Labor Statistics, announced You are invited to meet with in Austin that he wished to remind the business men of Texas that if they expected to employ any child under the age of 16 years during the approaching school term, it will be necessary for them to take certain steps in order to comply with the laws of Texas concerning the employment of children. Commissioner King explained that the "Child Labor Law" required that any person who employes a child under the age of 16 in his business from Sept. 1 to June 1 must keep posted on his premises a "Child Work Per mit." 




