J. B. Blanton, 82 pioneer citizen Passes Away

J. B. Blanton, a well known pioneer citizen of this community, passed away at 11:55 a. m. Saturday in a Wichita Falls hospital, after an illness of several years. Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday from the Baptist Church at Proffitt, with Rev. Bobby Ward, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Proffitt Cemetery under direction of Lunn Funeral Home.

James Benjamin Blanton, a retired farmer, was born in Cherokee County, Georgia, April 22, 1882, and came to Texas with his parents in 1893, settling near Fort Belknap. He was married to Grace McCann at Graham in 1907. She passed away in 1954. Blanton lived in this area over 70 years, and was well and favorably known. He joined the Methodist Church when a young man. He was honest and charitable with his fellowman, and held high respect by his friends and acquaintances.

The only other known supply of such rare rock is in South Carolina and Tennessee. Where did Kenneth find such rare collection? Right on top of the ground in Young County!

Mr. Williams displayed the beautiful Marcasite, found in Tom Green County. So far as is known, this is the only place in the world where it is found.

There were many collectors displaying their lapidary work, both finished and unfinished.
