## Hulse chosen to play in State All-Star game

Donnie Hulse, Newcastle High Schools' All State Half-back, has been notified by the Secretary of the Texas High School Coaches Association that he has been chosen to play in their annual All-Star game in August at the coaching school clinic. This year's game will be played in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas.

Donnie is one of the boys to make up the team from the north. 28 boys were also chosen from the South.

Besides being a good football player, the requirements for selection is that the boy be not enrolled in college, be a May graduate, and his coach be an active member in good standing of the association.

## Bobcats third in regional meet

The Newcastle Bobcats were third in the regional meet at Denton last Saturday behind winner St. Jo, and second place Lockett. The Bobcats will be represented at the State meet in Austin this week by their fine quarter miler, Terry Creel. Terry's workouts had been limited for three weeks before the meet due to a pulled hip muscle. He still pushed a 53.1 for second.

The Bobcat 440 relay team was third with a 45.8, the best time ever made by a Bobcat team. Donnie Hulse, Preston Pitts, Terry Creel, John Tomlinson, composed the team.

John Taack placed 4th in the high hurdles with a time of 16.5. Preston Pitts was 6th with a 16.9.

Donnie Hulse placed 6th in discus with toss of 127.7 1.2. Donnie was also 5th in the 220 with a 23.3 and 3rd in the shot put with a 44 1-2 toss.

Mike Mitchell, who had the best pole vault in the regional, failed to jump higher than 10 ft. for 6th place.

## Business stimulated by social security in Young county

Monthly old age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Young county now top \$154,825 00, Mr. Tate, District Manager of social security in Wichita Falls, said today on releasing his annual county benefit data report.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of 7 percent over the corresponding period last year.

"This increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged population," Mr. Tate said. "This money stimulates county business; most of it is spent for food, clothing, and shelter."

"There is no longer any doubt. Social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in Young county. As of December 31, 1964, some 2 563 Young Countians were collecting annually \$1,850 00.

More people in Young County, Tate said could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and are urged to call or visit the local office for full information concerning benefits or responsibilities.

The following shows the number and amount of each type of monthly benefit paid in Young County, as of December 31, 1964:

- 1,360 Retired Workers receive \$95,035 00
  - 498 Wife or Husband, receives \$17,064 00.
  - 256, Widow or Widower, receives \$16,127.00.
  - 247, Mothers and Children receive \$13,844 00.
  - 202, Disabled workers and dependents, draw \$12,755.00.
- August is the 30th anniversary of the signing of the Social Security Act by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Joe Nesbitt is the Social Security representative for Newcastle and Young Co.

The following article was taken from the Abilene Reporter, and was written by Kathryn Duff in her PAGE ONE column. It concerns a letter written by Michael Wyatt's father before he was killed in WW II. Michael is a native of Newcastle, graduate of NHS, and is the grandson of Mrs. H. P. Moore

of Newcastle. The article follows:

Michael Wyatt of Abilene, son of the late Earl Wyatt and of Mrs. Dean (Norene Webb) Threlkeld of 3281 Grand, left a few days ago for Army training at Ft. Polk, La.

Before he left Mike gave his

mother his original copy of an old letter to keep for him. Mrs. Threlkeld put the letter in a safety deposit box to await Mike's return.

It is a letter to be preserved. Some dates suggest the significance of it.

Mike's father, Earl, and mother were a Newcastle couple who married in the early days of World War II. As did most young men of that day, Earl went to military service. He, too, trained at a Louisiana base then known as Camp Polk.

In early September, 1943, Earl's outfit was shipped overseas.

Five days later, on Sept. 12,

1943 Mike, the couple's only child, was born.

News he was a father finally caught up with Earl in England. It was wonderful news, and Earl wrote many letters home telling of his joy.

Then, that spring of 1944, he wrote a special letter. Perhaps he wrote it for reasons many men wrote special letters those days. Something big was about to happen, something known now as D-Day. A GI didn't know then what might be ahead for him.

Earl's letter, V-mail from a place he called "Somewhere?" and dated April 16 was addressed: "To My Son."

It read like this:

"Hello, Little Fellow, how are you, anyhow? I know you won't be able to read this letter now but some day you will.

"I want you to know how awfully proud I am of you and your mother, too. I think of you all the time, though we haven't met as yet.

"Someday in the near future I hope to romp with you and buy you dogs and get you a pony. Oh, I know you are too young for it now, but with all my heart I look forward to being with you and your mother. I know we'll be great pals, you and I, won't we, Mike?"

"If for some reason we never meet, you and I, you must be a

good boy and be good to your mother and do the things for her that I want to do.

"Son, I hope you never have to see our country at war again. I was born just after the last one and you were born in this one. I hope this will be the last one and you never have to serve.

"I must close for this time. Please write to me. I try to read the little crinkles in Mother's letters that you make when you grab at the paper. Even that means so much to me.

"Be good. You are the man of the house now, so do your best, Little Fellow, and remember I love you and that I'm only

living to return to your mother and you. Love and kisses, Son, Daddy."

A couple more dates tell the rest of the story about the letter.

On June 6 and 7, a few weeks after he wrote, Earl joined with many other young men to storm the beaches of Western France. He came through the landing without a scratch. Then he and the others began to fight their way across Brittany.

At St. Lo death came to Earl. He was killed in action there on Aug. 10, a month before his son's first birthday.

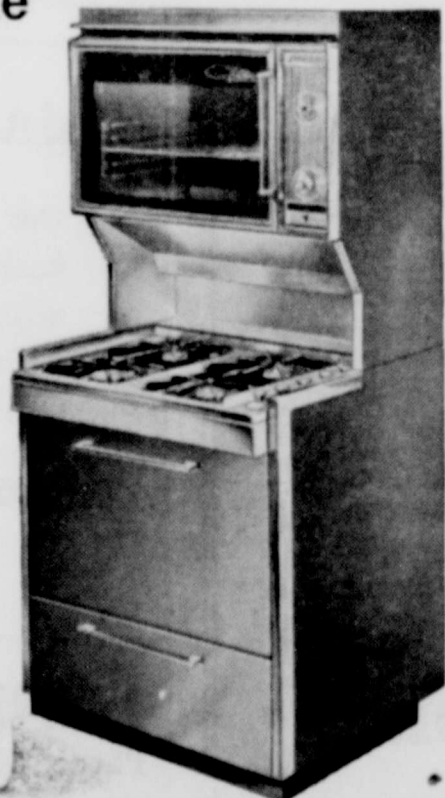
