HD club learns about cooking at February meet

The use of spices and herbs in cooking was demonstrated by Mrs. Ellen Harrison, County Home Demonstration Agent, at the meeting of the Proffitt HD club on Wednesday, February 3rd. The meeting was held at the Proffitt Community Center, with Mrs. H. W. Creel as hostess, assisted by Mrs. Gary Watson.

In her discussion, entitled, "Livelier Cooking with Spices and Herbs", Mrs. Harrison gave a brief history of spices and herbs, the use of which dates as far back as the days of the cave man, who wrapped his food in the leaves to keep it clean as it cooked in the open fire—and discovered the pleasant seasoning. She stated that the use of spices or herbs in cooking does not affect the finished product, except for flavor, and she stressed the fact that amount used is important, since it is easy to use too much, thereby spoiling the taste of the food.

Some other hints that were given were: names of spices and herbs and suggested foods in which they are used; correct storage; buying small amounts, and ways to use different ones to help cut down the calorie count in some dishes. A recipe pamphlet and chart on "Spices Can Be Fun," were presented to those present.

Mrs. W. P. Burch presided during the business meeting. Mrs. Faye Wells was in charge of recreation.

Sale of the Olney Enterprise, a weekly newspaper, to three young men from West Texas was announced in last week's Enterprise. New owners are David H. Henn of Littlefield, his brother, Bill, and Lee R. Brown, both of Hereford. They will begin active operation of the paper February 15th.

The sale was revealed by Mrs. Len G. Warren, widow of the late publisher of the paper, and by Marvin Hickey and Weldon Lacy.

The new owners, all under 30 years of age, bring considerable newspaper experience to Olney.

Relatives here learn of death of brother in Arizona

Relatives here and at Olney recently received word of the death of their brother, Donald Lee Kessler, 37, former Newcastle man, in Arizona sometime in November, 1964.

He was the brother of Miss Alta Mae Kessler of Olney, and Raymond, Pete, R. J. and Cecil Kessler, Newcastle. Kessler's body was found November 16, 1964, two miles east of the Peacacho Mountains in a desert area of Arizona, near railroad tracks about 20 yards from an Indian hut.

Indians who found the body reported to investigators they had seen Kessler walking in the area three days earlier.

Deputy Sheriff Toby Permington and an ambulance driver were first on the scene. They questioned the Indians and learned nothing further from them. They reported that Kessler had been well dressed and had had a fresh haircut at the time of his death. His shoes were found near the body.

Kessler's body was taken to Valley Funeral Home in Eloy, Ariz., and kept there three weeks while officials attempted to establish his identity.

The FBI checked his fingerprints and found he had been in a veteran's tuberculous hospital about a year ago and had listed his sister, Miss Alta Mae Kessler, as his nearest of kin.

Before his identity was established and before any of the kin had been contacted, Kessler was buried in Valley Memorial Park Cemetery in Eloy, Ariz., with Rev. Mitchell presiding at graveside rites.

Dr. Alred Musgroves of Globe, Ariz. performed an autopsy and reported that death was caused by peritonitis infection of an ulcer, and dehydration. It is surmised that Kessler was making his way to Tucson to a tuberculosis hospital.

Kessler was born July 10, 1928, and had been gone from home about 10 years. His family had heard from him occasionally from various points in California and Ariz. He was last heard from two months before he died.

Survivors besides the sister and four brothers here, is another brother, Coy of Cojon, Calif., and another sister, Mildred, of Weatherford, Okla. The Kesslers went to Phoenix after receiving word of their brother's death, but were unable to learn anything new about the circumstances.

This is the foot rot season for cattle and the problem will be a constant threat from now until spring.

The infection is a problem now because the organisms often find their way into feet which have been injured on the frozen ground of feed lots. Later, as the weather warms, ground thaws and as spring rains start, the constant exposure to moisture softens the tissue between the claws of the animals' feet and again makes it easy for foot rot organisms to invade.

Although foot rot is most often seen among cattle in feed lots, it may also develop when the animals are on range or pasture. Lameness is the most prominent first symptom. But, unfortunately, many cases of the infection appear to start in the deep tissue without showing immediate symptoms.



Foot rot is often a serious problem in cattle at this time of year.

A slight swelling and reddening of the skin just above the hoof usually is seen early in the course of the disease. Animals with foot rot may be reluctant to move to feed and water and as a result lose weight, and milk production declines.

The best way to hold losses to a minimum is to have a veterinarian examine the feet of any animal which appears to be lame. If the cause is foot rot, surgical trimming of the feet or medication may be necessary.

But prevention also is important. This means that lots and pens used by infected animals should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before new animals are permitted in them. It also means that lots, pens and pastures should be kept clear of foreign objects which might injure animals' feet. Surfaces should be harrowed if they become hard. Other preventive recommendations include continuous feeding of iodides in salt and medicated foot baths in water of the
