MEMORIAL MARKER FOR TONKAWA SCOUTS C. S. A.

The Tonkawa Scouts C. S. A. Memorial Markers was set Feb. 10, along the Redbud Trail at Fort Belknap by Young County Historical Survey Committee. This historical castaluminum 27"x42" marker was furnished through the Texas SHSC program. The Texas Highway maintenance department under manager Brooks and See, and field man, R. J. Woods delivered and set the marker. Dedication ceremony will be announced later.

INSCRIPTION

Tonkawa Scouts CSA
In the time of the Civil War; 1861-65 Texas knew the horrors of Indian warfare. Hostile tribes made a business of stealing horses, cattle, women and children. The paths they followed in the "Bright Comanche Moons" were marked by fires and ruin.

The Tonkawa tribe, by contrast, sought friendship with Texans. They became valued allies in the civil war, scouting against hostile Indians and watching for signs of Federal invasion. Old Texas Indian Fighters, who once had fought Tonkawas along with others, in the wartime asked for Tonkawa Scouts. Along the frontier defense line from Red River to the Rio Grande, commanders valued them so much they fed them at personal expense when necessary, to obtain their help. A few Tonkawa Scouts were more useful than two or three companies of regular soldiers. They could stalk enemies better than bloodhounds.

They paid for their Confederate loyalty on Oct. 25, 1862, near present Anadarko, Okla. Hostile Indians attacked the Tonkawa camp, killing 137 men, women and children out of 300. When later their Chief Castile requested a tribal home in Texas, they were located at Fort Griffin, where they remained until 1864, and then were removed to Oklahoma.

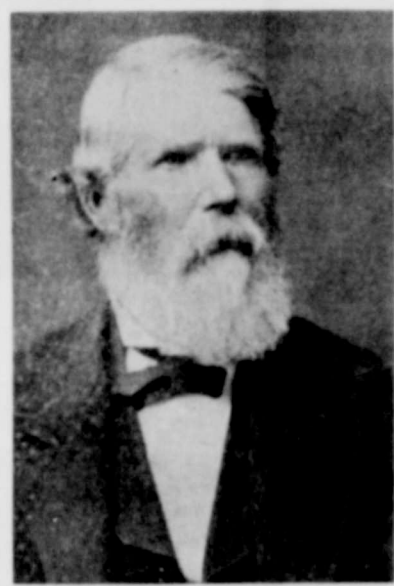
The 42 tables were numbered with red cupids standing in white styrofoam. Partners were drawn with small hearts placed in large white marshmallows.

The Medlan House in South Young County, now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Byerly Akers, will be awarded a State Historical Medallion on February 24, 1965. The Chitaqua Literary and Science Club of Graham, applied for the medallion and are sponsoring its presentation on the February date.

This is the third historical Medallion for Young County. The first being awarded to Fort Belknap, the second to Saint Luke's Episcopal Church in Graham, and now the Medlan House on the Brazos. Several persons from Newcastle will attend the historical affair.

ARCHIBALD B. MEDLAN "Uncle Archie" Medlan, as he was affectionately known, was born in Morgan County, Alabama in 1825. He settled in Navarro County, Texas, and in 1853 made his way to Young County, settling three miles south of the new and bustling fort at Belknap. About three years later he moved further south to the site where the house now stands.

A. B. Medlan was a tiller of the soil when such was a rare commodity in this part of the southwest. He started with a "bull-tounge" plow and by hard work and good management, acquired about 5,000 acres of land on the rich farm lands near the Brazos.

In 1875, he erected the now historical house from red brick made on his farm.

"Uncle Archie" was the son of Isaac Medlan (Scotch lineage) and Suzannah (Frost) Medlan Brogdon (of English stock and Virginia ancestors). It was his half-brothers, Dow, Peter, and James R. Brogdon, who are ancestors of the Brogdon families living in and near Newcastle today.

A. B. Medlan married Ellen Timmons in 1866, the daughter of Alexander and Julia (Moss) Timmons. Ellen died in 1878 without issue. In 1879, A. B. Medlan married Elizabeth (Rogers) Willis. She was affectionately known as "Aunt Betty" Medlan. Many folks in the Newcastle area still remember this spirited pioneer who died in 1932. She was a frequent visitor to Newcastle and attended many of the Kutch-fanning Pioneer Reunions. A. B. Medlan preceded her in death in 1909.

MEDLAN CHAPEL
A. B. Medlan, Young County's first philanthropist, endowed the Primitive Baptist Church parsonage and congregation, and it is known as Medlan Chapel. Since his death, oil has been found on the 200 acres left for endowment. The late Omar Strickland had pastored the church for the last 37 years.

A lifelike portrait of Uncle Archie and Aunt Betty Medlan hangs in the Medlan Chapel. Mrs. Akers, who owns the Medlan home, today displays in her home a photograph of the home's original owner.

MEDLAN CEMETERY
The Medlan family cemetery is located a few yards southwest of the old Medlan home. This is the burial place of the Medlans, Brogdons, and the Timmons.

ORDINANCE NO. 65-1
An Ordinance Providing For Licensing, Taxing, Inspection, Supervision and Regulation of the Owning and Operation For Profit, of any Pool or Billiard Tables Within the City Limits of Newcastle, Young County, Texas.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Newcastle, Young County, Texas:

That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association of persons, corporation and every other organization, save and except religious, charitable or educational organization authorized under the laws of the State of Texas, to own and operate for profit, any pool or billiard table or tables, (meaning any table surrounded by a ledge of cushion, with or without pockets, on which balls are propelled by sticks or cues), within Newcastle, Young County, Texas, without having first obtained an appropriate license from the City Secretary as herein provided, which license shall at all times be displayed in some conspicuous place within the licensed place of business.

The City Secretary is authorized to collect the following annual license fee for each location on which a pool or billiard table or tables is or are owned and operated for profit, to wit: the sum of \$50.00 for each license issued and a like sum for each renewal thereof. All licenses issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be for one year, and shall not be transferable.

The Mayor of Newcastle, Texas, shall appoint a committee from the City Council to issue licenses under this ordinance, and such committee shall have the right and duty to investigate fully the person or persons making application for license hereunder. No person who has ever been convicted of a felony shall be licensed to operate a billiard club or pool room in the City of Newcastle, Texas, nor shall any such person be allowed to manage same under a license issued to any other person or persons, and the breach of this provision shall be grounds for revoking any license or licenses so issued. Any license issued hereunder shall be non-transferable. The license above set out shall be for one-year period, and before renewal of any such license, the person or persons desiring renewal of same shall meet with the committee of the City Council, and if the committee recommends the issuance of such license to said person, then such person shall before the final of the license or re-issuance of same, meet with the City Council at a regularly scheduled meeting for approval by the full Council and before a new permit may be issued.

There is hereby levied an annual occupation tax of \$2.50 for each pool or billiard table owned and operated for profit within the City by any person, firm, association of persons, corporation, and every other organization, charitable and educational organizations authorized under the laws of the State of Texas, and the tax levied herein shall be paid to the Tax Collector of the City who shall issue an occupation tax receipt. Said occupation tax receipt shall specify the number of pool or billiard tables for which issued; the address of the buildings or premises in or on which such table or tables are located, and shall bear the serial number or numbers, if any, of the particular table or tables. Such occupation tax shall have and bear no relation to any license or fees provided herein, said license fee being required to provide proper official supervision, inspection and services for the premises.

No person may engage in the operation for profit of any billiard or pool table or tables within this City on week days between the hours of 12:00 o'clock midnight and 8 o'clock a. m. following: provided however, that such table or tables may be operated on Sundays only between the hours of 12 o'clock noon and 6 o'clock p. m.

The City Council is hereby authorized and empowered to revoke or cancel the license of any person, firm or association of persons, corporation and every other organization author-

ized under the laws of the State of Texas, licensed to own and operate a pool or billiard table or tables hereinunder, after giving such licensee ten days notice of a hearing and after conducting such hearing for the purpose of determining whether such license should be revoked, provided however, that such power of cancellation or revocation shall be exercised only under the following conditions:

(a) For the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance; (b) For knowingly permitting the sale, use or consumption of any alcoholic beverage or beverages in or upon the premises licensed hereunder; (c) For violation of prescribed hours of operation provided herein; (d) For knowingly permitting the presence on the premises of a person or persons under the influence of intoxicating liquor; (e) For knowingly permitting disorderly conduct or immoral practices on the premises; (f) For knowingly permitting the violation of the law or laws of the State of Texas or of the Municipal Code of this City, and for allowing any gambling of any sort in connection with such games so played, or in connection with the running of such billiard or pool hall or room. The fact that there is an agreement that the loser of a game agrees to pay the cost thereof is not to be considered gambling, but any agreement to pay a greater sum than the cost of the use of the tables and equipment for the game shall be considered gambling; (g) Operating a billiard room or pool hall with covers, drapes and paint or any other obstruction covering the windows; (h) allowing minors under the age of 21 years to come onto such premises without having a written permission from one or both of such minor's parents or legal guardian on their person and subject to display by such minor when requested by such operator or by any officer of the City of Newcastle, and for allowing school age persons to come on such premises during school hours, whether with or without parental consent; (i) For knowingly permitting any violation of this ordinance in any manner.

It shall be unlawful to erect or construct on the licensed premises any partition or partitions obstructing the view of any part of the building or premises licensed herein, or cutting the building into two or more rooms by constructing partitions therein, in which a pool or billiard table or tables is or are displayed, owned and operated for profit, provided however, that toilet or other sanitary facilities shall be enclosed and adequately ventilated in accordance with health, plumbing, sanitary and other applicable ordinances of this city.

Places of business governed by this ordinance shall be located on the ground floor or street level only of any building and shall not be licensed for any other floor than the ground or street level floor.

The City Manager shall appoint or designate the City Building Inspector to make periodic inspections of the licensed premises, whose duty shall be to determine compliance with the building provisions, the maintenance of toilets and other sanitary facilities and compliance with the health, plumbing, sanitary and other applicable ordinances of this City.

Any person, firm, association of persons, corporation or every other organization licensed hereunder violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than \$100.00.

If any section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or word in this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance and the City Council hereby declares it would have passed such remaining portions of the Ordinance despite such invalidity.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are expressly repealed.

The importance of this Ordinance and the absence of any regulation relating to the owning and operation of a pool or billiard table or tables and the licensing thereof and the levy and collection of an occupation tax thereon creates an emergency and an imperative public

necessity and requires that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and it is so Ordained.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 65-1
Providing for Licensing, Taxing, Etc., of any Pool or Billiard Table Within the City Limits of the City of Newcastle, Young County, Texas, and Regulations concerning the Ownership and Operation of Same.

WHEREAS, heretofore the City Council of the City of the City of Newcastle, Texas, passed Ordinance No. 65-1, providing for the licensing, taxing, inspection, supervision and regulation of the owning and operation for profit, of any pool or billiard table or tables within city limits of Newcastle, Texas, and in such Ordinance provided under paragraph (h) thereof, for the cancellation or revocation of the license to own and operate a pool or billiard table or tables for profit and in the event of the following:

(h) Allowing minors under the age of 21 years to come onto such premises without having written permission from one or both of such minor's parents or legal guardian on their person and subject to display by such operator or by any officer of the City of Newcastle, and for allowing school age persons to come on such premises during school hours whether with or without parental consent.

AND WHEREAS, it has been called to the attention of the City Council of the City of Newcastle, Texas, that the age limit under which written permission must be secured from a parent or legal guardian of such person

should be lowered from 21 to 18 years, and that the age limit of any person or persons coming on the premises during school hours should be specifically set out.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Newcastle, Texas, that such Ordinance No. 65-1 above set out shall be amended by the substitution of the following for paragraph (h) in such original ordinance, so that such ordinance shall be considered hereafter to read as if the following were included in same in place of the present paragraph (h). That such ordinance shall not be changed in any other manner, but shall remain in full force and effect in all respects. Such amendment being as follows, to-wit:

(h) Allowing minors under the age of 18 years to come onto such premises without having written permission from one or both of such minor's parents or legal guardian on their person and subject to display by such operator or by any officer of the City of Newcastle, and for allowing persons of the age of 18 years or under to come on such premises during school hours, whether with or without parental consent.

The above and foregoing amendment shall be effective as of the date of publication hereof, and is dated this 9th day of February, 1965.

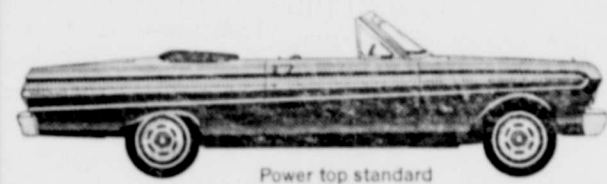

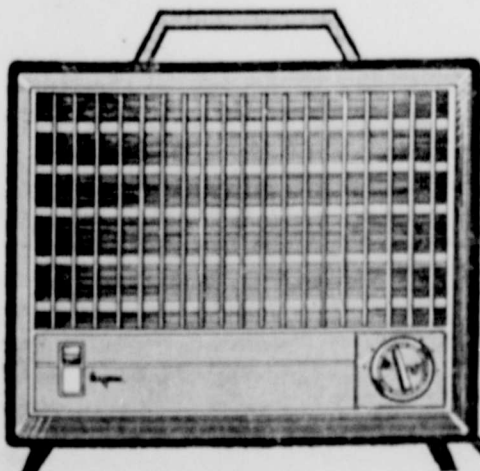

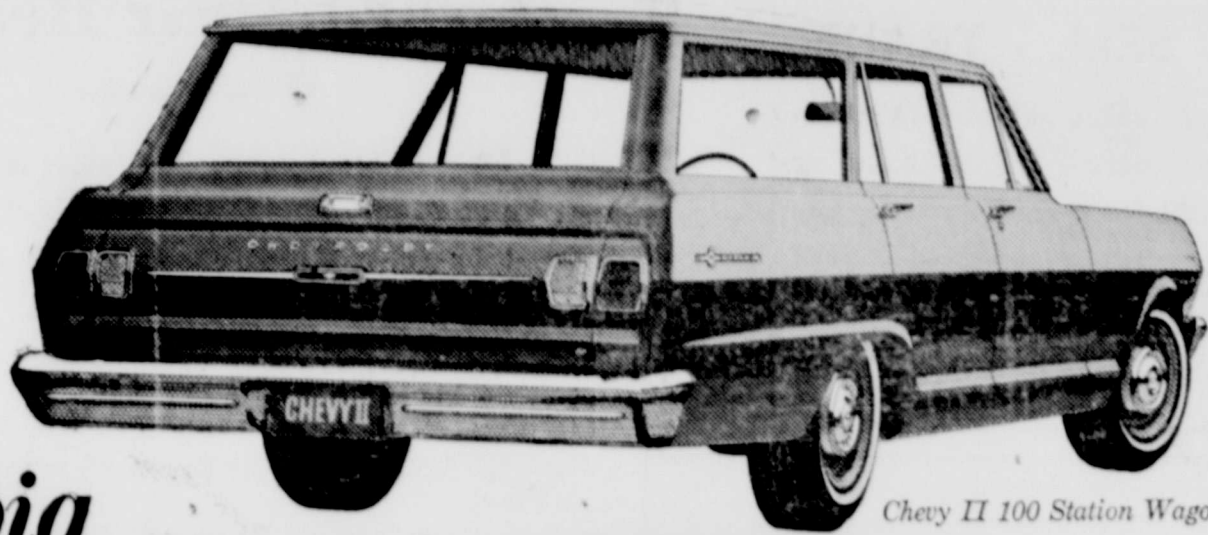
