Bishop Winner in Race for Commissioner Prec. 3

A. D. (Jack) Bishop, a newcomer in politics, won his first political contest in the Democratic runoff primary Saturday.

Bishop was chosen as Road Commissioner over the incumbent, R. C. (Bob) Self in his bid for re-nomination. Bishop's total vote was 756, to Self's 578.

Another incumbent Commissioner, C. Lee Jones of Precinct 1, Graham area, lost his first political campaign in some 28 years, as he was defeated by Clarence Clinton, Flat Rock community rancher and oil field pumper making his debut in politics. Clinton got 1052 votes and Jones 757.

For Congressman at Large, Pool carried Young County 1947 to 860 for Baker.

Last rites held for Clarence Reeves

Funeral services for Clarence Reeves of Woodson, a pioneer citizen of this section of the country, at 3 p. m. Monday, June 1, 1964, in the Woodson Gymnasium, with the Rev. David Cadell pastor of the First Baptist Church officiating, assisted by Rev. Bud Epps. Burial was in the Woodson cemetery.

Mr. Reeves, 79, died May 31 in a Throckmorton Rest Home, after a long illness from Cancer. He was born March 10, 1885 in Grayson county, moving to Young county in 1889 and to Woodson in 1912. He was married to Mattie Helton in 1907. She died in 1953. He was a long time farmer-stockman of the Proffitt and Woodson communities, and was a member of the Baptist Church.

Clarence Reeves was well known over this part of the country, and held in high esteem by friends and acquaintances.

Survivors are one son, J. B. of Lawn; four brothers, Guy of Newcastle, Joe of Olney, Mack of White Deer, Albert of Robstown; five sisters, Mrs. Jim Roberts, Mrs. Della Lisle and Miss Ruth Reeves of Olney; Mrs. Ella Cook of Louisiana, and Mrs. Alice Phillips of Odessa; three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

234 votes cast here in runoff Primary, Saturday

A total of 234 votes were cast in the Newcastle box Saturday which is considered a heavy vote for a runoff primary, especially where only two offices were being voted upon, Commissioner and Congressman at Large.

The Commissioners race generated a lot of enthusiasm among the electorate, which was the cause of the heavy vote. In fact the vote here fell only 10 short of the number cast in the first Primary.

Jack Bishop, who was the lead man in the first primary, and a new face upon the political horizon, continued to show his strength by defeating his opponent, Bob Self, 178 votes. Self was seeking re election.

Newcastle-Graham highway to be re-surfaced

L. B. Dean, District Engineer informs us that the State Highway Commission as of this date has appropriated a 1965-1966 Consolidated Highway Program providing for the expenditure of \$166,000,000.

The portion of local interest is the sum allocated to Reconstruct Base and Surface on State Highway 24 between Newcastle and Graham (Sections), a distance of 8.9 miles at an estimated cost of \$445,000.00.

The accomplishment of this construction is expected to be completed within the next two years.

Rolling Plains Wagon Train Received Big Welcome in Newcastle Last Thursday

The Rolling Plains Wagon Train rolled into Newcastle last Thursday morning about 11:30, to be greeted by hundreds of people who had packed the sidewalks to give them a rousing welcome. The mule train was escorted into town by the Proffitt Riding Club, a magnificent organization, and the entire group was officially welcomed to our city by Mayor Horace Morgan. Cold drinks were served to the personnel of the Wagon Train, and after a period of visiting and picture taking, the group was escorted two miles south of Newcastle to Fort Belknap by the Proffitt Riding Club. The Train circled the restored buildings at the fort and prepared camp. Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Thompson provided pasture for the mules during the two day stay.

Wagon Master Gerald Hoffman, stated they received a much larger welcome from Newcastle, than any town near its size on the long trek from Spearman. Gerald is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Hoffman of this city and formerly lived here.

At 3 p. m. Thursday, a formal reception officially welcomed the visitors. County Judge Raymond Thompson extended greetings. Mrs. Ben G. Oneal of Wichita Falls, president of the Fort Belknap Historical Society and Mrs. J. W. Bullock of Newcastle, participated in the welcoming ceremony.

Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson had been invited to the program, and Mrs. Oneal read a message from Mrs. Johnson:

"Please know how sorry I am to miss being a part of the interesting chapter of Americana you are creating with a frontier times celebration. The program sounds gala and exciting, and one to stir the imagination. With all best wishes for the success of the celebration, Lady Bird Johnson."

Friday and Saturday morning at Fort Belknap members of the Wagon Train and hundreds of visitors were involved in the

Young County Civil War Centennial celebration. Judge Lee of Spearman and Judge Thompson of Graham opened the ceremony following a parade around the fort area by the Wagon Train and the PK Drillettes. The invocation was by Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Abilene. Two historic markers were dedicated. One designates the site of Camp Belknap and the other is in memory of William C. Young, for whom the county was named.

Participants in the celebration included Mrs. Adam Furr of Olney as Queen of Young County pioneer women; Mrs. Ben G. Oneal of Wichita Falls, queen of the Fort Belknap Historical Society; Mrs. J. W. Bullock, duchess; Dr. Kenneth F. Neighbors of Midwestern U., and Mrs. H. R. Ledbetter, author of two booklets concerning Fort Belknap.

Poverty program discussed at Dallas

The measures proposed by President Johnson to eliminate rural poverty was discussed at a three day regional meeting in Dallas, June 2-4.

At the meeting the federal officials also discussed steps being taken to help young farmers to take over the farms of retiring elders, progress made in developing rural community water systems, and the housing assistance given senior citizens in rural areas.

The FHA through a network of 1,500 county offices located throughout rural America provides credit assistance in farm and financial management to owners and operators of family farms and aids farmers and rural residents in improving rural housing and other rural community facilities.
