All of the school board members were present, including A. B. Larimore, C. W. Watson, Preston Bruton, Rhea Foster, Leon Creel, Liston Hearne, Gene Lowe, as well as Supt. Wayne Hale and J. W. Murphree, principal.

The purpose of the meeting was to clear up some questions that some people had submitted, and did not understand or know about.

Supt. Hales presided at the meeting, and had with him a list of about fifteen questions that had been submitted by a committee, dealing with what is an Independent School District, base pay for teachers, minutes of the school board, discipline, finances, and others dealing with almost every phase of how our school system operates. Supt. Hales took one question at a time, breaking it down, explaining each and answering each question simply and factual. The audience was very attentive and went away better enlightened on the problems of the school when the meeting was over.

Other talks were made by J. W. Murphree, A. B. Larimore and Rhea Foster.

It was a good meeting—an orderly meeting—and one which we think was good for the community as a whole. We wish it were possible to have other like meetings dealing with other problems of our community.

Newcastle has the reputation of pulling together on all problems—let's keep that spirit alive.

## Father and son drown in Graham Lake, Sunday

A father and son were drowned in Lake Graham, about 6 miles southeast of Newcastle, Sunday afternoon.

The victims, identified as Albert Perdue, 53, of Wichita Falls, and his teen age son Albert Perdue Jr., were seen to fall from a boat about 2 p. m.

Mrs. Howard Bigham of Graham and her three children were fishing on the bank and saw the outboard motor boat tilt suddenly as if it had struck a submerged object. Mrs. Bigham said two persons fell into the water, the man screaming for help.

Her husband, Howard Bigham, and another Graham man, Lonnie Love, were working on a fence near the lake. Mrs. Bigham ran up the embankment and told them of the accident. They ran to the edge of the water in time to see two persons sinking from sight in water 20 to 30 feet deep.

The elder Perdue's body was recovered about 3:45 p. m. and his son's body about 4:30 p. m.

Graham Police Chief Raymond Burkett was fishing nearby and saw the empty, runaway boat pass him. He overtook the boat, unaware of the accident, and made it secure to the bank. Both bodies were taken to Morrison Funeral Home in Graham.

This was the first drowning since the lake was completed about six years ago.

## Two producers completed north of Newcastle

Graham Brothers of Graham completed two wells in the Regular Field 3 1/2 miles north of Newcastle, section 2245, TE&L survey A-1078.

No. A-2 Taack pumped 27 barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 25 per cent water, per day from 24 perforations at 720-726 feet. The 4 1/2 inch production string was landed at 748 feet after hole was bottomed at 755 feet.

No. 3-A Taack had a daily pumping potential of 45 1/2 barrels of crude from 24 perforations at 726-731 feet. The 4 1/2 inch casing was cemented three feet above bottom at 750 feet.

She stayed with and cared for bedridden friends, and she had a wonderful knowledge of human ills and knew so much about treating so many things. Her so-called home remedies were medically sound, and she helped us thru times of sickness and sorrow.

Her physical stamina was amazing. Things she did physically were almost unbelievable for one of her age. Her garden, her lawn, and her flowers were cared for with a force and a zeal unheard of for one of her age. So often we heard "How does she do what she does as old as she is?" Even in her last days in the hospital, the doctors and nurses were amazed at her strength.

Despite pain, sorrow, loss of loved ones and having few of the material things to make life

easy, Mrs. Emma never grumbled. Her life wasn't easy by any means. She lost a husband, her father, and a child within a few weeks time, and then her only other son was lost in World War One never to be found or heard of. So, life truly wasn't easy for her. But whatever came to Mrs. Emma, she took it stoically and cheerfully. As she so often said, "I'm just fine, no one wants to hear about my aches and pains." So she just smiled and never complained.

Even though she lost her real family, she had another wonderful family—the Woodriddle family. She took them when they were small and cared for them, kept them together as a family and sent them to school until all three finished High School. Glynn, Sue Jo and Freddy were her children. She loved them and cared for them through their formative years after their father and mother died. And they, in turn, loved "Mrs. Emma." She was their rock to lean on, to go to for help and counsel. She was their firm, kind, and loving guide during those young years. They, too, stood by Mrs. Emma during her time of sickness and death. Glynn being so young when she came to them, made her feel perhaps a more decided closeness to him, and she looked to him in her last months, and came to lean more heavily on him. And he certainly stood by her throughout her last days.

Mrs. Emma was indeed a friend to her fellow man and we shall miss her more than words can express. To say we have lost a friend seems inadequate; we have lost more than a friend, we've lost a dearly loved, never to be forgotten wonderful member of our little community.

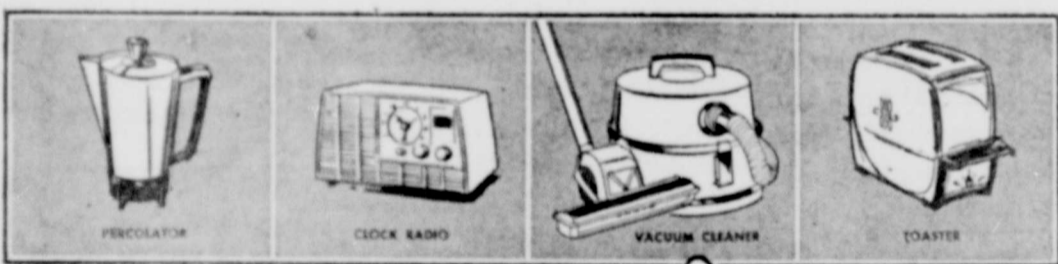

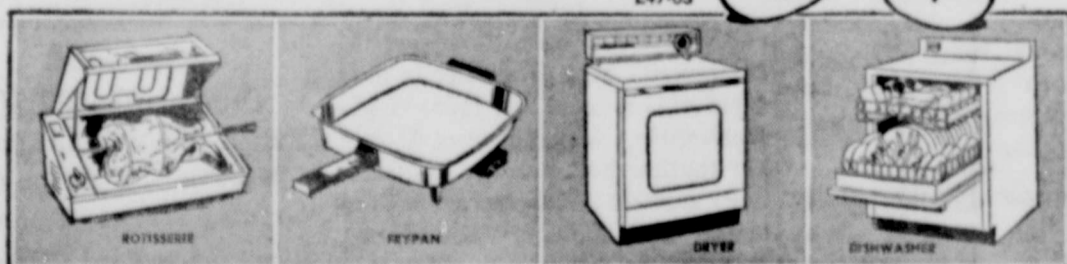
