## Medicare Meetings set for Friday in Olney and Graham

Two Medicare Educational meetings have been arranged by the county agent L. M. McCarroll. These will be held in the Community Center, Olney at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, March 4, and in Graham at the County Court Room at 2:00 p.m. on the same date. Mr. Joe Nesbitt, Social Security Representative, from the Wichita Falls office will be on hand to explain the Medicare Program and to answer any questions concerning the program.

He will also sign up interested parties which are eligible. According to a recent report, there are more than 800,000 Texas 65 years of age or older who are eligible for benefits offered by the Medicare Program. According to McCarroll, there are more than 2000 eligible persons in Young County. The Agent emphasizes that the deadline for applying for Medicare is March 31. After this date, persons 65 and over and still employed may apply for Social Security anytime before July 1968, must also apply for Medicare now or wait until 1968 to receive benefits. Even if you are 65 or over and not receiving Social Security or State Old Age Assistance, it is important that you visit the Social Security Office or attend one of these meetings for full details on Medicare.

The Extension Service and the Social Security Service are most anxious that all senior citizens understand the Medicare Program and then decide for themselves if they wish to participate. The meetings should prove educational and beneficial to all persons attending.

## Voter Registration Period Extends Through March 17

Texans who failed to pay their poll tax have a chance to register for a vote in the 1966 elections. This time it's "for free."

Registration period extends from March 3 through Mar. 17. Any citizen eligible to vote can sign up with his county tax assessor collector and his name will be placed on the poll list at no charge. So reads the "emergency" provision in the new voter registration act just passed by the Legislature and signed in to law by Gov. Connally.

Hereafter, free registration will take place from October through January each year. All who paid poll taxes by January 31 will be entitled to vote as usual, without re-registering.

Any person who desires to register and is eligible to register under this new voter registration law, may do so at the Tax Assessor-Collectors office in the Courthouse at Graham or at the Tax Assessor-Collector's substation in the City Hall at Olney during regular office hours of the two locations. For further information, please call Kelly Jones, the Tax Assessor Collector, at Graham at telephone number LI 9-1393, or come by the office to discuss it more fully.

We are planning to make a trip to Newcastle in October

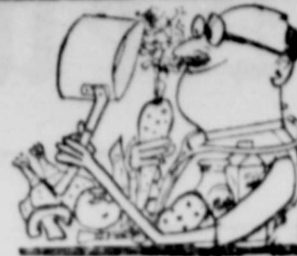
for the home coming at the First Methodist Church; that is, if the school doesn't object to our taking the girls from school.

**Doctor in the Kitchen**

**GAINING WEIGHT**

In a nation whose principal nutrition problem, and maybe its most important health problem, is overweight, there are actually many persons who want to, and ought to, GAIN weight.

Underweight is generally regarded as an advantage in terms of long life and relative freedom from the diseases and discomforts that go along with overweight. In general this is true, and there is validity in the old proverb that a lean horse is best for a long race.

**Body Needs Fat**  
 But there are disadvantages to underweight, besides the nickname "skinny." The body requires a certain amount of fat in the right places for comfort and good health. Under the skin there is normally a layer of fat which acts as an insulator to help keep the person warm, and plays a part in forming the more pleasing contours of the body, especially the feminine body. Pads of fat in the abdomen, and in the apron-like curtain called the omentum which covers the intestines, help to support internal organs in their places. Fat also plays a part in joints.

The long and overly lean individual is more susceptible to

certain chest conditions, including tuberculosis, and digestive troubles of the ulcer type, than is the person of normal weight or above.

**How To Gain Weight**  
 How, then, can the underweight person put on more pounds? The procedure is the reverse of that recommended for losing weight. The first step is the same — namely a complete medical examination. Before one can hope to gain weight, one must be free from disease conditions which keep the weight down. When this has been established, the procedure then is as follows:

1. Try to eat more; if necessary eat more often;
  2. Eat more of the foods that furnish more calories in small bulk; butter, cheese, meat, eggs, sweets, chocolate, cream;
  3. Reduce activity; sit more and stand less, ride more and walk less;
  4. Whenever possible, rest or nap after eating.
- Of course, in choosing your foods, be sure to include the necessary variety from the four food groups, but emphasize the foods that are commonly, though inaccurately, called 'fattening.' It is the diet as a whole that is fattening; not any one food.
