

President appoints group to review pay, benefits

WASHINGTON (AFNS)-President Carter has appointed a ninemember commission to review previous studies of the military compensation system and to recommend changes to current pay and benefit programs.

Charles J. Zwick, a former director of the Bureau of the Budget and now a Florida banker, was named to head the study. The commission will submit a report to the President by March 15, 1978.

Previously referred to as a "blueribbon" panel, the group will review studies of the Defense Manpower Commission and the Third Quadrennial Review of Military Compensation.

The President ordered the fresh review of pay, benefits and the military retirement system because previous attempts to provide an equitable and efficient total military compenstation system failed to achieve general agreement.

For example, in April 1976, the Defense Manpower Commission recommended that the members of the armed forces be paid in the form of a fully taxable salary, while the Third Quadrennial Review of Military Compensation concluded last winter that members should continue to be paid through a modified pay and allowances system. Similarly, various reviews of military retired pay came up with different approaches.

President Carter said he expects the commission to resolve these differences and to propose one integrated, long-term solution to military compensation. He expects the solution to be fair to the taxpayers of the United States, as well as members of the armed forces.

Other members of the commission are Army Gen. William E. Depuy, commander, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command, Fort Monroe, Va.; retired Air Force Lt. Gen. Benjamin O. Davis, Arlington, Va., former commander of U.S. Forces, Korea, and Chief of Staff, United Nations Command;

Herbert F. York, La Jolla, Calif., professor of physics, University of California at San Diego and a former director of Defense Research and Engineering; Walter N. Page of Huntington, N.Y., president of the Morgan Guaranty Trust Co., director of the Foreign Policy Association and trustee of the Carnegie Institution; Jane P. Pfeiffer of Armonk, N.Y., vice president for communications, IBM Corp., and trustee, Rockefeller Foundation; and John H. Filer of Hartford, Conn., chief executive officer, Aetna Life and Casualty and a former Connecticut state senator.

The commission also includes Philip A. Odeen of Lake Forest, Ill., vice president, Wilson Sporting Goods, former deputy assistant secretary of Defense, systems analysis, and former director of program analysis, National Security Council; and Thomas Ehrlich, Washington, D.C., president, Legal Service, Corp., Former dean of Stanford Law School and special assistant to the under secretary of

Promotions to lieutenant colonel have numbered approximately 200 per month since October 1976, but dropped to 175 for May and June. For July and August, the 0-5 promotions are expected to run about 60 per month.

As with the 0-6 promotions, the September increment may be adjusted according to personnel strength figures at that time.

About 235 majors have been promoted per month from October 1976 - May 1977. The June 1 promotion increment dropped to approximately 100.

That rate is expected to continue until the end of the fiscal year, with a possible adjustment in the September increment.

Vandalism—Problems—Responsibilities

Recent statistics show a significant increase in the number of incidents of vandalism and malicious mischief within the family housing area. Although we historically experience an upward trend during the summer months when the kids get restless or bored, I think we parents tend to adopt an attitude of complacency and apathy about vandalism when we live in the security of a military installation. I would like to discuss with you (very briefly) what I feel

are some inherent responsibilities we all share with regard to vandalism and children.

I do not mean to suggest that all vandalism in Reese Village is caused by dependent children. However, we have had a number of known incidents involving children since January that probably could have been prevented or at least stopped sooner had we all accepted the responsibilities incumbent with being an adult and/or a parent.

In some cases we let our

children down by failing to provide strong guidance and help when needed. We've had several family quarters vandalized which included ransacking, money missing, and arson. A number of bicycles have been stolen, numerous automobiles have been scratched or painted, windows broken, antennas broken off, tires cut, and equipment removed from under the hood.

I believe we need to explain to our children the seriousness of damaging the property of others and of the government. They need to understand that the repercussions can be serious and can include eviction of their family from the base and the establishment of a very bad reputation for them. The result in all cases is embarrassment to the families, hard feelings among our community area, and the necessity of paying for the damage.

We should take every measure to avoid tempting anyone by protecting personal property and keeping quarters secured when unoccupied. We should also routinely question the presence of strangers in odd places at odd times in the housing area late at night and around obviously un-

I can appreciate your concern; but, we have a problem with the growing number of automobiles on the base and the limited parking spaces. This is particularly true in the family housing area where a recent survey disclosed that over 200 vehicles were parked on the street while nearly 100 carports remained empty.

Since your vehicle is drag strip utilized, it qualifies as a recreational vehicle and may be placed in the Recreational Vehicle parking lot. However, your car is not the only vehicle that has been written up as being inoperable or not properly registered. At the present time, approximately 36 reports covering the base proper and Reese Village have been submitted to Unit Commanders for action. The SPs have tried not to single anyone out,

but rather get to the core of a prevelant base problem - violation of AFR 125-14, Wg Sup 1, which reads, "abandoned or inoperable vehicles unattended for more than 48 hours. ..." will be processed IAW required regulations. The owners of the vehicles you have described have been notified and violation reports have been processed. We solicit your help in identifying inoperable, abandoned, and illegally parked vehicles before they detract any further from acceptable base apperance.

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Consent problems faces doctors

A difficult problem faced by hospitals, physicians and other medical personnel, both military and civilian, is that of consent of a patient to treatment. Unless a valid consent to treatment is obtained from a patient or a valid reason, under the law, for not obtaining consent is present, medical personnel or institutions may be liable in damages to the patient for battery. This problem is especially difficult where a minor is the patient, and is a problem, due to the understandable

Under Texas law a parent, grandparent, adult sister or brother, aunt or uncle, and a person who possesses a written authorization executed by one of these relatives may consent to treatment of a child. A problem would not normally exist when a parent or other of those relatives takes a child to a medical facility for treatment, because the adult

minor without a valid consent, for relative is present at treatment to grant consent.

> A problem does arise, however, where parents are away from home (e.g., on vacation) and children are left with friends or other nonrelatives. Under these circumstances, it is important that parents recognize the difficulty a babysitter or friend may have in obtaining medical care for a child in an emergency. To avoid this

potential problem, it is advisable to obtain a written authorization, granted to the person with whom a child is left, which meets the requirements of the Texas law referred to previously. Such an authorization may be obtained from the legal office in the form of a special power of attorney or through the base hospital, and is particularly desirable when parents intend to leave home for weekends or other extend-

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Communications Security: critical part of the Air Force mission

In the present world situation, in which a new "Korea" or a "Vietnam" may occur practically anywhere in the world at any moment, the Air Force's ability to perform is vital to national interest. Under these conditions, the needs

for security in connection with the Air Force mission has never been more critical.

Despite the fact that real progress has been made in the field of communications security in recent years, the Air Force is still losing a significant amount of intelligence

everyday through the use of the telephone (our largest communications system) and other insecure electrical voice communications media.

The majority of our long-distance trunk circuits in the United States today are made up of microwave radio links, whose propagation patterns literally cover the USA and surrounding waters; similarly, the majority of our overseas circuits are made up of tropospheric and ionospheric scatter radio links, whose propagation patterns blanket large parts of the Atlantic, Pacific, Europe, and Alaska. In many cases, our propagation patterns actually extend into Communist Controlled areas in Europe and Asia.

Actual intercepts of Air Force telephone communications, in simulation of enemy intercept and analysis activities, have shown conclusively that vital intelligence about the most highly classified Air Force activities is readily available each day to the enemy on our telephone circuits. While this condition holds true in all areas, it is particularly true in the areas of greatest operational activity.

AF to require airmen to give fair return on training dollar

- Beginning Sept. 1, airmen entering certain formal training courses must either extend their enlistment or reenlist to insure a fair return on training costs.

Personnel officials said the length of this controlled duty assignment

cost and length of the course, rather than the course length alone.

The changes to Air Force Regulation 39-11 and other appropriate directives require airmen completing training to remain in the CDA for which training was received for a specified number of months. A list of courses and assignment requirements will be available at local consolidated base personnel offices.

According to personnel officials, first-term airmen can still retrain under the CAREERS (career airman reenlistment reservation system) program even though they are in a controlled duty assignment.


Maximum retainability, even for more than one course, is 36 months. The only exception is for physician

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) (CDA) will now be determined by the assistant training which requires four years' retainability.

> First-term airmen must extend up to 23 months, as necessary, but can't exceed 23 months in total extensions. Second-term airmen will have to extend to meet the controlled assignment, but won't be required to extend their enlistment beyond 10 years' total active federal military service. Career airmen will have to extend or reenlist to meet the requirement, but can't go beyond their high year of tenure.

> Second-term and career airmen who refuse to gain retainability to meet the requirement must sign a statement making them ineligible for promotion, and for reenlistment or enlistment for 93 days after separation.

Major's selection board rescheduled for FY 1978

fiscal year 1978 temporary majors selection board is scheduled to meet sometime between April and June 1978 instead of this summer or fall, similar to previous boards.

Air Force officials say there are a number of reasons for the change and point out that selected personnel will be promoted about the same time as if the board were to meet this year.

The primary zone of consideration will include captains with a temporary date of rank of Dec. 31, 1970, or earlier. Peronnel officials refer to these members as the "1967 year group" because most of them were commissioned in 1967.

Secondary or below-the-zone consideration requires a temporary date of rank as captain between Jan. 1. 1971, and Dec. 31, 1974. The secondary zone includes members commissioned in 1968-70.

One reason the board isn't meeting this year is that the majors list from the October 1976 board won't be exhausted until August 1978. Regardless of when the next board meets, personnel selected won't be promoted until after that

One of the most significant aspects of the change is that the most current evaluation report will be on file for officers competing for

Captain evaluation reports close out Oct. 31 and usually take up to several months to make their way into files at the Air Force Military Personnel Center. According to personnel officials, if the promotion board were to meet in October, the latest evaluation report on file for an individual would be a year or more

Personnel officials consider a spring meeting best for insuring the most recent reports are on file in time for secondary-zone consideration as well as for the central selection board. They also say the change will reduce the time between selection and when the member actually pins on the new rank.

The large list from October 1976 stems from the Vietnam-hump year groups moving into and through the promotion zone for major. Since the Air Force has allowed personnel in these year groups to compete as a whole-year group, the number of eligible personnel has been quite

Promotion opportunity has remained at 80 per cent, so the promotion lists have been lengthy. Consequently, exhausting the lists and making room more promotions has been a lengthy process.
