## 11-year old daughter of County Clerk dies of injuries

Debra Ann Grubbs, 11 year old daughter of County Clerk and Mrs. Hugh G. Grubbs of Graham, died in a Graham hospital early Friday from injuries received in a head-on automobile collision one half mile south of Graham at 6:10 p. m. Thursday.

Five other persons were injured in the accident.

Debra Grubbs was passenger in a car driven by her aunt, Thelma Beatrice Grubbs of Graham. Thelma Grubbs received head and shoulder injuries and was reported to be in "fair" condition at Graham General Hospital Friday morning.

The Grubbs car, headed north on State Highway 254, collided with a southbound car driven by Royce Glen Gresham, 21, of Graham. Patrolman B. J. Green, who investigated, said the Grubbs car turned off the highway to the left and was struck at the west side of the road by the Gresham vehicle. Both cars were demolished. The accident happened just south of Graham.

Gresham was released from the hospital after being treated for cuts and bruises. His wife, Janet, 20; and children, Ronnie, 9 months; and Lonnie, 2, also were treated and released.

Debra Grubbs is survived by her parents; one brother, Gordon; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Simpson of Jean, and Mrs. Pearl Grubbs of Graham.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Graham, with Rev. Hubert Foust, pastor, officiating; assisted by Ray Crook, minister of the Eastside church of Christ. Burial was in Pioneer Cemetery with Morrison Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

## Vacationers warned to get fishing license before leaving

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reminds fishermen to please get their fishing license before making their summer vacation fishing trip. The fishing license, for residents and non residents alike, costs only \$2.15. If caught without one, a fisherman can expect to pay fines ten times or more the cost of the license.

A fishing license is required of everyone who fishes in the state with only these three exceptions: persons less than 17 or over 65 years old; persons fishing on property on which they reside or own; and persons fishing in the county of their residence and not using a winding device (reel).

To clarify the age limits, if you have reached your 17th birthday but not your 65th birthday, you are in the age bracket in which the license is required. Licenses are available at many fishing tackle and bait dealers, filling stations, grocery stores.

Please get one now if you intend to fish. Then you and the Game Warden can both smile when he says: "May I see your license, please?"

Rain, rain go away — but even if it does, the homemaker is faced with these rainy day reminders:

Mud — one way to stop mud before it tracks is to place clear plastic matting at front door and back. These mats serve as storage areas for muddy overshoes before anyone enters the house. Clean-up's easy — just tote mats to the sink, shake off dried-up mud and wash the plastic with a pine oil cleaner. Dry raingear can go back into the closet — and so can the plastic mats for storing til the next rains come.

Tar — There's nothing worse than tar unless it's wet tar. Recipe for instant tar removal: Scrub tar off shoes by using a household cleaner pool and a strong pine cleaner solution. This same recipe works for tracks made by wet sneakers.

Musty smells — Keep musty smells away by frequent pine cleaner treatments. For example, keep closets fresh by giving them a sponge-off from top to bottom with a pine cleaner solution. Use a cedar pine deodorizer on hangers in your closets. Basement and attic moistness can be held down by floor scrubbing with pine cleaners. And a pine deodorant spray adds a good finishing touch anywhere.

Water, water everywhere — If you have an umbrella stand, tuck a miniature long-handled cellulose sponge mop among the umbrellas for instant mop-ups.

Then if the rain comes again another day, you'll be prepared for keeping it outdoors.

## Meeks receives 5-year sentence for assault

John Allen Meeks, one of three charged with the rape of a 14-year old girl, was found guilty as charged and assessed a penalty of five years in the state penitentiary at Huntsville, Wednesday of last week.

Jury foreman, Floyd Owens of Olney, read the decision after the jury had been in session from 8 p. m. to 9:35 p. m. A filled courtroom witnessed the jury findings reading Meeks counsel will not appeal the sentence.

The other two charged with the same offense are William Allen Link Aston and Joe Meeks.

Charges stemmed from an attack on the girl May 17 when the trio forced their way into the girls home. She was babysitting with a three year old brother and a seven year old sister. The girl testified that she was chased into the kitchen and then taken to the front bedroom. There she said each of the men assaulted her.

The assaulted girl identified one of the trio as her brother. She lives with her mother and stepfather while her brother lives with their father. The mother works in Graham at night.

District Attorney Jack Q. Neal prosecuted the case. Defense counsel was Eugen McCracken and Payne Royce.
