





Operation Motorcide

While the drivers of Texas are making plans for 4th of July trips, the Texas Department of Public Safety is geting ready for 'Operation' Motorcide," a three day vigil of tabulating all traffic deaths in the state. Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this area for the DPS, reported today the State is approaching the mid point in the year amid definite indications that traffic deaths will hit an all time high again in 1964

"If we continue to take lives at the present rate, 1964 will become the most deadly year in Texas history for traffic fatalities," he said. "Motorcides" at this time are over 150 more than at the same time last year, and considering the trend of increased accidents and casualties, we have every reason to expect that traffic deaths will exceed the previous all time high in Texas of 2.7.9 in 1963.

Traffic deaths this year have consistently been in ex. cess of fifteen percent over 1963, an indication that over 3000 lives will be lost on our streets and highways this;

Operation Motorcide will be placed in effect from 12:01 a m. July 3rd and continue through 11:59 p.m. July 5.
