Survey says public supports strong defense, B-1 bomber

PRINCETON, N.J. (AFNS) - The American public wants a stronger national defense and supports the decision to produce the B-1 bomber, according to a national survey released by Opinion Research Corporation.

Results of the survey indicate 65 per cent of the public believe the

United States should be stronger than Russia, but only 29 per cent feel that we are.

Twenty-six per cent of those polled think we should be equally strong and 30 per cent believe we actually

One percent of the Opinion Research Corp. poll says the United States should be weaker than Russia, but 27 per cent says we are.

Questioned on the Dec. 2 Department of Defense decision approving initial production of the B-1 strategic bomber, 64 per cent said they agreed with the decision. Eighteen per cent disagreed and 18 per cent were undecided.

Forty-two per cent of those polled said the present U.S. defense budget should be increased, 29 per cent favored leaving it where it is now, 16 per cent favored decreasing the budget and 13 per cent had no opinion. (In effect, 71 per cent said that they did not want our defense budget reduced.)

Thirty-four per cent responded "a great deal," 31 per cent felt "about half," 14 per cent believed "a small amount," three per cent felt none and 18 per cent had no opinion. The Air Force projects that approximately one-half of the \$23 billion B-1 program costs will be due to inflation.

The nationwide Dec. 10-12 telephone survey of a scientific random sample of 1,004 persons was designed by Opinion Research Corp. to measure public attitudes toward U.S. defense strength and awareness of the attitudes toward the B-1 bomber program. It was commissioned by Rockwell International, prime contractor for the Air Force's B-1 program.

Fifty-six per cent of those polled said they considered themselves Democrats, 28 per cent said they were Republicans and 8 per cent responded as Independents, while 8 per cent said they were undecided or 'something else." Eighty-seven per cent of the respondents were white, 9 per cent black, while 4 per cent said they were other or declined response.

Retirees get pay increase of 4.8 per cent this month

will get a 4.8 per cent increase in their retired pay for March.

A 1976 law set March 1, 1977, as the effective date for new procedures in figuring cost-of-living increases for retired military and government employees. This means the pay increases will show up in end-of-themonth checks.

The 4.8 per cent increase is a "before-taxes" figure. The net change may be slightly different for some retirees.

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - adjustments will be made at six-Military and federal civilian retirees month intervals (each March and September), based on the consumer price index (CPI) increase for the previous six months.

> The CPI measures the change in the cost of purchases a typical wage earner might make during a particular base period.

> The first increase under the new system is based on the CPI figures for December 1975 and 1976. December 1975 is used as the base month because it triggered the previous CPI increase in March

there is no CPI increase for six months, or if the index drops, there will be no change in retired pay.

Under the previous method of computing retired pay, adjustments were made when the CPI rose 3 per cent above a base month and stayed at the new high or higher, for three months. The raise in retired pay matched the CPI percentage increase, with an extra 1 per cent 'kicker" added.

The new computation method eliminates the "kicker," but is expected to provide retirees with faster, more equitable changes

July set for implementation

LOWRY AFB, Colo. (AFNS) - The Air Force Accounting and Finance Center (AFAFC) will begin withholding state income taxes from the pay of Air Force members beginning in July of this year for states that have completed agreements with the U.S. Treasury. No state has yet signed an agreement, but 28 states are negotiating with Treasury.

Negotiating are: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, the District of Columbia, Georgia, Hawaii, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New Jersey, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Utah, Virginia, and Wisconsin.

Michigan and Arizona have requested information on state withholding, although Michigan does not currently tax military pay.

The AFAFC will use each individual state's tax formula to compute the tax witheld from members' pay. The center will also print information on state taxes on the new self-mailer leave and earnings statement which will be in use throughout the Air Force as of

April is spring clean up time again, a time to upgrade the overall appearance of the base, our working areas, and our living quarters. Although our Base Civil Engineers will organize and provide the driving force for this campaign, we expect that everybody will participate in some way.

Supervisors are expected to actively plan, promote, publicize, and support the base clean up campaign. Building custodians must place emphasis on identification and correction of fire safety hazards and improvement of building appearance. Building custodians should also identify cleaning and maintenance tasks within the facility and within 75 feet of the outside. We need to get rid of some of that old furniture, equipment, or

whatever it is you have been saving but not using. We need to spruce up the appearance of the buildings through self-help efforts if necessary; clean and paint doorways, entryways, corridors,

Base housing occupants should check carports, yards, and homes for safety hazards and for ways of improving their appearance. If you can do it yourself, please do on a self-help basis, but check the housing brochure to insure that it is proper and permissible. When you see something that needs doing that you can't do, let our Civil Engineers know about it. The lead time on some projects is pretty long, so early identification is necessary.

BOQ and BEQ occupants should inspect their rooms and facilities to identify similar

projects. Again, do what you can on a self-help basis to clean things up or fix things. What you can't do yourself, identify to your first sergeant or the appropriate person in order that Civil Engineers can be scheduled to fix it. Remember that our Civil Engineering funds and manpower are somewhat limited so that we will expect you to participate actively-not just sit back and play straw boss.

As the end of April approaches, I expect to see a flurry of activity all over this base in response to planning actions accomplished earlier in the month. I encourage all of you to fully support this program so that we can keep Reese a desirable place to work and live, and a show place that we can proudly exhibit to visitors.

Community Property

Understanding law vital in estate plan

In estate planning, an understanding of the Law of Community Property is especially important. Eight states mainly in the Far West and Southwest follow in one form or another, the community property system of civil

In brief, community ownership means that each spouse owns an undivided one-half interest in all property acquired by either after marriage except that obtained by inheritance or by gift. The law,

however, is not uniform among the community property states.

Community Property

In Texas and some other states, income from most separate property becomes community property; but in others, for example California, it remains separate property. Generally, the husband has the right to manage and control the community personal property but usually is prohibited from making gifts of it to third persons unless his wife consents.

In most community property

states, a wife may dispose of her onehalf interest by will, but New Mexico is an exception to that general rule. In California, Nevada, Idaho and New Mexico, if either spouse dies without a will, his or her share passes to the survivor, but in other states, the decedant's interest goes to his descendents or heirs.

Estate Planning

Obviously, estate planning is significantly influenced by community ownership. For example, if the premium for an insurance policy on a husband's life states where the legal system is

is paid with community funds, the wife owns one-half of the policy' during the husband's life and she is entitled to one-half the proceeds on his death regardless of whom he may have designated as his beneficiary. Also, as a wife owns one-half of all community property, the value of her interest is not taxable as part of her deceased husband's estate although it is retained in the estate for limited purposes of planning.

The law of community property is often not well understood in other

based on some form of common law ownership. The respective property interest of a husband and wife is not always easy to resolve. Difficult as it is, however, in planning his estate, a resident of California, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Louisiana and Texas must consider the nature, extent or consequences of his or his wife's interest in their property.

Safety eyewear: Helpful device for preventing sight damages

A farmer lost his sight while stretching barbed-wire on a fence. A teenaged boy was blinded in one eye while using anhydrous ammonia to fertlize the family farm.

These common farm practices which resulted in blinding eye accidents could have been prevented through the use of appropriate safety eyewear, reports the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

and drills should never be used without the protection of at least plastic cover goggles(which fit comfortably over prescription glasses.) Full shields provide general protection, especially during light grinding, but a goggle provides better over-all coverage, for example when making repairs underneath farm machinery.

Well-fitting plastic covered goggles with hooded vents provide protection from flying dust and chaff, as well as from low-lying branches and brush, encountered during general field work. Such goggles should be stored on tractors and other farm machines, and in containers to protect and keep them

Anhydrous ammonia fertilizer is especially dangerous. The highest

percentage of ammonia accidents occur during transfer from one tank to another, a process that is repeated at least three times between factory and field application. If there is just one minor equipment defect-such as weak point in a hose or a faulty valve-eye damage can occur.

Ammonia absorbs into the fluid of living tissue so fast that damage can begin to occur within a brief a time as 30 seconds after contact.

The Prevention of Blindness

advises; always stand upwind, keep your head and body clear of valves and couplings, and have an ample water supply (at least 5 gallons) within easy reach when working with ammonia. In the event of an accident where ammonia comes in contact with the eyes or skin, flush with clean water for 15 minutes. Another recommended safety precaution is to keep a small squeeze bottle of water in a pocket when working because blinding pain may immobilize the injured worker.

Under the new program, individuals can study course materials at their own worksites and at their own pace.

The expanded on-the-job curriculum includes programmed

English usage, personnel clerk functions, position management and position classification, and basic labor relations. Also included are courses on equal employment opportunity, classification as a management tool, basic personnel management and preparation for retirement.

To enroll, individuals must have an authorized official of their agency submit an Optional Form 37 or Optional Form 170. The forms are processed through the civilian training officer in the central civilian personnel office.

Bank Americard use set for May 1 in both clubs

The target date for the Bank Americard system to be fully operational at the NCO and Officers Clubs is May 1, 1977. To make the transition from the present system to Bank Americard will require the cooperation of all present and new club members. If you have not already filled out the application for your new card, please stop by either

of the clubs and fill out the required forms.

To clear up any misunderstanding about interest charges or membership dues under the new system, the following is the way it is:

• No finance charge will be assessed for the use of Bank Americard to buy merchandise or services if payment in full is received at the Bank Americard Center within 25 days of the closing date shown on the holder's periodic

statement. A charge of one and onehalf per cent per month or 18 per cent annually will be assessed to any carry over charges that extend past the 25 day period.

• There is no annual membership charge for being a member of Bank Americard, and no finance charge is attached to your club dues which are paid for a month in advance.

Those members that want a dues only billing with Bank Americard need only fill out the basic information on the application such as name, address, telephone number and type of account. Credit references are not required.

Those individuals that already have a Bank Americard will only be required to fill out the local form listing their present card number.

It cannot be emphasized enough the importance of filling out and turning in the available application at either club. Please do so now if you are one of those that have been putting it off.







Helping the club with the show is Sears' Fashion Coordinator Terry Gaschen. There is no charge for the show and everyone is invited.


AAFES releases travel guide



Priority will be given to personnel residing in the Village with about eight surgeries performed per month.


Reese operator receives recognition for support



Since more vehicles will be utilizing the nation's throughfares we all will be more prone to incidents. One of the potential incidents we could be involved in-no valid vehicle registration sticker.

The latest IG Inspection was not too impressed with the lack of concern on the part of motor vehicle (to include motorcycles) operators. It is the inherent responsibility of each motor vehicle operator to register his vehicle at his earliest convenience upon arriving on base. Motorcycle operators should be especially aware of the required Base Regulations. Base regulation requirements are as follows:

 Motorcycle operator must have a valid state inspection sticker and special drivers license, if required by state bike is licensed in.

• Wear approved helmet and eye protection at all times.

· Headlights illuminated at all

• Motorcycles operated on Reese AFB must be equipped with the following equipment:

• Front and Rear wheel brakes unless manufactured without front wheel brakes. • At least one mirror which

provides an adquate field of vision for a minimum of 200 feet to the rear. Front and rear fenders.


The following items are prohibited equipment:
