## 247 family loans made by EOA

L. J. Cappleman, state director of the FHA announced that 247 loans to individual families have been made in Texas under the provisions of the Economic Opportunities Act of 1964, which is one of the powerful weapons of the United States Department of Agriculture being used in President Johnson's all out War On Poverty Program.

These loans are made to individual farmers and rural residents in most sections of Texas. A farm family is a family who is operating a farm they own or lease, and is producing at least a portion of their subsistence from crops or livestock. A rural resident is classified as one living in a town of not more than 2,500 population.

Cappleman stated that additional information concerning this program may be obtained from county FHA personnel, County and Home Demonstration Agents, Vocational Agriculture teachers, and other agencies. Applications may be filed in any local FHA office in the state. There are 133 county offices servicing every county in Texas.

Applications are usually filed in the county in which the farm family or rural resident resides.

## Tractor contest at Graham barn May 1st

The annual Young County 4-H Tractor Contest will be held on Saturday, May 1st at the Young County livestock barn, beginning at 9 a. m.

The tractor contest consists of four parts: a written examination concerning tractor maintenance and care, a practical examination listing all the faulty maintenance and safety items, a two-wheel implement driving course and a four-wheel implement back-course.

Any interested 4-H member may pick up the necessary booklets and additional information at the County Agent's office. All members who plan to enter the tractor contest should notify the County Agent's office on or before Friday, April 30. All 4-H members are invited to participate in this contest. Local winners will represent Young County in the district contest at Wichita Falls on May 8.

Today's major threat to farm dogs is distemper.

And filling, as they often do, the dual roles of pets and work animals, all farm dogs should be protected against this disease.

The distemper threat to farm dogs generally comes from raccoons and skunks, but other dogs can also be carriers of this contagious and highly fatal infection. Dogs of all ages are susceptible to distemper, but it is most commonly seen in young puppies.

Unfortunately and unlike many diseases, distemper poses a double threat to dogs. In cases where it does not kill, it may well cause permanent damage to the nervous system of dogs which manage to survive. The mark of the damage may be seen in convulsions, uncontrollable twitching of a muscle or limb, or paralysis of a limb.

The fact that the distemper virus can travel some distance on moisture droplets and dust particles makes it rather easy for a dog to be exposed to the disease.



Farm dogs need the protection of vaccination against distemper.

If distemper starts developing after exposure, the symptoms may include reddening of the membranes of the eyes, discharge from the eyes and nose, diarrhea and loss of appetite and weight. There may be skin eruptions in thin-haired areas and dogs sneeze, cough and breathe with difficulty. Pneumonia may develop.

Despite the fact that distemper is such a devastating disease, dogs can be protected against it by having a veterinarian vaccinate them. After the initial vaccination, annual booster vaccinations are recommended to assure continuing protection and to maintain the level of immunity.

With distemper there are no halfway measures. Dogs need the protection of vaccination.

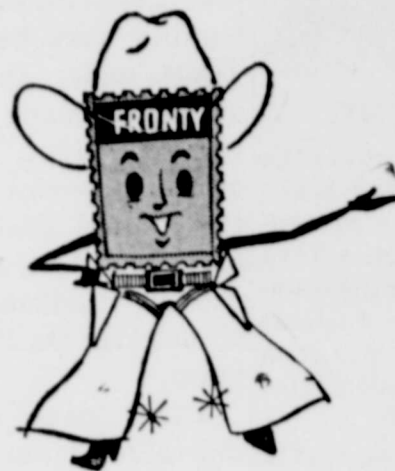

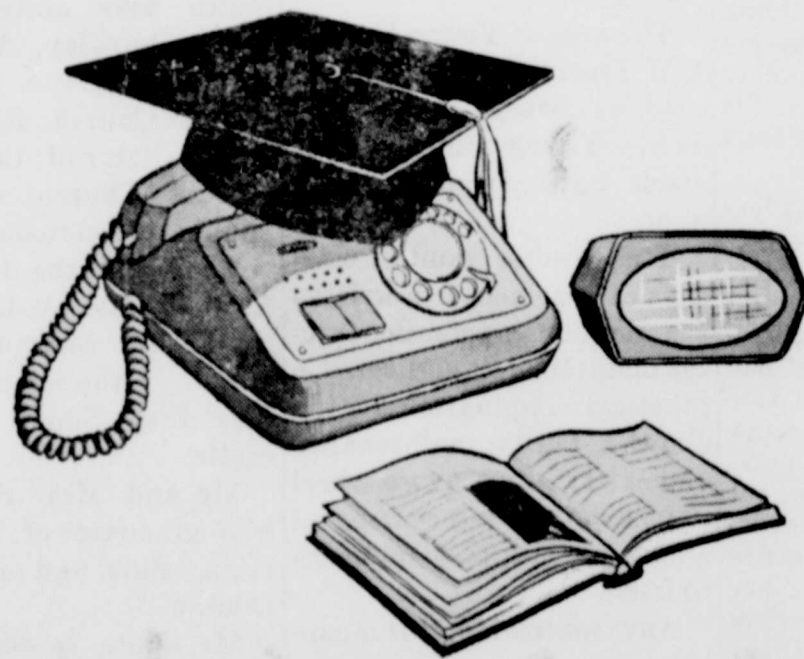

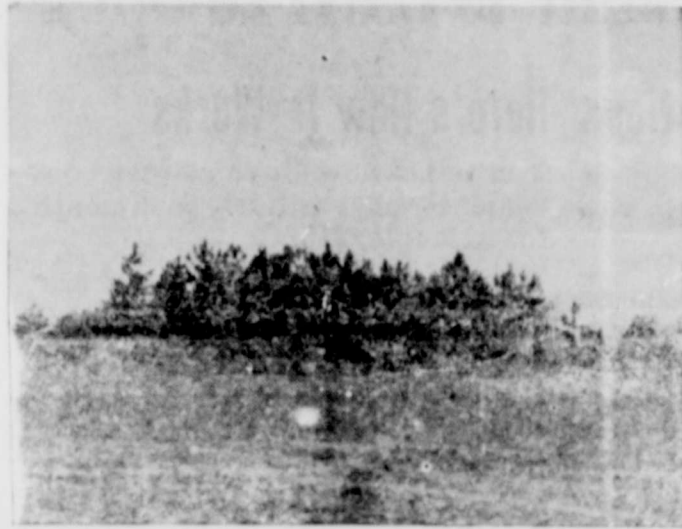

**Historic Mound Near Alto**



The home site of a tribe of Caddo Indians who lived about 1000 A.D. near Alto, in Cherokee County, today supports a forest of small trees. This is the site of Texas Forest Service Indian Mound Nursery, located six miles southwest of Alto, along State Highway 21 where it crosses the Neches River.

Only a granite monument atop a 30 feet high, "L" shaped mound testifies to the Indians' having been there. A portion of the mound and surrounding area was excavated in 1940 by the Department of Anthropology of the University of Texas. Although no important artifacts were found, items of pottery, flints and sites of several houses were located. Archaeologists believe the mound was used as a place to worship their sun god. Occasionally, pieces of pottery and flints are unearthed as the area near the mound is cultivated by nursery personnel.

Presence of several constantly flowing springs nearby probably accounts for the Indians' use of the area. Availability of surface water for irrigation was a major factor in selecting the area as a state tree nursery.

To the citizens of nearby Alto goes a large amount of credit for their part in purchase of the 173 acres in 1940.

The nursery produces tree seedlings for reforestation in Texas. Initial production in 1940 was about 10 million seedlings. Maximum capacity is about 21 million seedlings which are sold to Texas landowners at cost.

Trees are to be used for reforestation and windbreak planting; none are sold for ornamentals or for landscaping.
