube for washing out the stomach with an alkaline solution to remove the excessive mucous secretions and then administering the drug. Previous methods of treatment had failed because large stomach worms are protected by the mucous coating of the stomach lining and drugs administered without preliminary washing of the stomach had little or no action on the worms. In tests of the new method of treatment, 98 per cent of the stomach worms were killed. 
