The Mayor has been advised by Mr. Chester Sinclair manager of the FHA that they are in a position to accept preliminary application and to process same upon receipt and subject to funds made available.

The City is seeking a loan of \$42,000.00 to construct the lake and improve the water plant, which if secured will be one of the best things that ever happened to Newcastle. The cooperation of everyone is needed.

## Old Landmark Destroyed by Fire

A blaze about 9 o'clock Sunday night destroyed one of the oldest landmarks in this part of the county, which was the house presently owned by Mr. and Mrs. Riley Roberts.

The Roberts had gone to Graham for a short while, and on returning home could see the house in flames. It is not known how the blaze started or how long it had been burning, before being discovered.

Nothing was saved from the home and we have not learned how much the loss was estimated to be, or whether there was any insurance.

The house, built with brick made below where the house was located on the banks of the Brazos just west of Fort Belknap, was back in the 1800's, headquarters for the Figure 2 Ranch.

The house was constructed by the grandfather of A. W. Whiteley and another man, for an early day pioneer, a member of the Reynolds family.

The house was owned in the early 1900's by the late Bill Bush and was later known as the Jim Thompson place.

Dear Gaspard:

I should like to take this opportunity to express to you my thanks for the cooperation of your newspaper in publicizing the period of Conditional Voter Registration which ended on the 17th of March. It was through your effort that the people of this county were made aware of their responsibilities and privileges under the new voter registration act. Because of your public spirited endeavor more people were registered as qualified voters than was expected.

There was a total of 868 persons registered as voters during the Conditional Voter Registration period. There were 2821 who had previously qualified as voters. This makes the total registered voting strength of Young County 3689, which is close to that of the last General Election. As the figures given do not indicate the number of persons eligible to vote who are not subject to the registration laws because of age or other reasons, it is impossible to accurately forecast our total voting potential. It is felt, however, that the above figures are an indication that possibly more people are becoming aware of their responsibilities, obligations and privileges as citizens of our state by becoming qualified to cast their vote in our future elections.

Again, thanks for your cooperation and support.

off the Coast of Vietnam with the Seventh Fleet.

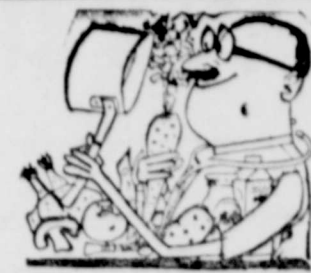
Hornet provided the Seventh Fleet with anti-submarine defense and search and rescue services.

**Doctor in the Kitchen**

**MAKE BREAKFAST A FAMILY MEAL**

Last week we had you smiling, we hope, as you said 'cheese.' This week you may be groaning over the subject of getting your child to eat breakfast. Well, as my youngest son used to remark when he was five years old, "That's life." We never found out where he learned it.

Children's breakfasts are a problem in many households, for two reasons. One is that the wrong trends are permitted to develop into a problem, instead of being anticipated and prevented. The other—well, let's first talk about wrong trends.

Why should a child dutifully eat his nutritious breakfast under the following conditions:

1. The various members of the family get up at different times and breakfast on their own time;
2. some don't eat any breakfast;
3. others take a cup of coffee;
4. nobody talks to anybody else if it can be avoided;
5. everybody follows his own pattern of breakfast;
6. they all expect Jimmy or Susie to do as they say, not as they do;
7. the only way to get attention is to keep mother worried.

Under such conditions, any intelligent child can hardly be blamed if he makes a project out of not eating.

The first step in outwitting the breakfast impasse is to have the family eat breakfast together, even if somebody has to get up earlier than he otherwise would. An attractively set table, done the night before, a good breakfast with fruit or juice, milk, and cereal one day, eggs another, bacon or sausage another, an occasional omelette or chipped beef in cream, or waffles or french toast or pancakes, should tempt both children and adults, provided...

Provided, there is an atmosphere of courtesy and good humor pervading the occasion. One hardly expects, or desires, exuberant and effervescent brilliance at the breakfast table. But the morning grouch so fondly nursed by many who boast that they don't come alive until after 10 a.m., is just as much out of place.

**Mother The Key**

Mother is the key person. If, even before her first child, she establishes good breakfast habits as a part of the process of civilizing her husband, the children are more likely to follow their parents' example, and the problem is less likely to arise.

The second reason a child's breakfast may be a problem in some households is that mothers are too prone to worry if a child doesn't eat everything put before him. This may be a carry-over from the 'clean plate' fallacy, which was touted as a 'health habit' some years ago. There are times when a clean plate can make a rebellious tummy. Grown folks don't eat when they don't feel like it? Neither do animals. Why should children? As long as it does not become a habit, an occasional "Mommy, I'm not hungry," should be passed off without a fuss. If it becomes habitual, a doctor may be needed.

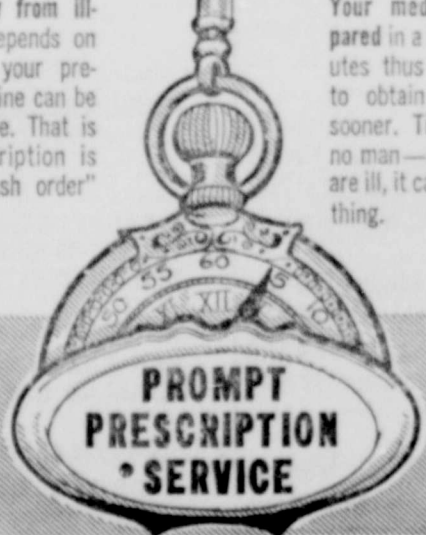
