O'Rourke says it is a small world, as while waiting in New York to see Cardinal Cushing, there he saw a fellow student and while outside the Waldorf Astoria waiting while Pope Paul and the President, Lyndon B. Johnson, visited inside, he saw a neighbor from Abilene as well as a friend he had last seen in the Union of South Africa.

Other speakers are Mr. Charles Sherfese and Dr. Walter F. Speakman of Wichita Falls, on "Aspects of Genealogy."

In the afternoon a workshop will be held with Toni Turk of Wichita Falls directing.

Cotton quota polling places set

Polling places where Young County farmers may cast ballots in the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1966 upland cotton crop were announced today by L. B. Creel chairman, ASC County Committee. The referendum will be held on Tuesday, November 23, 1965.

The polling places are located as follows:

Community A—Ft. Belknap Electric Co-op Office Olney, Texas.

Community B—Economy Grocery, Jean, Texas.

Community C—ASCS Office, Graham, Texas.

Community D—Newcastle Gin Office, Newcastle, Texas.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.

Chairman Creel explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allotment quota program, so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. An issue in this year's vote also is the "domestic allotment" program provided by legislation under which growers may qualify for price support and diversion payments, in addition to loans, by reducing their cotton acreage at least 12.5 percent below the farm's allotment, putting the diverted acres into a conserving use, and meeting other provisions.

The lease or sale of cotton allotments is also provided by the new program, and growers will also vote Nov. 23 on whether to permit such transfers outside the particular county but within the state. The lease or sale of allotments will not be affected by the outcome of the marketing quota vote.

Farmers eligible to cast ballots in the marketing quota referendum are all those

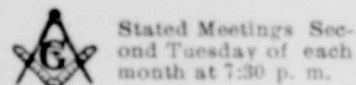

Top State Awards for '65 Claimed by 4-H Members

A Coleman County lad who's had a peek behind the Iron Curtain and a poised young woman from Edcouch in Hidalgo County have won state 4-H public speaking honors.

Joe Pat Hemphill, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Zeno Hemphill of Coleman, won the boy's award with a talk on "A World Without 4-H," which recounted his 1964 summer trip to East Berlin, Hungary and Czechoslovakia. Hemphill will receive a wrist watch from The Pure Oil Company.

Lynda Bowers, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Bowers, spoke on "Citizenship—Our Heritage and Our Responsibility" to win the state contest for girls. She will receive a chest of silverware from Pure Oil, the program sponsor.

Andy Scott, 17, of Childress, won the 4-H Dog Care and Train-

The 4-H'er with the best project in dairy foods was 16-year-old Joanna Lewis of Murchison. Carnation Company will give her a wrist watch.

Hemphill, born and raised on a ranch of more than 9,000 acres, had ample material for his many speeches on conservation and cattle. However, he also has spoken on "Democracy in Action" and read a dress revue script while Coleman County 4-H lovelies paraded their home-stitched fashions. Hemphill has been before TV cameras and on many radio shows.

In his "World Without 4-H" speech Hemphill characterized life in Czechoslovakia as dull and uninspiring. "Our trip was very short," said Hemphill, "but it was

enough to convince us that Communism is not progress."

Miss Bowers has given 24 speeches and appeared on radio and television. As president of her senior high school class she delivered the welcome address at graduation.

Public speaking, she says, has helped her gain poise and self-confidence. Miss Bowers attends Pan American College.

A profit of more than \$1,000 over six years tells how seriously Andy Scott has taken the Chihuahua-raising business.

Scott, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Scott, chose dog care as his main 4-H project, he says, because "it is one suited to a city boy." (Actually, 22 per cent of the 2.5 million 4-H'ers come from urban homes.) In all, Scott has sold 97 Chihuahua pups and has given away 10.

Scott gave four pups to a deaf mute woman because he felt dog raising would make life more enjoyable for her and help her financially. He says, he himself, would never have started his dog project without financial aid from his parents.

Dairy foods expert, Joanna Lewis, says she is "thoroughly familiar with milk" because she has lived all her life on a dairy farm.

Miss Lewis has been an asset to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joyce Lewis, by helping out with every dairy operation. She feeds calves, flushes lines, washes out the 700-gallon tank, gets cows from the pastures, and milks them.

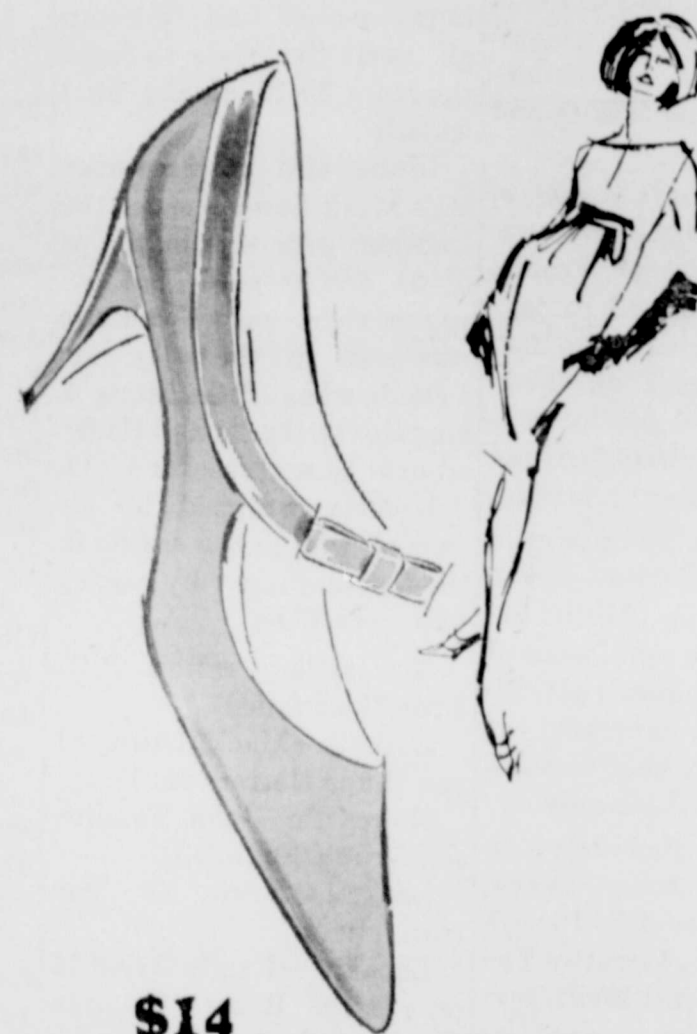
In addition, she churns her own butter and makes cottage cheese and sour milk.

In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right of a public trial, says Article the Sixth of the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the United States.

So people may know, newspapers must report these trials.

This is not freedom of the press. This is responsibility of the press.

Newspapers have no extraordinary rights.

People do.

Men have the right to a public trial and the right to know what happens in courtrooms. These are rights written into the Constitution and affirmed by the Supreme Court in 1829 when Mr. Justice Bagley wrote: "It is one of the essential qualities of a court of justice that its proceedings should be public."

If people are to know the truth the newspaper must report the news.

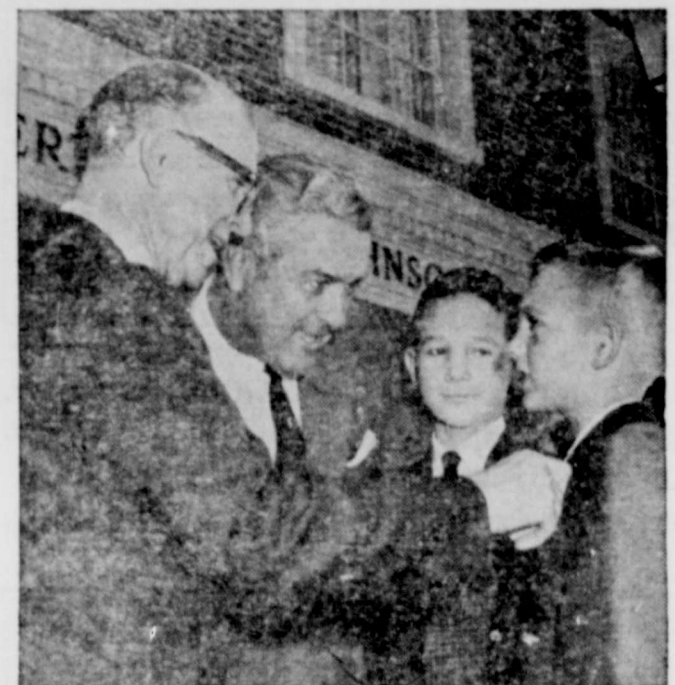
