Only materials needed are 31 inches of 1x10 finished pine, or the same length and width of %inch plywood, 26 inches of 1x4 fir, eight flathead screws, and glue. The pine or plywood will be used to make the top of the stool and the legs, while the fir will be used for cross-supports for top

Pre-drill countersink holes into the cross-supports and legs, set the eight screws, and you're ready for finishing with paint or stain. You also can cover the top with floor covering or, if you plan the stool as a child's seat, you might cover the top with padding and upholstery.

A Service Of The Thor Research Center For Better Farm Living

"Do you have any plans available for a plain, sturdy stool I can make in my own shop?" queries an Indiana reader. "My wife wants a stool that can be carried around the house for use in reaching upper shelves of cabinets and closets."

We have sent this reader our plan for a serviceable stool-a plan that is available without charge to other readers if you'll write to the Thor Research Center. The type of stool we have designed not only can serve as a step to reach upper shelves, but also can be used by little tykes as a television-viewing seat.



You'll hasten the shaping, assembly, and finishing of the stool if you use portable electric tools -circular-blade and jig saws, drill, and sander. Cut the wood to length and taper the sides of the legs with the circular saw. Then use the jig saw to cut insert grooves for the cross-supports in the top of the legs and to shape the bottoms of the legs, ends of the cross-supports, and corners of the stool top. Sand all pieces smoothly with the power sander, then glue the cross-supports into the slots in the legs.

American Foundation Animal Health

An alarming increase in rables among farm animals has been reported by authorities.

There has been a 400 per cent rabies increase in swine, a 300 per cent increase in sheep, and a one-third increase among cattle The disease has spread to wild animals, and that has made it more difficult to control. Rabid wild animals bite the livestock, spread the disease, and the cycle



by the bites of wild animals; or by other rabid livestock.

What symptoms of rabies should a farmer watch for? In cattle, rabies symptoms may include loss of appetite, a sudden stop in milk flow, restlessness and aggressiveness. The sick animal may bellow loudly, paw the ground, or butt violently. Among sheep the signs are much the same as in cattle. Hogs become very excitable, and may attack other animals . . even their own

If the farmer even suspects that livestock have been bitten by veterinarian make a checkup as promptly as possible. If rables it may be saved. If any unusual bite wounds appear in livestock, the veterinarian should check also, because this is the way in

which rables is transmitted. The farmer and his family should be careful about dealing with livestock showing aggressiveness or other such rables symptoms. These animals may transmit rabies, by their bites.

Farm children should be warned, also, that any wild animal which appears "tame" may be rabid.

Summing up . . . rables in farm livestock is increasing sharply; the wise owner will watch for signs of it, and take prompt action if such signs appear.


