Historical landmark stands in shadow of Old Fort Belknap

Along the banks of the meandering Brazos River and less than one mile west of the road that skirts Fort Belknap stands a beautiful old house. The terra cotta dwelling is a landmark in Young County. Built in 1886, the architecture is a simplified southern colonial style, adapted to the needs of the people and material of the Southwest. The simple lined facade projects an historical luster all its own. The generous porches of the facade are southern and so are the tall windows on both first and second floors.

The house has stood for 80 years. It was built by John Cornelius Reynolds, a rancher who came to Young county when the county was only 16 years old. Reynolds had settled in Denton county, Texas, in the 1850's, fought with the Confederacy in the 1860's, and came to Young county in 1870. John Cornelius and Nancy (Medlan) Reynolds first built a house, one room and a lean to, west of Fort Belknap and near the river. Their next home was the old two story house which remains as a landmark and a reminder of the past.

Mr. and Mrs. Riley Roberts live there today. The Reynolds family occupied the house for many years, followed by the Logan family. For many years the Eliza Bush family lived there, followed by the Jim Thompson family.

The house is a product of her surroundings. A kiln was built nearby and brick were



made by Negroes who had been brought from Denton county by John C. Reynolds. As the brick were made, the house was built, and the figure "2" ranch had new headquarters.

A unique feature about the house is the iron spiral stairway leading from near the front door to the upstairs rooms. This iron stairway was hauled to Young county from Weatherford, Texas.

This house has known the laughter and gaiety of little children; this house has known the garbled overtones of large family get-togethers; this old house has been a home away from home for many weary travelers and she has been a companion to birth, to life, and to death.

The house is neither a D'everaux nor a Dunleith but her beauty lies in her age, her style, and her setting east of the Brazos river. This structure is among the many historically important ones within the boundaries of Young county and it also deserves a state recognized medallion. This writer nominates her for the honor.

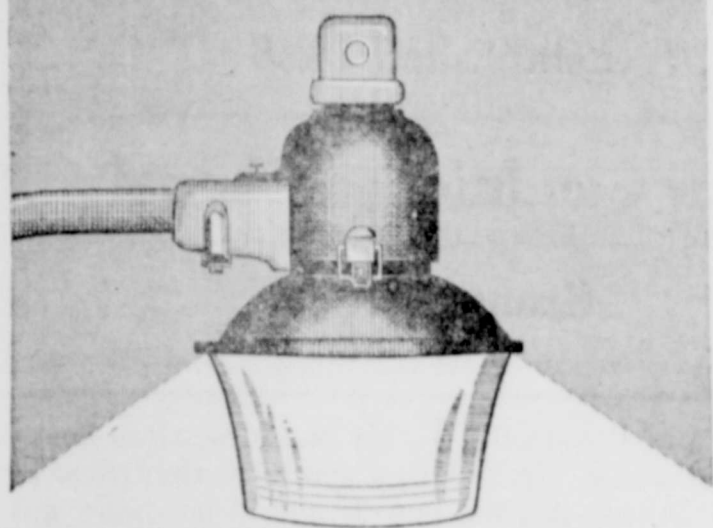

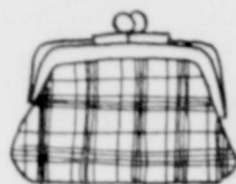

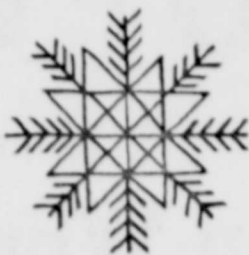
