Support Pledged Belknap Improvement

Representatives from Newcastle agreed to participate in a proposed landscaping and building program for Ft Belknap. The decision came Monday night in a joint meeting held in Newcastle among members of the Olney and Graham Chambers of Commerce and representatives of Newcastle and Fort Belknap.

The Olney Chamber agreed to sell 35 per cent of the trees for the landscape proposal with Graham furnishing 55 per cent and Newcastle 10 per cent. The proposed building program which will provide an archives building at the Fort will be studied by a committee of the bodies represented.

Judge Raymon Thompson presided at the meeting held in the Newcastle High School Auditorium with some 50 persons in attendance. He told a short history of the Fort and recommended that the Ft be promoted as a tourist attraction. During 1966 more than 25,000 persons visited the Fort grounds.

The judge pointed out that the Fort is currently being maintained by county funds as a county park as has been the situation for the past 30 years.

Ted Clark, chairman of a committee appointed to investigate an archives building for the Fort, presented the plans for the 81 x 28 structure built the same as the present buildings. The archives would contain a fire-proof, dust-proof vault that would be 26 x 52, a reception room, office, micro-film room, rest rooms and a reading room.

Clark pointed out the fact that the current archives contains some extremely valuable papers, letters and other documents and is presently housed in one end of the buildings. The present facilities do not provide adequate protection or space for the archives, which is growing each year.

Clark continued that stone and rock for the building exterior is available. The Commissioners Court has placed \$2500 in the building fund but additional funds are needed to construct the building.

Dr. Kenneth Neighbors spoke briefly on the attempt to acquire all the records concerning the Fort from its beginning. Much of this information has been obtained from the National Archives and from individuals who had relatives serving at the Fort.

Dr. Neighbors pointed out that one very valuable addition to the archives is the Boyce House writings which will be transferred to Fort Belknap as soon as adequate facilities are available.

Junior Stock Show Set To Begin Monday Morning

Annual Young County Junior Livestock Show will officially get underway Monday, Jan. 23 with all animals entered livestock barn no later than 8 a.m.

This year's event will again be held in the livestock barn in Firemen's Park in Graham. Those wishing to take their stock to the show on Sunday, may do so between 3 and 6 p. m. according to Nathan Allen, general show superintendent.

Weighing of commercial and junior steers, market lambs and market barrows will be completed between 7 and 8 a.m. Monday.

A total of 328 head of livestock has been entered in this year's show and will compete for \$1500 in prize money, ribbons, rosettes and 31 trophies. This is an increase of 40 head over the 1966 show.

L. N. McCarroll, county agent, outlined the program for Monday-Placing of Angora goats, breeding ewes and market and market lambs will begin at 9 a.m. with Dr. Edwin DeBose, associate professor of agriculture at ACC as judge.

(Continued From Page One) lities are available. At the present time the writings are at Texas Wesleyan College.

Roy Veal, who has charge of beautifying the Fort grounds, presented plans for landscaping the grounds. The plans were made available to the Fort from a landscape architect at Texas A&M. The plans call for the addition of about 140 new trees, mostly around the perimeter of the grounds.

Veal presented a proposal for providing the trees, which was accepted by the representatives present. Under Veal's proposal the trees would be offered for sale to the public with a marble marker placed at the base of each tree designating the donor or in whose honor or memory the tree

was given.

Persons wishing to purchase a tree should contact the Olney Chamber of Commerce and pick out the tree's location on the landscape map. The tree locations will be designated on a first-come first-served basis.

John R. Bullock, president of the Fort Belknap Water Corporation, suggested tying Fort Belknap proper onto the corporation's system.

A committee from Olney, Graham and Newcastle will be appointed to work with officials of Fort Belknap.
