\$250,000 Fire Rakes Olney Business District

Olney, Texas.—An early morning fire Sunday in the heart of downtown Olney destroyed two buildings, damaged another and threatened a fourth. The blaze was discovered about 4 a. m. and finally brought under control about 7:30 a. m.

The fire began in the building occupied by the Community Public Service Co., electric utility for this area. Walter A. Cox, fire marshal, said the blaze appeared under control about 5 a. m. but broke out again and spread to LeRoy's Jewelry store adjacent on the east. East of the jewelry store, the building occupied by Hughey's drygoods, was heavily damaged and the contents almost a total loss from heat, smoke and water. A newly remodeled building behind the utility office, owned by Marvin Hickey, was threatened for a time.

Fire fighting units from five surrounding towns helped Olney firemen battle the blaze.

The utility office and jewelry store were destroyed, with nothing but piles of rubble to indicate the location. The Community Public Service was fortunate in recovering most of their records.

Olney Fire Chief Foster Richmond tentatively estimated the damage at \$250,000.

Olney police were investigating a motorist's report that he saw a man in the Community Public Service building as he drove through Olney about 2 a. m.

Re-entry venture southwest of Newcastle

English Jackson Inc., Longview, will re-enter and re-work to old total depth of 4369 feet a previously drilled wildcat six miles southwest of Newcastle. It is No. 1 Eulalia McKinney, 330 feet from west and south lines of A. J. Martin survey A-1994.

R. M. Hill originally drilled the venture and plugged it last August.

Cequin Corp., Dallas, finished No. 2 Scott heirs eight miles northwest of Newcastle section 335, TE&S survey.

During 24-hour test the well flowed 41.8 barrels of 41 gravity crude through 4-64 inch choke from eight perforations at 4684-94 feet with 770 pounds pressure on casing and 480 pounds on tubing. Gas-oil ratio was 585-1. Pay was treated with 750 gallons of acid. The 4 1-2 inch casing was cemented on bottom at 4708 feet.

THE 25th INFANTRY DIVISION— "THE TROPIC LIGHTNING DIVISION"

August 2, 1950 Korea

Following their capture of the capital city of Seoul, North Korean troops continued their advance to the south virtually unopposed. The port of Pusan was their final objective.

To add strength to the left flank of the defense line protecting the city, the 25th Infantry Division was ordered to shift its position from the right to the left flank, a distance of some 150 miles.

Men and equipment were moved to the new southwestern front during the night using all available vehicles. In a matter of hours they were in position. Later the 25th counter-attacked against superior North Korean forces helping to keep the enemy off balance. Their action aided in preventing a breakthrough and in saving Pusan from capture.

The menu consisted of venison, goat and coon. Dominos were played till the fuses started, and all repaired to their quarters. A good time was had by all.

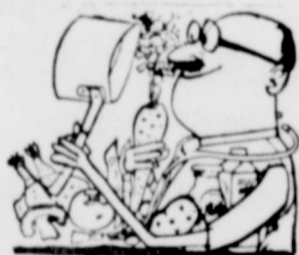

Doctor in the Kitchen

CALORIES DO COUNT!

Yes, unfortunately, calories do count, in spite of all you hear to the contrary. Not only that, but they have a sneaky way of counting UP, if you don't watch them. Or even if you do!

What are calories, anyhow, and how do they work?

Doesn't everybody know what a calorie is? Don't the ladies talk about them in the super-market, the laundromat, or over the back fence? Don't even the men talk about them as they eat their hearty lunches while they talk business, or order another hot dog at the ball game?

Of course—but what are calories, really?

The simplest way to explain them is to say that they are units of heat or energy. The body requires them regularly in correct amounts. If it gets too few, weight is lost. If it gets too many, weight is put on. It's as simple as that.

How Many Needed

The number of calories the body needs depends on several factors. In proportion to size, babies need more than anybody else. This requirement grows less as they grow older. Even in adolescence, when spectacular growth calls for more total calories in the diet, the need for calories per pound of body weight is less than earlier in life. And this trend continues throughout life.

As an adult, one needs fewer calories in proportion to body weight, and in old age, even fewer, because the activity grows less as one grows older.

All common foods have been chemically analyzed and their calorie value is known. Calorie lists have been published in many forms. In general, proteins supply four calories per gram or about 60 per ounce; carbohydrates have the same calorie value. Fats supply 9 calories per gram or 135 per ounce. These are the values of the pure substances; foods are mixtures, and their calorie value is determined by actual tests in which they are reduced to ashes and their energy output observed in terms of heat, by recording how much their burning raises the temperature of a measured amount of water.

Energy Needs Vary

Calorie needs vary with activity; people who work seated at a desk use much less than those who work actively with their muscles. It is said that sitting and thinking uses no more calories than just sitting. Most people can keep their weight about right by observing it periodically and eating less or getting more activity when they find themselves gaining. If this doesn't work, a huddle with the doctor might be advisable, since some disease processes influence energy requirements.

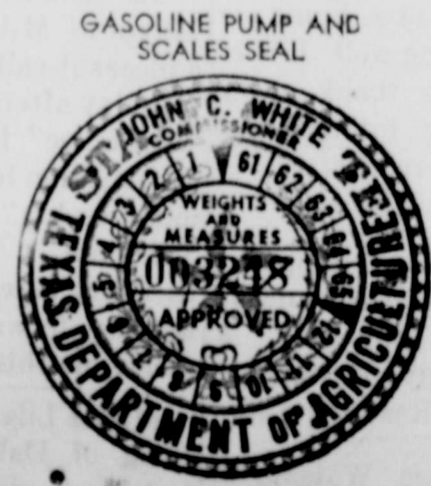
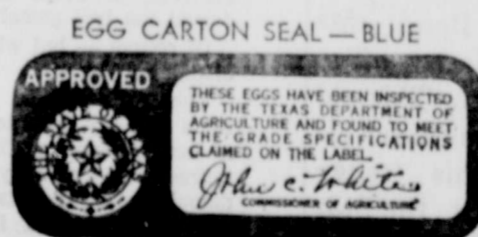

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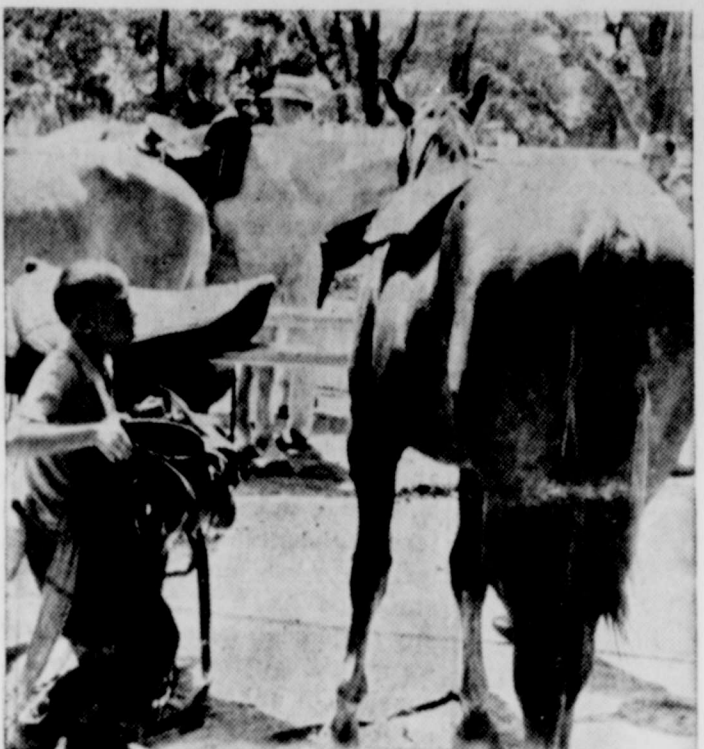

Well, another great upland bird shooting season is just a memory. But—as the old song asks—am I blue? Not a bit, and neither is my husband Joe. We discovered several years ago how much extra-added hunting pleasure we can have at our local shooting preserve!

Shooting preserves are really a great boon to shotgun lovers, and there are more of them available each year. There are nearly 2,000 now, scattered throughout 45 states. You can get a free list of well over 400 preserves from the Sportsmen's Service Bureau, 420 Lexington Ave., New York 17, N. Y., and it's a pretty good bet that one or more of them is within easy driving distance of your home.

Many preserves have seasons that will extend your shooting well into March and April, and some are open year-round. They offer pheasant, quail, partridge and mallard as fast and wary as their wild cousins—and there's no bag limit. Most provide gun dogs and handlers, some have food and lodgings—but check for yourself. You'll find that preserve shooting means fine, first-rate, extra-season fun!
