Capt. Charlie Neuhous, famous frontiersman, buried in Fort Belknap Cemetery

William Neuhous, born 1829 in York county, Penn., also resided for awhile in the Mills household. The Rena Mills family had been in Texas since before 1854 William Neuhous was a stockraiser and he, along with his two brothers had his share of encounters with the Indians. The Comanches and Kiowas were always in search of a good horse and it was natural that they should search out the stock raisers on their own range land. It was William who was by the side of his brother, Conrad when he died.

In May, 1860, Indians depredated the Newhous Pens and 10 miles west of Fort Belknap, Elm and scour that country. 3 It was this attack that cost men gone after Indians. Conrad Neuhous his life. 
