The telephone switchboard which served Newcastle during all the years she had a telephone company office has finally been found and returned home. Not quite home but nearly, since it has been placed in the museum at Fort Belknap, some three miles away.

During Easter weekend around 700 persons visited the fort and the switchboard was the conversation piece, especially among those who were home-folks.

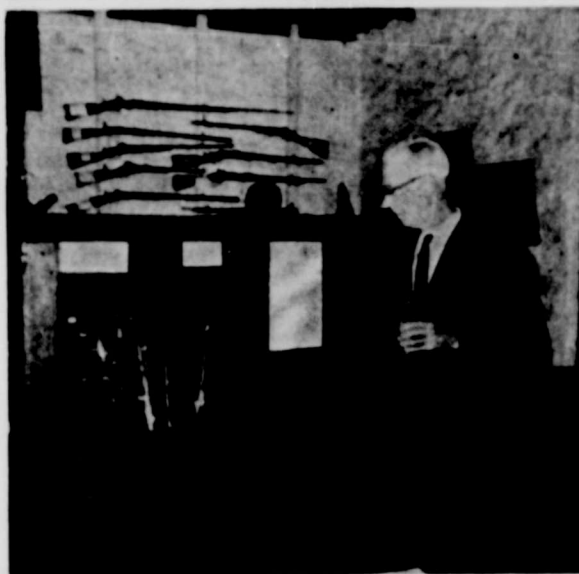
The old cranked telephone is within the memory of a considerable number of Americans. A few sharp turns of the crank brought us the feminine voice of "Central." We could not see this lady, but in those days, long ago, our mind begat images of what the ladies at "Central" looked like.

In small towns "Central" was one of two women who worked shifts. They knew all the telephone subscribers by name and the use of numbers was really not necessary. If Mrs. Harvey was calling Mrs. Johnson and had no answer to the pealing

bell, "Central" would break in to say that she had heard Mrs. Johnson tell Mrs. Hill in an earlier conversation that she was going down to M. E. DeLong Grocery and Raney's Drygoods Store to shop.

Newcastle's much loved long-time "Central" was the late Mrs. Lora Beall. She probably worked at this old switchboard longer than any other person. Lora was the alarm clock for many; she took messages to the fire departments, to Drs. Mars and Coop, to the mortician, and she knew who would be home for the holiday or weekend and she knew who was absent. She was "Information Central."

The removal of "Central" from towns across America has taken away a colorful and interesting chapter of the town's life. Now Newcastle's old switchboard can be seen in the fort's museum. It has been missing (going from dealer to dealer) for 15 or 20 years but now a donor has found it in Decatur, purchased it for the last time, and placed it where all can once again see it. For a moment, their imaginations can supply their own story.

Newcastle Bobcat tracksters qualified six members for the regional track meet scheduled for this Saturday in Denton. The right to enter the regional events came as the district 15-B track meet was held in Wichita Falls Saturday. The Bobcat team brought back second place honors.

Boys qualifying for the regional meet are Preston Pitts, Leon Parsons, Emmitt Reynolds, Claude Kinser, Buster Mitchell and Mike Mitchell. The events they entered and their placings were

Pitts — first in the broad jump with a 19' 2" leap; second in the high hurdles in 15:8, and anchored the mile relay team.

Parsons — placed second in the 440-yard-dash in 54:4; placed second in the high jump with a 5' 8" effort; and ran the first leg on the mile relay team.

B. Mitchell — placed first in the pole vault with an 11' leap.

M. Mitchell — placed second in the pole vault at 10' 6".

Reynolds and Kinser — completed the team for the mile relay with Pitts and Parsons which won first with a 3:40:1 time.

Other Bobcats participating in the district meet and their placings were:

John Bullock — fourth place in the high jump at 5' 6"; fourth place in the high hurdles; and sixth place in the low hurdles after falling down.

Aaron Hugler — third in the low hurdles in 22:1.

The Bobcat track team this year has only two juniors and no seniors with team member primarily being freshmen and sophomores. First and second place winners at the regional meet will qualify for the state finals to be held in Austin on May 6 and 7.

Bloodmobile Visit 3 Weeks Away

In just three weeks the Red River Red Cross Regional bloodmobile will again be in Olney for the purpose of collecting that life saving medicine called blood.

For the purpose of getting help in securing more donors for this visit than we've had before there will be a planning meeting. On April 27, Wednesday after evening church services there will be a planning meeting in the Community Room of the Olney Federal Savings and Loan Building. All pastors, civic organization presidents, blood program chairman of all organizations and all interested persons are asked to be there.

George Clevenger, director of the Red River Red Cross Regional Blood Center, Wichita Falls,

Mrs. Charles Byers, local blood program recruitment chairman and volunteer consultant-blood for the Texas counties of this region, and Harrell Parlan, local blood program chairman, if at all possible, will be on hand from 8 p.m. until 9 or later to answer all questions you might have and to tell you how you can help save another persons life. If you cannot give, the next best thing is to help get those people that can give a pint of their blood.

Tomorrow the bloodmobile will be in Graham at the Reddy Room from 11:30 to 5:30 for the purpose of collecting blood for Graham and Young County residents. If you are in Graham or if you know you will be out of town on the 12th of May, go by to give a pint of blood. The

Center is low on blood at this time, especially O positive.

This club is in charge of recruitment for Olney and assists Mrs. Byers in typing cards, typing telephone lists and in every way they can think of to help in this lifesaving work. Casebearer Time Again

It's almost that time of year again. That time when pecan growers begin to apprehensively watch their orchards for signs of the pecan nut casebearer. It's the major pecan pest in Texas and severe infestations can destroy an entire pecan crop.

Tom Denman, researcher at Texas A&M University's West Cross Timbers Experiment Station near Stephenville, has done research which shows the banding system eliminates much of the present guesswork in timing the spraying schedule for the casebearer.

The first step in a banding system, says John Thomas, Extension entomologist at A&M is to wrap heavy corrugated paper or burlap around trees suspected of having the casebearer pupae. He says the bands should be wrapped around smaller

limbs just before the bark becomes rough.

The pupae travel down the tree limbs looking for a secluded place to undergo the transformation to a moth. They hide under the bands of paper or burlap where large numbers of them are easily captured.

The next step, says Thomas, is to catch the pupae and place them in glass jars with ventilated lids. Then emergence records should be kept. When about 10 percent of the moths emerge, spraying should begin in about 8-10 days.

The 8-10 day waiting period is to allow the free moths time to lay eggs and for the eggs to hatch, says Thomas. The trick is to spray within the critical period just after most of the eggs have hatched, he says.

Flower Show Provides Interest For Everyone

In a well-ordered flower show, there are always two divisions: horticulture — or, flowers which gardeners have grown and which are displayed singly for excellence of form; and artistic design — or, arrangements of flowers, greenery and other materials, arranged to represent a certain theme.

The show is set for Friday, April 29 from 2 to 7 p.m.

In the Olney Garden Club — Green Thumb Club annual flower show, these two divisions will be very evident. Olney gardeners will bring single blooms of iris, roses, tulips, gladioli and other flowers, to be judged for horticultural excellence.

But they will also bring carefully arranged artistic design entries, which will help to carry out the show's theme: "A City in Progress."

The Artistic Design Division is divided into classes, each of which represents a phase of Olney economic or social life. A garden club member enters an arrangement in a class to represent, as best she can, the topic of the class.

Olney's past will be represented in "Our Pioneers," a still life depicting an important event in the history of Olney.

The Farming Industry can be represented by any combination of grain, flowers, foliage, fruit and vegetables. Olney's Ranch and Cattle industry will call for an artistic design using dried materials.

A marine object as dominant interest will be used in entries depicting "Our Lakes and Streams," along with fresh cut plant material which grows near water.

"The Oil Industry" will call for an interpretative design using dried materials, and "The Aircraft Industry" will be based on dried or fresh material.

"The Space Surveillance Station" will be represented with abstract designs typifying man's exploration of the unknown.

Conservation will be represented in two classes: "Our Wild Birds" and "The Terraced Land." The first will include an arrangement using the colors of a particular bird and the second will be a horizontal arrangement, incorporating a length of weathered wood to suggest rhythm.

"The Manufacturing Industry" will be an assemblage representing the factory, "Our Schools" will use foliage only, and "Our Churches", a design depicting fellowship and can use paired containers as one arrangement.

"Our Hospitals" calls for an interpretation in vertical design, using a minimum of painted materials. "Our Clubs" is to be a design in warm analogous colors to be displayed on pedestal.

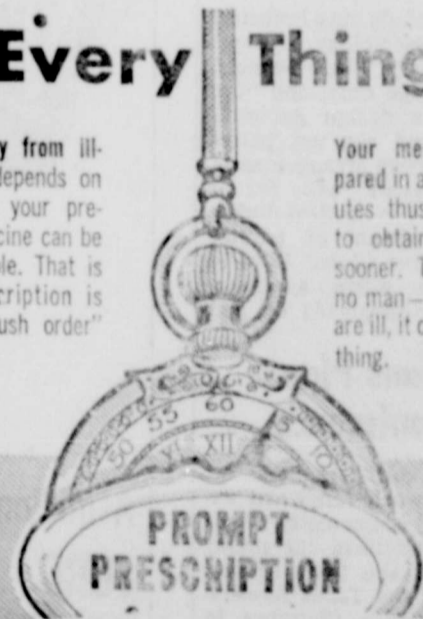

Fenoglio Makes Formal Statement

To the Voters of Young County and the 86th Legislative District of Texas:

I am a candidate to represent you in Austin for the next two years as your state representative.

During the next few weeks I shall make a great effort to see each of you personally to solicit your support. Since this legislative district is such a large one, however, I am afraid that I may not be able to see all of you. Therefore, this is an humble invitation to vote for Tony Fenoglio of Montague County as your next state representative on election day, May 7.

In asking you for your support, I think it is only fair that I explain to you the platform on which I am running. If you would like to help me accomplish the following program, then I ask you to join my effort:

1) Support of Education—I wholeheartedly support our

state's efforts to increase the education level of our citizens, and I think this should be one of the highest items in our legislative agenda. Both our public school children and our college students must be given maximum support from their citizens. Schools in this district, both rural and urban, should be supported so that they will be equal to or greater than schools of national level. I further recommend that serious study be given to see if the need does not exist for establishing junior colleges in our district.

2) Expansion of Industry — Texas is fast changing from a rural society to an urban society. The 86th Legislative district is doing likewise. If I am elected your state representative, I shall work to obtain more industry for our towns and shall expend my energy in behalf of business. I shall work with the chambers of commerce to help to secure a more favorable business climate both tax-wise and labor-wise.

3) Improvement of Agriculture — Although Texas is changing its image from an agricultural state to an industrial state, it is still a basic fact that no nation can maintain its status of prosperity and power if it cannot feed its people. The 86th Legislative district is still a rural district, and its farmers need support from its elective state representative. If I am elected your representative, I shall support legislation which will help our farmers obtain better rural roads so that they may market their products. I shall support the Texas Extension Service so that more and better research can be expanded in behalf of our farmers.

4) Conservation of our Soil and Water Resources — Texas is blessed with some of the best land in the nation. We must see that this land is properly taken care of, not only for ourselves, but for future generations. There is ample water in Texas today if we know how to conserve it. We must make a greater effort at saving it to fulfill the greater demands of industry, agriculture, and domestic users.

5) Improvement of our Highways and Roads — each year government statistics tell a sad story concerning more lives lost on the highways. This is

not a "growth" statistic that Texans can boast of. I believe that better and safer highways will reverse this trend of increasing highway deaths. I shall direct my efforts as your state representative towards obtaining a better highway system for the greatest state in the nation.

The things that I am offering my support to, I realize, are going to cost money. Our fiscal representatives should practice the utmost economy in spending our state's income so that we get the most from each tax dollar. If new taxes are deemed necessary, I pledge my support to secure the above program which all Texans are now demanding. Rather than recommend a source of revenue, which will support this program, I will give serious considerations to the proposals of our state-wide elective officers in this matter so that we may have more effective teamwork in Austin.

I suppose many of you are wondering about my personal qualifications for holding this important office. I submit the following facts:

I was born the son of a tenant farmer in Montague County. I attended the rural schools near Montague and the public high schools of Montague and Nocona from which I graduated. After high school graduation I attended the old Bowie business college, Decatur Baptist College, and Rice Institute in Houston.

Throughout my life, with the exception of a short employment in a leather goods factory and as manager of the chamber of commerce in my home town, I have been self-employed as a lease broker in the oil and gas business and as a rancher and farmer. My success in these ventures, I hope, will hold over into the legislative halls in Austin.
