State Elections

WASHINGTON (AFNA) Elections for statewide offices will be held in only four states in 1977. However, there will be many local elections conducted by towns, counties and municipalities.

In these local elections there is no uniform schedule of election dates or offices to be filled.

Kentucky, New Jersey, Virginia, and Wisconsin will hold elections for state officers during 1977. In every case, the Federal Post Card Application for Absentee Ballot (FPCA) should be used to register and request absentee ballots. The FPCA is the absentee voter's only contact with state or local elections officials. It must be prepared and addressed completely and correctly.

EGLIN AFB, Fla. (AFNS) - Bob Hope was the star, but the celebrities were the widows of the Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows Home (AFEMWH) during a special threehour performance here recently.

Instructors Needed

MAXWELL AFB, Ala. (AFNS) -Air Force Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (AFJROTC) officials announced that more than 100 instructor positions will be available to retired Air Force members this fall at high schools throughout the United States.

Instructors teach the curriculum of the AFJROTC program in high schools and are employed as members of the local faculty. Those interested in applying for the instructor positions must be under 65 years of age, be retired within the last four years, and have had at least 20 years' active duty.

Officers must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution. Noncommissioned officers must be high school graduates or the equivalent. Air Force members on active duty and interested in making application should be

DoD employees gather to hear remarks by commander in chief

WASHINGTON (AFNS) President Jimmy Carter paid a "getacquainted" visit to the Department of Defense (DoD) March 1 to speak to an estimated 8,000 military and civilian DoD employees gathered in the Pentagon courtyard.

The commander in chief set an informal tone for his remarks, referring to his own service in the Navy and commenting about coming to the Pentagon as the senior officer.

The pay is good as the commander in chief, Mr. Carter said, and the quarters are adequate. But, he pointed out, he doesn't get a uniform financial capability for any nation to provide for military weapons and the personnel to use those weapons if necessary.

Second to None

"But within that limit, there is always the opportunity for us to use those limited resources in the most efficient and effective and predictable way. And that's a challenge for us all," he stated.

... whatever might come in the future," the President said, "we will ensure the American people, with and through you, that our military strength and our capability to defend freedom will be second to none in all the world, and you can depend on that," Mr. Carter emphasized.

Safety Awards

Randolph AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) -The 14th Flying Training Wing (FTW), Columbus AFB, Miss., was awarded the command's Undergraduate Pilot Training To Promote Safety (TOPS) Trophy and the Commander's Award for 1976. This is the first time one unit has won both awards in a single year.

The TOPS trophy is presented each year to the UPT wing which has the lowest aircraft accident rate. The 14th FTW was the only UPT wing in the command with a zero aircraft accident rate in 1976.

Additionally, the wing exceeded its Programmed Reduction Objectives (PRO) in ground accidents by 35 per cent to win the Commander's Award.

Dedication Lauded

The President lauded DoD personnel for their dedication.

"There is no other department in government which consistently demonstrates such a superb level of courage and dedication, and quite often, personal sacrifice," Mr. Carter said.

'We are partners," he said, "and every one of you is important in the process of insuring our nation's safety.

"I feel very strongly, and personally, the responsibility on my shoulders as the leader of our country, and as the commander in chief of the armed forces. I'll do the best I can not to disappoint you in any way," he promised.

"I think all of you know as well as I do," Mr. Carter explained, "that there is always a limited amount of

The comments drew rapid and lengthy applause from the audience which ranged from enlisted personnel to general officers, and from the lower to the supergrade civilians.

Mr. Carter's remarks were followed by a question-and-answer session. The chief executive followed a pattern of fielding questions with enthusiasm.

No Union

The President said he doesn't favor unionization of the military. He said he doesn't know of any strong move, even among national labor leaders, in that direction.

The President also said he doesn't know yet what changes, if any, he will propose to the military retirement system. Military pay,

directors and his prerequisites in making the selections would be honesty, integrity and open communications.

Military and civilian questioners alike were concerned with their image with the American people. Separate questions were put to the President about a general attack on the military by a member of Congress, and about low morale of career civil service employees.

"I have the greatest possible admiration for those of you who have been willing to give your own life in civilian or military service for the defense of our country," Mr. Carter said in brief. "I appreciate what you're doing and I want to make that clear to everyone.'

The President was also questioned about the effect his pardon for selective service viola-

responsiveness, the President said a decision hasn't been made whether to reinstitute the draft to fill requirements for either active or reserve forces

No plans for Draft

Mr. Carter admitted concern for the recruitment of reserve forces, but said he has no plans at present to return to a mandatory draft. He did say he would not hesitate to call for a draft law if it becomes evident that the United States cannot adequately defend itself without such a measure.

In closing, the President said, "I'll do whatever I can not ever to disappoint you; and I know, that based on your past record and your constant commitment, that you will never disappoint me or the American people as we try to exemplify the finest aspects of the greatest nation on earth.

Presently, the living accommodations consist of 80 twobedroom apartments. Plans are being studied to provide a new 200unit facility nearby that will be designed especially to accommodate

Each apartment has one bath, a kitchen/dinning-room combination, and a living room. Heating and air conditioning are individually controlled by thermostats within each unit and all appliances are electric. Residents pay for electricity and their own telephone and cable television, but sewage and garbage pickup is furnished by the foundation.

Teresa Village has a modern laundry on the premises and residents have free use of the swimming pool, tennis court, library and television room. Plans call for a game and craft room. Churches of

most denominations are nearby. Eglin AFB is only five miles from the front door for convenient exchange and commissary shopping.

Thanks to the NCO Wives Club at Keesler AFB, Miss., Teresa Village has a modern van to transport residents on a regular basis to Eglin and to take them on recreation tours.

The Air Force has a proud history of doing things for people. Teresa Village, in providing housing and services for older members of our Air Force family, is an illustration of that tradition.

Civil Word Employees should ensure that beneficiary is correct

(AFNS Editorial)

As a Federal employee, you should make sure that benefits under the retirement, Federal Employees' Group-Life Insurance and leave laws will be paid according to your wishes.

From time to time, there may be changes in your family status-marriage, death. births-that might affect your preference as to who should receive these benefits following death.

If you haven't designated a beneficiary, payment of lump-sum retirement benefits, group-life

insurance, unused annual leave, and unpaid salary will be made in the following order:

• To your spouse.

• If there is no spouse, to your child or children in equal shares, with the share of any deceased child distributed among the descendents of that child.


• If none of these, then to your parents in equal shares, or the entire amount to the surviving parent.

• If none of these, then to the executor or administrator of your estate

• If none of these, then to the other next of kin entitled under the laws of the state in which you lived.

It isn't necessary to designate a beneficiary unless you wish payment to be made in a way other than the order of precedence indicated above.

You should review your situation. If there have been changes in your family status that would affect your preference for a beneficiary, you may want to make a change in designation. If so, contact your personnel office.

The 1976 theme was, "Human Goals - Foundations of Our Heritage."


The theme for the 1977 contest is "My Responsibilities in Keeping My

One airman has already gotten sick because of this milk. I wish we could have something done about it.

When Veterinary Services is notified of a complaint on a vending machine, they immediately call the company to register the complaint and inform them that the machine will be placed "Out of Order" if the discrepancy is not corrected immediately. In addition, it is their practice to perform a follow-up inspection of the machine.

Commander's CARE Line

I have been informed that this was the procedure followed concerning your original complaint. Although the milk was not old (according to the code date) several cartons did have an off-flavor. As a result all the milk was replaced by the vendor.

All machines dispensing perishable products are serviced daily by the vendor. All sandwiches are replaced and any milk that exceeds its code date is removed. As it is impossible for us to check the vending machines themselves on a daily basis, we ask that anyone who has a complaint concerning out-ofdate or unwholesome food items in vending machines contact Veterinary Services, Ext. 2535, so they can follow up on the complaint. Thanks for the call and incidentally, we couldn't identify anyone who became sick from this milk.

Busy Telephone Line



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Class 77-E ends leadership studies


Graduation ceremonies for the Reese NCO Leadership School, Class 77-E, were held March 4 in the NCO Open Mess.
