Andy Tetmeyer, 55-year resident, dies from heart attack near Olney, Friday

Andrew L. Tetmeyer, 63, died from a heart attack about 7 a. m. Friday as he was driving his pick-up truck, three miles south of Olney. The pick-up left the highway went through a fence and finally stopped in a wheatfield.

M. H. Davidson, traveling behind Tetmeyer, witnessed the accident and notified police officers Justice of Peace Sam Furr Jr. and other officers investigated. Furr ruled that Tetmeyer died of natural causes.

Andrew L. Tetmeyer, had been identified with the business life of Newcastle for several years, retiring from the grocery business about three years ago. He had been a resident of this community for the past 55 years. Born on Feb. 26, 1901 at Pokay, Iowa, he moved to Newcastle with the family in the early days of Newcastle. He was married to Adelle Sloan in 1944. She survives him. He was a member of the Assembly of God Church.

Andy, as he was familiarly known and called by everyone, was a just and upright citizen, a devout Christian, and held in high esteem by all his many friends and acquaintances. His passing came as a shock to the entire community, and Newcastle has lost one of its best citizens. He was always ready to extend a helping hand to those in need, and

was an active member and worker in his church.

Survivors besides the wife, are a stepson, Doyle Sloan of Ft. Worth; three brothers, Ed and O. R. Tetmeyer of Newcastle; and A. H. Tetmeyer of Graham; three sisters, Mrs. Alex Williams of Newcastle, Mrs. T. E. Wall of Denver, Colo.; and Mrs. Darwin Jones of Salida, Colo.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Sunday from the Newcastle Assembly of God Church with Rev. H. E. Boatright, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Newcastle Cemetery under direction of Lynn Funeral Home.

Roy Coffield, 79 dies at Bowie

T Roy Coffield, 79, former citizen and banker of Newcastle, died in a Bowie hospital last Friday morning.

Services were held at 3:30 p. m. Sunday from the First Baptist Church in Bowie.

A native of Wichita Falls, Coffield moved to Bowie when a youth. In 1908 he moved to Newcastle and organized the First State Bank which was changed to Farmers National Bank, which he served as director for more than 50 years. He was well known in this community, and had many friends who will regret to hear of his passing.

He moved back to Bowie in 1927 to become president of the First National Bank there for 25 years until his retirement in 1951. He was chairman of the board of directors when he died.

Coffield was a charter member of the First Baptist Church in Newcastle and served as its first Sunday School superintendent.

At Bowie, he was a member of the Board of Deacons of the First Baptist Church. He was past president of the Bowie Rotary Club and had been a Scottish Rite Mason for more than 50 years.

To show the resourcefulness of this man, there is a little human interest story attached to Coffield's entry into Newcastle and to become the founder of a banking institution that has weathered the storm down thru the years to become and remain one of the soundest banking institutions in the State. Mr. Coffield arrived in Newcastle in 1908 on the old WF&S, which had its terminus here. This young business adventurer arrived in this thriving coal mining metropolis after dark, and had with him two suit cases. One contained all of his worldly possessions, and the other contained the money to open a bank. He did not go to a hotel or any kind of rooming house, but found his way to the W. C. Bowman Lumber Yard and put up for the night in one of the lumber stalls until the next morning when he could get a better look at the situation. He set about organizing a bank and was open for business in a short while with the late George W. Terrell as president. Coffield was cashier, which position he held until he went to Bowie.

Coffield was married to the former Miss Dora Rents of Weatherford. She died in 1923. In 1946 he was married to Mrs. Vivian Potter Ward.

Young county's last surviving Spanish-American War veteran hale and hearty

Young County's last surviving Spanish-American War Veteran is Benjamin B. Ward of Newcastle, Texas. Mr. Ward is among the very few survivors of the war that was fought mainly over the issue of Cuba.

It is this war that marked the emergence of the U. S. as a world power. The Cuban blockade, General Shafter, the heroic Rough Riders, Col. Theodore Roosevelt, Col. Leonard Wood, President McKinley, and the popular slogan, "Remember the Maine" were a few of the names to be remembered in connection with the Spanish American War.

Benjamin B. Ward was born in Faecoa, Georgia, in 1877. He enlisted for service in the war about three months prior to his 23rd birthday. He became a member of Co. L, 4th Regt., Texas Infantry on June 28, 1898. Corporal Ward was discharged on March 9, 1899. His discharge reads "character excellent, service honest and faithful."

Mr. Ward left Georgia at an early age and came to Cleburne, Texas. His father was a native South Carolinian and died when B. B. was 8 years of age. His mother, Obada (Jenking) Ward was a daughter of an early day Texas family of Cass County, Texas. She died when he was 12 years old.

In 1909 Newcastle was a town of a few months of age. Mr. Ward came to the coal mining boomtown from Eliasville. He went into the hardware business with Sam Roach. The Roach family had come to Newcastle from Arkansas. Mr. Ward married Zula Roach, the daughter of the early day merchant.

Mr. Ward is a member and active worker in the Methodist Church. In Newcastle he is known as "Mr. Democrat." Ward has taken an active interest in politics from precinct to national level for over 50 years.

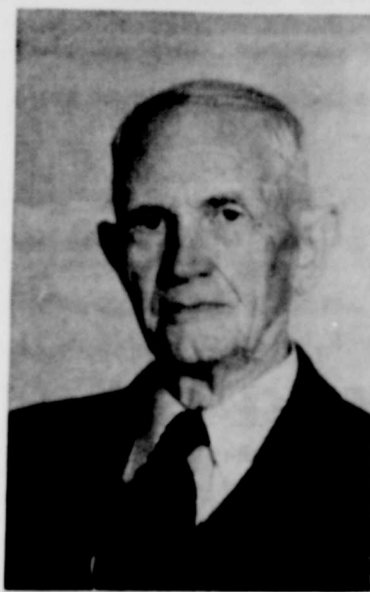
Mr. Ward was postmaster for the Newcastle Postoffice for many years, and is now retired.

Mr. Ward's direct descendants are few in number, but all live in Texas. Descendants are B. G. Ward and children, David, Patricia and Julie of Pampa; Bruce Ward and son, Jerry, of Fort Worth. B. G. Ward married the former Betty Martin, native of Ireland; and Bruce married the former Crystal Blanton.

Two other veterans of the Spanish-American War have been residents of Newcastle. They were Henry Powell Moore and John Milton Harrell. Both are now deceased. Their story to appear later. All three men have files at the Fort Belknap Archives. — Barbara Neal Ledbetter.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Margaret Martin of Dallas, and a grandson, Theodore Lee Martin in Germany with the U. S. Army.
